Becker

Dr. William E. Becker, Jr. is Assistant Professor and Director, Center for Economic Education, University of Minnesota. Professor Becker is a teacher of money and banking and economic education and is the author of many articles and books in economics, economic education and finance. He has been the recipient of national research and instructional awards from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and the National Science Foundation. He received his Ph.D. degree in Economics from the University of Pittsburgh.



Friedman

Dr. Milton Friedman is currently Paul Snowden Russell Distinguished Service Professor of Economics at the University of Chicago. He is a member of the research staff of the National Bureau of Economic Research and a columnist and contributing editor for *Newsweek*. Friedman is the recipient of many honorary degrees and awards for his scholarly achievements including his numerous articles, essays and books in economics, money and economic development and monetary theory. In addition, Dr. Friedman has lectured on many campuses and has held research and consultant positions with government agencies in the United States and abroad. He holds a Ph.D. in Economics from Columbia University.



Leftwich

Bruce Jasper is a social studies teacher at Hosterman Junior High School in the Robbinsdale Public School System, Robbinsdale, Minnesota. In 1975 he received a national award for outstanding teaching in economics at the secondary level. Mr. Jasper is recognized throughout the state as a leader in the field of social studies and economic education curriculum development.



Son

Dr. Richard Leftwich is Regents Professor of Economics at Oklahoma State University. He has contributed numerous articles to economics and professional journals and is the author of several books including *The Price System and Resource Allocation* and *An Introduction to Economic Thinking*. Dr. Leftwich has lectured throughout the country and has served as a visiting professor for the University of Chicago's project in Santiago, Chile. In addition, he has held leadership positions in many professional organizations having served as President of both the Southern Economics Association and the Rocky Mountain Social Science Association. Leftwich received his Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Chicago in 1950.



Swan

Agnes Lien is an elementary teacher in the Foley Public School System, Foley, Minnesota. An active participant in civic and educational organizations, she has over twenty

years of teaching and business experience. Mrs. Lien has received state and national recognition for her innovative teaching practices and curriculum materials in economic education at the elementary level.

Francis V. O'Connor, an art historian, has directed a special research project for the National Endowment for the Arts designed to evaluate the cultural and economic effectiveness of New Deal patronage. He has also written articles on the federal arts patronage projects and in 1973 published *Art for the Millions*, an anthology of essays written by WPA/FAP artists from all regions of the country between 1935-1940. Currently, O'Connor is editing a catalogue raisonne' of the work of Jackson Pollock, the leading painter of the Abstract Expressionist Movement and is publishing a quarterly newsletter titled FEDERAL ART PATRONAGE NOTES. He has lectured extensively throughout the country on 20th Century American Art.

Dr. Sung Won Son is currently Vice President and Economist with the Northwestern National Bank of Minneapolis. He has held numerous teaching and research positions and was Senior Economist for the President's Council on Economic Advisors from 1973-1974. Dr. Son's areas of specialization include monetary policy and banking, statistics and international finance. He received his Ph.D. in Economics in 1972 from the University of Pittsburgh.

Dr. Craig Swan, Associate Professor of Economics at the University of Minnesota, received his Ph.D. from Yale University in 1970. He is currently serving as Associate Editor for the *Journal of Monetary Economics* and as a consultant to the House Committee on Banking and Currency for the FINE Study. Dr. Swan has contributed numerous articles to business and economics journals and has conducted extensive research in the areas of housing and mortgage credit.
