BERLING APPOINTED NEW DEAN OF LRS

Dr. John BERLING has been appointed to the position of Dean, Learning Resources Services, to replace Dean BROWN who is to retire as of August 31, 1977. His responsibilities will include direction of the instructional program as well. Dr. Berling rejoined the SCSU faculty in the summer of 1976, having previously been on the staff during the 1968-69 academic year. Most of his duties the past two years have been as the assistant in charge of personnel and operations under Dean Brown. He has had extensive public school experience in Holdingford, Staples, and more

recently at Apollo High School in St. Cloud. He holds the B.S. degree from St. Cloud State, and M.S. degree from Wayne State in Detroit, and a Ph.D. from the University of Nebraska.

To some he may have seemed at times like a workoholic ("busier than a one-armed paper hanger with a sore thumb"), but underneath that fierce exterior was a sincere and driving ambition to get the job done, even at the cost of much personal sacrifice.

And so, Luther, on behalf of your many friends, colleagues, and students, a sincere thank you goes your way for the many kind words and deeds that have been directed our way, and may your retirement years be ones of "gemutlichkeit on Culleon"; and just as we know you will not forget us, please know that you will be in our thoughts and foremost in our inspirations as we traverse the never ending road toward better media programs and thus to better education.

IN MEMORIAM

Ruth LAQUIER, a member of the Learning Resources Services and Department of Library and Audiovisual Education faculty since 1969, died on March 26 of a rare blood disease. For the past year Ruth was in charge of the Technical Processes area, which saw the beginning of the OCLC system at SCSU.

Ruth will be remembered by everyone who knew her for her unusually fine philosophy of life and faith. A passage from the writings of the Baha 'i Faith which appeared on Ruth's memorial cards days, "I have made death a messenger of joy to thee. Why, therefore, dost thou grieve?" (Baha 'u' llah) Such faith helps us accept her absence and remember the good years we had her with us.

ARCHIVES COLLECTION EXPANDED

The scope of the University Archives is being greatly expanded. The President of SCSU has officially established the Archives as the agency responsible for the collection, preservation, and administration of all of-

ficial records of the University, and of private papers of persons and organizations associated with the University. For the first time the official files of the University will become a part of the available historical record of the University. Processing and arrangement will be in accordance with accepted archival practice, and it is hoped that the indexing system will be computerized. Marie ELSEN developed the working guidelines for the collection and remains as head of the Archives Unit.

LOCAL AND MINNESOTA INFORMATION SERVICE UPDATE

As a significant part of its media services to St. Cloud State University and the region, the Learning Resources Services has continuously attempted to acquire and provide the major publications about Minnesota. Today such major developments as power sitings, pollution abatement, school, business, and community consolidation are being documented nationally and internationally, but only very incidentally, and then frequently by the news media, on the local level where they often are having the greatest impact.

"Referencing the Record" of Central Minnesota, specifically, and Minnesota, in general, is the newest dimension of the Learning Resources Services at St. Cloud State University and is the primary responsibility of the Local and Minnesota Information Service.

"Referencing" involves the identification, recording and assembling, acquisition, indexing, and service access to a wide variety of data and documents in all media formats about current and historically important people, places, institutions, organization, and events.

Not only is this service in response to the need to insure that this type of information is recorded for instruction, study, and research, but also a local and Minnesota information service is in response to a constant and growing orientation of student papers and thesis towards local and Minnesota concerns. In addition, these historical patterns has been stimulated recently by the Bicentennial and a growing interest in community "Roots."

To insure that the need for local and Minnesota information will be met, how and in the future, the following series of projects have been instituted:

1. Media Documentation of Local and Minnesota Information - utilizing the mediums of photography, audiotaping, and videotaping, speeches, conferences, and other events now are become part of the permanent information.

2. Local and Minnesota Oral History - also employing audio and video media, the actual voices and original reminiscences of a variety of people, famous and local prominent are being recorded.
3. Minnesota Information Guide - to provide more accurate and detailed information on communities, counties, school districts, people, institutions, and events throughout Minnesota, a locator file to statistical information, directories, biographies, histories etc. has been created.
4. Central Minnesota Index - To provide access to materials on Central Minnesota subjects in the St. Cloud State University collection as well as other collections throughout the state, a index of cards has been created.
5. Document Acquisition - a concerned effort is being made through direct contact to acquire local and regional documents, pamphlets, histories, photographs, recordings, etc., which reflect major activities of Central Minnesota, especially, and Minnesota, in general.

ACADEMIC LIBRARIANS TO MEET IN ST. CLOUD

The Midwest Academic Librarians Conference (MALC) will convene in St. Cloud from May 12-14. This informally structured group meets at an institution with a newly constructed facility. Conference headquarters will be at the Sunwood Inn, one of St. Cloud's newly constructed convention sites, and the meetings will be held both there and at the University. The theme for the conference is "Third Century Potpourri" and will feature a variety of items of interest to academic librarians. Included will be sessions on local history, folklore, microform technology, and collection growth. Featured speakers will include Jim KLOBUCHER of the Minneapolis Star, Garry HAYS of the State University System, and Daniel GORE of Macalaster College. Others on the program include Phil SCHWARZ, U of W-Stout; Helen GILBERT, St. Cloud Folklorist; Russ FRIDLEY, Minnesota Historical Society; Wendy STROTHMAN, University of Chicago Press; Virgil MASSMAN, Hill Reference Library; and Pearce GROVE, Western Illinois University.

UPPER MISSISSIPPI MEDIA CONFERENCE

The annual Upper Mississippi Media Conference, focusing on Professionalism-Selection-Quality of Instructional Systems will meet at the Minneapolis Radisson on May 5, 6, and 7. Presiding will be co-chairpersons Lawrence SMELSER and Gladys SHEEHAN of MEMO. Dean Luther BROWN will be the keynote speaker at the Thursday opening session. Activities will range from a multi-media festival to an idea room and mini-session will be directed toward the theme. The following will be in charge of mini-sessions: Jack LOSS, Dennis FIELDS, Don OVERLIE, Gerald CLEVE, Frank BIRMINGHAM, Robert TURNER, Helen STUB, Nancy KOZEN, Peter BAST, Helen RYBERG, John KING, John FENN, Bette RIPKE, Richard DAVIS, Joan LEIGH, Gladys SHEEHAN, Warren GERECKE, and Sandra HUSTAD. Highlight speakers at the Saturday noon luncheon will be Richard GILKEY, President of AECT, and Peggy PFEIFFER, President of AASL.

UW-STOUT 12th ANNUAL MEDIA CONFERENCE

The Director of Telecommunications for the Commonwealth of Virginia, George HALL, and a Library-Public Relations Consultant, Alice IHRIG, Oak Lawn, Illinois, will keynote the University of Wisconsin-Stout's 12th Annual Educational Media and Technology Conference to be held in Menomonie, July 18-20, 1977.

Hall, an ardent instructional technologist, has been a long-time constructive critic of television which is his livelihood.

Ihrig will direct her attention at media professionals who are striving to communicate with supervisors, administrators, governing boards, and the public.

Five concurrent workshops will be held on Monday afternoon: "Super 8 Sound: The State of the Art"; "Microfiche Readers: Their Future is Now!"; "Simple Binding and Repair"; "Graphics: Increasing Productivity with New Technology"; and "Security Systems: Pro and Con". Individuals participating in the three hour workshops will include: James STIRLING, Xerox University Microfilms, Ann Arbor; Stephen MILLER, Tri-State Business Machines, La Crosse; George FRANKLIN, Alpha Data Sciences, Madison; James HERR and Lloyd WHYDOTSKI, Graphic Communications, UW-Stout; James MCCANN, Compugraphics Corporation, Minneapolis; Ted HINZMAN, 3M Company, St. Paul; and several media specialists from Learning Resources, UW-Stout.

About 50 exhibitors will show and demonstrate software and hardware during the Conference.

NEW GRADUATE BULLETIN ISSUED

St. Cloud State University Media Specialists, Dennis FIELDS and Michael CASSIDY will make a presentation on "Visual Analysis: Are We Practicing What We Preach?", while Eileen REWERTS, Eau Claire Public Schools will relate how her school system was challenged on a censorship issue. Ed RICHARDSON, Indiana University will present his perceptions of the future of instructional technology and what changes are on the horizon, while concurrently Paul NORTON, Wisconsin Educational Communications Board will describe how a state educational television network is financed. Hal RIEHLE, Bureau of Audio-Visual Instruction, UW-Extension will speak on Film Rental Centers. An Occupational Information Mediated System will be demonstrated by David CAULUM of the Wisconsin Vocational Studies Center at UW-Madison. Six case studies of exemplary media programs at the public school, vocational-technical, and college level will include presenters from the Upper-Midwest.

Information about the Trempealeau County Cable TV Project will be presented by Rodney MOEN, director of the project. Over two million dollars is currently budgeted for this project which will hook-up homes and schools in the southwestern part of Wisconsin with a communications system which will allow for the exchange and dissemination of information between institutions.

The new director of the Wisconsin Bureau of School Library and Media Programs, Diane WILLIAMS will take a look at the future of school media programs in Wisconsin. The Conference will conclude Wednesday evening with the traditional "Piggus Roastum" picnic.

ACCREDITATION VISITS

The re-accreditation visit by the NCATE team was completed during the period March 13-16. Dr. Roy VANDRESER from Stevens Point was the media person who served on the team. Results of the visit have not yet been made known. The North Central Association re-accreditation visit is scheduled for May 4-6. Dr. Dale DICK, Dean of the School of Graduate Studies at UW-Eau Claire is chairman of that group. Needless to say, the accreditation visits are much work, but in the final analysis, the self survey and some outside opinions are of extreme value in effecting improvement in any program.

The 1977-78 issue of the Graduate Bulletin is now available. Those students who need information about any of the programs or who are in the process of planning a tentative masters program can consult the bulletin for scheduling information. Graduate courses, as well as the quarters they will be offered, are listed for all departments of the University.

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION REORGANIZATION STUDIED

Study of the organizational structure of the College of Education is progressing. Some departments are examining their own organization in relation to the over-all College plan. The College of Education Chairpersons' Council, working with Associate Dean SCHELSKE and Dean AMES are carefully assessing the current College organization in the context of the College of Education perspectives, goals, objectives, and current functions performed through College programs and services. Alternative organizational models will be designed soon for broad examination both by departmental faculty groups as well as by administrative councils. Results of those considerations will be analyzed in an effort to formulate a proposed model for the organization of the College aimed at reaching such outcomes as the improvement of program quality, more effective utilization of resources, and clarified roles and responsibilities for all college personnel. Certainly, the general intent in the study is to attempt to ensure that the organizational design is that most likely to promote the achievement of College goals. Dr. Lawrence SMELSER of the Department of Library and Audiovisual Education is serving as our departmental representative.
