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FROM THE CHAIR

STUDENT WORKING IN BANGLADESH

Julfeker Sheikh, a student in the Economics Dept. program, is currently visiting his home country of Bangladesh and researching economic development there. He met with Muhammed Yunus, the head of Grameen Bank. Grameen Bank does micro-loans of as little as \$10 to Bangladeshi families to create their own businesses and work their way out of poverty. Mr. Sheikh reports “when I was in one of my econ courses about the third world countries, my professor had shown us a video about Muhammad Yunus and his work. It was a matter of pride for me to see my famous ‘city boy’ at my university in the U.S.” He has visited Grameen’s work in small villages throughout Bangladesh. His advisor on this project is Professor Mary Edwards, who provided this story.

WINTER INSTITUTE COMING FEB 20-21

Each year, the SCSU Center for Economic Education, with the support of the Department of Economics, offers the Winter Institute. Please mark your calendars and plan to attend any and all of the various events associated with this annual tradition.

The Winter Institute kicks off at the St. Cloud Civic Center on Thursday, February 20, 2003 with the 9th Annual Economic Outlook. This year's outlook speakers include Dan Laufenberg, Chief Domestic Economist, American Express Financial Advisors, Tom Stinson, Minnesota State Economist, and our own Mark Partridge. The Economic Outlook is followed by a cash bar cocktail reception and a banquet dinner (\$30 per plate). This is an outstanding opportunity to

meet up with SCSU students, professors, and alumni as well as St. Cloud area business and political leaders.

The year's 41st annual speaker's program will be held at the Kimberly A. Ritsche Auditorium on the SCSU campus with registration beginning at 8:15 a.m. on February 21. Federal Reserve Board Governor Ben Bernanke is this year's keynote speaker. Governor Bernanke is a prolific publisher and an exceptional researcher, and arguably one of the seven most influential economic policy-makers in the country. His talk, *Balance Sheets and the Recovery*, is scheduled for 9 a.m. Our second speaker is Harold Hodgkinson, a highly entertaining national demographics expert, and the co-director of the Cen-

ter for Demographic Policy at the Institute for Educational Leadership in Washington, D.C. Dr. Hodgkinson will be speaking on *Demographics is Destiny* at 10 a.m. The final element of this year's speakers program is titled The Regional Workforce in 2010. A panel of experts on trends in the workplace will discuss issues related to the workforce of the future in the St. Cloud area. A buffet lunch will be available in the Voyageurs Room in Atwood Center, beginning at 12:15 p.m. The cost of this lunch is \$8.95 per person.
