FROM THE DEAN'S CHAIR

Responsibility is a word that is frequently mentioned in the educational world. Perhaps John F. Kennedy was not speaking to education alone, but his words certainly have meaning for those involved with leadership in education at any level; and in the final analysis, every member of any organization has some leadership responsibilities, whether de facto or implied. Kennedy's words are worthy of note: "We may be impatient at times with the weight of our obligations, the complexity of decision, the agony of choice. But for us there is no comfort or security in evasion, no solution in abdication, and no release in irresponsibility."

The recent Governor's Pre-White House Conference on Libraries and Information Services was an example par excellence of assumed responsibility on the part of many people from all levels. The planners of the conference, the delegates to the conference, and the active observers of the conference are all indicative of people within a profession who assumed responsibility in helping make this a meaningful endeavor for all areas of the library/media profession. Having served as a member of the pre-conference regional planning sessions, as a preparer of an issues paper, and as a delegate to the conference, it was gratifying to see how many graduates and participants of St. Cloud's media program were involved in the various aspects of the conference. Involvement did not stop at attendance, but it carried through right into an active participation in the caucuses and support shown the delegates in keeping them abreast of developments significant to conference activities. A note of congratulations is, of course, in order to all those who helped in any way in making the conference a success.

The following developments should be of note to all of you. Barbara NEMER, media supervisor from Armstrong Senior High School in Robbinsdale, was elected as one of three professional delegates to the national President's White House Conference to be held in

Fall of 1979. If you have issues of national concern, please make your points of view known to her. I think she will be an excellent representative and will carry the banner of the profession quite well. Three resolutions, among some 80 resolutions, were pushed by the educational members in attendance. All three were easily passed, and while the significance of the action remains to be seen, it does show some strength for action within the state. The three are consistent with the legislative platform adopted by the Minnesota Educational Media Organization at the spring conference in St. Cloud. The three resolutions were to develop a strong statement on censorship, to promote a minimum level of funding in our school media centers, and to seek a minimum level of staffing based on the number of students being served. In retrospect, the responsibility assumed by so many is admirable, but the real proof of what it all means lies in the responsibility that each member takes in the future to see that these resolutions become a reality. It all really begins at the local level.

KEABLE TO ADVISING AND INSTRUCTION

Doreen KEABLE joins Tony SCHULZETENBERG and Mary TURNER in Advising and Instruction, while Dennis FIELDS and George ERICKSON remains in positions supporting Dean John BERLING. Gene CAMPBELL remains the resident media specialist at the Campus Lab School.

PHYSICAL CHANGES IN LEARNING RESOURCES

With an eye toward better service for staff and students, several physical arrangements were made within the Learning Resources Center.

One major shift saw Government Documents moving from the basement to third floor where the collection becomes a part of the reference area. An intensive and well-conceived shift of materials and services on the third floor has turned that area into perhaps one of the most attractive places within the building. Archives was moved from second floor to the basement area, and the space formerly occupied by special collections has become a self-disciplined, attractive study area for students. The heavy use of this area is indicative of a need well met. Plans are presently underway to change the open, basement area into a more attractive area for study and a special area for University Archives is being developed. If you have not had an opportunity to visit LRS recently, a visit might be both enjoyable and rewarding.

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION REORGANIZED

As part of the College of Education reorganization plan, the Department of Library and Audiovisual Education becomes the Center for Library and Audiovisual Education, a change

designed to provide more flexibility in function and design. Three departments remain as before: Psychology, HPER, and Special Education. A new Department of Teacher Development will combine the former elementary and secondary education departments. Three other new centers were also added: Campus Lab School, Center for Educational Administration and Leadership, and the Center for Educational Change. Four service units have also been found: Curriculum Materials Laboratory, Professional Field Experiences, Research and Evaluation Services, and Athletics. Dr. Al SCHELSKE has returned to assist Dean Ken AMES in the administrative unit.

CLASSES TO BE OFFERED AT UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA

Plans have been tentatively completed to offer a series of graduate courses in media at the University of North Dakota. If approved by all interested parties and channels, one course each quarter for the next two years, beginning with winter quarter 1978-79, will be offered. These courses are intended to update certification and/or to begin a program leading to a master's degree in media. Basically, the program could consist of 18 credits at UND; 15 hours of credit may be transferred in from another institution if not extension credit, and a minimum of 15 credits must be taken on campus at SCSU. Offerings at UND are contingent upon maintaining a pre-determined enrollment. This will provide media personnel in northwestern Minnesota an excellent opportunity to continue on in graduate work. The first course scheduled to be offered is an advanced selection course. Interested students may write to the Center for Library and Audiovisual Education, SCSU.

GILLETT RETURNS AS GRADUATE DEAN

After a year's leave of absence while working with the State University Administrative unit, Dr. Lowell GILLETT has returned to campus as the Graduate Dean. Dr. Al SCHELSKE served as the Graduate Dean in the interim. Dr. Vern LUDEMAN, familiar to many of the graduate students, remains as the Assistant Dean.

CURRICULUM CHANGES

The new track in the IM Master's Degree for persons interested in developing competencies and skills for use in the business, industry, and government services areas has been approved by the Graduate Office and the Graduate Council. Internal prerequisites and requirements are in the process of being finalized, and anyone interested in this program should contact the Center for Library and Audiovisual Education.

Students interested in completing programs and in self-improvement should note the development of several new courses and seminars, all offered periodically and many offered during the summer sessions. Among these courses are the following: Audio Systems, Color Slide Presentations, Instructional Slide Production in IM, Acquisitions and Maintenance of Equipment, Adolescent and Young Adult Materials and Services, Contemporary Materials, Developing Instructional Packages for Teachers, Media for Teachers, Oral and Media Documentation of Local History, Seminar in Public Libraries, Government Documents, and On-line Literature Searching.

If you have an interest in having a "Media for Teachers" course offered in your school district or area, please contact the Center for information on enrollment, number of students, teachers, etc.

TELEVISION SERVICES

Production Services Television has recently completed a series of three videotapes on the hearing impaired child. Other productions currently in process are: "Viscosity Printing" which demonstrates a very unique approach to multi-color printmaking; "The Factory" which overviews the construction and availability of various types of caskets; "Critical Issues in Media" is a series which will look at common issues prevalent to the media person and resource facilities.

A new retrieval system is currently under construction in Learning Resources Services. This will allow students to individually request and view all television programs available in our facility. A high quality stereo audio system is an integral part of the total design.

STANDBY, as we are anxiously awaiting the arrival of additional equipment which will expand further our production capabilities.

TECHNICAL SERVICES UPDATE

A significant enhancement to the OCLC system is that the OCLC terminal now displays a message with each bibliographic record indicating whether the item is in the University collection. This is a time-saver for acquisitions and cataloging since a search no longer has to be made through a large number of holdings symbols to see if the record has been used. It should also cut down on the amount of time spent searching at the card catalog.

LRS has been awarded a federal grant to purchase material for the collection. This year's grant totals \$3900 and will be used for purchase of selected non-print items along with other material.

This summer a "Holdings Updated" party (see accompanying photo) signified the completion of one phase of that activity. Retrospective input into OCLC has produced some output that should be very valuable to the LRS staff and general users. One item is a printout of the reference collection by subject and one by shelflist. Reference librarians are very pleased with the product even though it is our first attempt and is considered "quick and dirty."

Another important product is the Film and Video catalog. This printout combines all video, 16mm, and 8mm films into one collection, which is then divided by subject and title. Each entry contains bibliographic information along with an annotation of the contents. Thirteen copies of the catalog

were printed and distributed across campus for convenient access.

ENGLAND LIBRARY TOUR

A total of 41 participants, including 20 who took the course for credit, spent two delightful weeks touring Great Britain and its libraries. The tour was sponsored by the Center for Library and Audiovisual Education at St. Cloud and by Learning Resources of the University of Evansville, and was conceived and carried out under the leadership of Tony SCHULZETENBERG and Dwight BURLINGAME.

The tour was educationally and culturally enriching, and it took its participants from London to Edinburgh and back. Highlights of the tour included visits to the British Museum, the British National Library, and the National Library of Scotland. Despite an unexpected first night's stay in Minneapolis, the group enjoyed such places as London, Cambridge, Harlaxton, Edinburgh, York, Sherwood Forest, Lincoln, Oxford. Six days in London enabled people to become acquainted with its excellent transportation system and gave participants a chance to see school libraries, cathedrals, and government buildings. The "tube" was an excellent means of getting to plays, concerts, and other places of educational and cultural interest.

Among the castles visited were Warick, Alnwick, and Edinburgh; cathedral visits included York, Lincoln, St. Paul's, Westminster Abbey, Westminster Cathedral, and Coventry. Library tours, in addition to those already mentioned included the Bodleian at Oxford University and the Public Library in Oxford, the Wren Cathedral library at Lincoln, and several private libraries. Visits to many historical places helped to complete a tour that will live on with pleasant memories and much happiness for those who were fortunate enough to go!

UPPER MISSISSIPPI CONFERENCE, 1978

The annual Upper Mississippi Media Conference, sponsored by MEMO, was held at the Holiday Inn in St. Cloud on May 3, 4, and 5th. Conference co-chairpersons were Marie ELSÉN and Shari PRETZER. Highlighting the conference were addresses by Barry BRATTON, University of Iowa, and Jane HANNIGAN, Columbia University. An interesting array

of mini-sessions, commercial exhibits, a session of the Governor's Pre-White House Conference, and a membership meeting were also part of the conference. Bernadette STEPPES of Austin was presented the "Administrator of the Year" Award and Orvis HAUGEN received the Blumberg scholarship. Tony SCHULZETENBERG assumed the MEMO presidency at the annual meeting.

GOVERNOR'S PRE-WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE

The Governor's Pre-White House Conference was well attended by educational media persons from all levels of education. Some 16 educational media people served as delegates and they were effective in securing passage of three basic resolutions of concern to educational media personnel. These were a strong statement on censorship, a minimum funding level for school media centers, and minimum staffing for media center personnel.

The meeting was held at the Leamington Hotel in Minneapolis on September 10-12. Barb NEMER, Armstrong High School and holder of the media supervisors license through the St. Cloud program was one of the three professionals elected as delegates to the President's White House Conference to be held in fall, 1979. The other two delegates are Bob ROLHF, Hennepin County, and Pat HARPOLE, Minnesota Historical Society.

MEA/MFT PROFESSIONAL DAYS

Ms. Jacqui WUERTENBURG replaced Robert LIPSYTE as the featured speaker at the fall conference because of Lipsyte's illness.

Wuertenburg spoke on the use of children's materials and presented some interesting ideas and concepts concerning the promotion of reading and other materials. Doug HED, along with Assistant Superintendent Torwald ESBENSEN of Edina, made a presentation on the use of the micro-computer in the Edina schools. A general membership meeting and several committee meetings concluded the session. Tom KAMMEIER was the conference chairperson.

LUTHER BROWN MEDIA EDUCATORS CONFERENCE

The 6th Annual Luther Brown Media Educators Conference returns to St. Cloud in February. The first conference was held in St. Cloud where the idea was conceived and fostered

under the leadership of Luther BROWN. The first conference was held in 1974. The theme of this year's conference, to be held February 8-9th at the Sunwood Inn, deals with intellectual freedom. Judith KRUG, head of the Intellectual Freedom Committee of ALA, will be the featured speaker.
