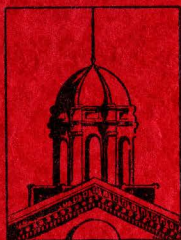

A LETTER FROM HOME . . .

Visit your Post Office boxes at least once a day. Mail is delivered twice daily from the downtown Post Office.

Also, there may be important notices waiting for you from your friends, from organizations, or from the administration.

You can mail your letters and packages in the business office. Stamps and cards are on sale there.

"I'VE JUST HAD MY PICTURE TAKEN" . . .

New students will have the opportunity to have a photo taken during the first week of college. A charge of 25 cents will pay for four pictures. Three of these are filed in the offices, one is kept by the student.

POINTS . . .

T.C. has an activity point system for the purpose of recognition of membership and participation in the college's extra-curricular program.

A minimum of six points is required for two-year students, and twelve points for four-year students.

The student's extra-curricular program should be guided by his interest, his health, and his scholastic record.

THE EARLY BIRD GETS THE — LOCKER . . .

Get your locker as soon as possible in the personnel office on the ground floor of Old Main. There is no charge for the lockers, but you must provide your own lock.

Your gym locker is assigned at Eastman Hall and is paid for in the Business Office when you register.

MONDAY, 10:10 . . .

Our weekly convocations are just like a friendly, family dinner discussion. From them emanates much of the friendly, wholesome, atmosphere that we are proud to find at T.C. Every student, with the welfare of his college at heart, attends these convocations.

The convocation programs cater to every interest and are a very potent factor in rounding out a student's cultural background.

KNOW YOUR LIBRARY . . .

Hours

The library is open the first four evenings of the week and on Saturday morning, as well as from 7:45 a.m. to 5:15 p.m. on week days.

Main Library

In the Main Library, on the first floor are the two-week books, the picture and clipping files, and the magazine racks.

In the Main Library, students may find their own books. The shelves are open to all. See the desk assistant by the entrance door if you wish to take a **book** or **magazine** from the library. She will show you how to make your own charging record.

As in other college libraries where the book shelves are open to students, all books must be shown at the entrance desk before leaving.

Reserve Books

Reserve books are located on the second floor. These books are needed so constantly that they may be drawn out for reading in the adjoining Reserve room for only two hours at a time. Reserve books may be drawn for overnight use between 5:00 p.m. and 5:55 p.m. from Monday through Thursday; and after 3:30 p.m. on Friday; and after 11:00 on Saturday. These books must be returned by 8:10 a.m. from Monday through Friday; by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday. A fine of ten cents for the first hour and five cents for each succeeding hour is charged for overdue Reserve books.

Tips

If you don't find the book you wish on the shelves of the Main Library, you can fill out an orange reserve slip from the desk by the entrance door.

Be sure to call on the librarians whenever you need assistance.

The St. Cloud Public Library is also open to all college students.

HEALTHY, Wealthy, and Wise.

The college health service gives you a free physical examination at the time of your entrance and yearly thereafter. In preparation for this examination we suggest: that you know what vaccinations and inoculations you have had; that you bring with you any special information your family doctor feels we should have, that you have an X-ray if previous Mantoux tests have been positive. (If the Mantoux test given here is positive, you will be required to have an X-ray at **your own expense.**) Keep appointments and avoid the \$1.00 fee you'll have to pay for postponed examinations.

Free consultations with physicians are available by appointment; the college nurse may also be consulted at any time without charge. The health program provides for payment of the **first call of a doctor** when such action is recommended by the nurse.

ABSENT OR TARDY . . .

ALL ABSENCES DUE TO ILLNESS ARE TO BE REPORTED TO THE COLLEGE NURSE EITHER BY THE STUDENT OR BY THE HOUSEHOLDER ON THE FIRST DAY OF ABSENCE. When the student is ready to return to class, the nurse will issue a re-admission slip.

When students wish to enter after unreported illness, a blue slip is issued from the office of the college nurse. The blue slip informs the instructor that the nurse has no definite information that the student was actually ill.

Other absences are to be reported to the instructor who will be responsible for admitting the student to class. No arbitrary number of "cuts" are set by the faculty or administration.

For absences on the day preceding or the day following a college holiday, students must receive previous consent from the instructor. Failing to do this, the student will be admitted only upon written permission from the administration.

VITAMINS FOR VICTORY . . .

President Roosevelt has stated that nutrition is one of the nation's greatest wartime problems.

Dr. Barker and the college nurse will be very glad to advise and help you. They are specially trained and are the leaders in this college's nutritional effort.

WEBSTER'S (T.C. EDITION) . . .

Constant A subject required of all students. It's purpose is to build the teacher background required for every field of concentration. A constant can be compared to a tree. You can't have a tree without roots. A constant is the root of teacher training.

Elective A subject not required of all students. The English student takes a course in Shakespeare. That is an elective.

Two-year diploma course This prepares teachers for elementary work in village, rural, or city schools.

Four-year degree course Bachelor of Science degree is given. This enables the graduate to teach the elementary, intermediate, or upper grades in town and city schools.

Major The special field of concentration which you select.

Minor Your field of lesser concentration. Each degree graduate carries at least two minors in addition to his major.

Quarter hour of credit Usually one hour of credit is given for each quarter hour of work done. Classes which meet four days a week net four quarter hours of credit and those which meet twice a week either one or two.

Transfer This refers to students who have transferred to T.C. from another college or junior college.

Ed Psych Don't let anyone fool you girls. He isn't the best looking fellow in school. Ed Psych is Educational Psychology, a subject required for degree students.

Kid Lit This convenient name conserves some of the breath required to say Children's Literature.

WORKING YOUR WAY THROUGH COLLEGE? . . .

Unless you have an NYA assignment or some other work, you should have enough money to carry you comfortably through the first quarter of the school year.

Working for board and room practically **does not** exist for young men. Odd jobs may be found occasionally but don't count on them to carry you through college.

The Deans of Men and Women will assist students in securing work. Only 14 hours of class work are allowed a student who is earning board and room.

The college maintains a Student Loan Fund which is available to those needy students who have shown average or superior ability during college residence of at least one quarter.

STUDENT AID ASSIGNMENTS . . .

Go to Mr. Weismann's office some time during the first week of school for your NYA assignment.

TIP FOR NEW STUDENTS . . .

Read the college catalog thoroughly. They're available in the business office. The catalog is interesting and it's helpful.

IT'S POP WHO PAYS . . .

Your budget will need to cover tuition, special fees, college supplies, room and board, and personal expenses. All except personal expenses are listed in the catalog.

The students who do light housekeeping have found that between \$12 and \$15 per month will cover the meals and room rent. The expenses vary according to the amount of food received from home.

Bring sufficient funds (about \$30) to take care of all initial expenses at the opening of college. This will include \$10 for tuition, \$5.25 registration and activity fee, \$2.50 book rental, and about \$6 for gym fees and equipment. Incidental fees include \$1 for late registration, special exams, and for physical exams after the student has broken the original appointment.

During the second year of the two-year course you will be assigned six weeks of practice teaching in one of the affiliated rural schools. This will bring additional expense to your living cost. You will pay about \$30 for room and board in an approved rural home.

WHO'S MY ADVISER? . . .

Your adviser is the head of the department in which you plan to major. Go to him. He will help you arrange your program.

If your majoring in Music, see Mr. Waugh; if it's Business, see Miss Ferro and Mr. Daggett; for Art see Miss Penning; Industrial Arts, Mr. Larson; Physical Education for men, Mr. A. F. Brainard; Physical Education for women, Miss Case; English, Dr. Griffin; Foreign Languages, Dr. Munn; Speech, Dr. Kaump; Mathematics, Mr. Bemis; Science, Dr. Croxton; Elementary Work, Mr. Smith; Geography, Miss Graves; History, Mr. D. S. Brainard; Social Science, Dr. Zeleny.

WHAT WILL I WEAR MARY? . . .

When you are planning your minimum, adequate wardrobe, go over your old clothes and remember that they will be new to everyone else.

Taste, good materials, and simplicity should be the keynote of your wardrobe. In September and October, your summer clothes can be worn extensively.

For dress-up occasions, such as teas, parties, and receptions, you will need one attractive crepe, silk, or woolen dress. For informal recreation hours and the class room, sport clothes and suits are enjoyed.

Dinner dresses and formals are usually purchased after you have been on the campus and have knowledge of your special needs.

Becomingness and simplicity in dress, as well as appropriateness for the occasion, are important in making a pleasing personal appearance.



WE'RE GOING TO THE STUDENT UNION . . .

One of T.C.'s most popular gathering places is our Student Union, located in Carol Hall.

At the Union students can dance, play games, or just chat with friends. **IT'S A SWELL PLACE TO MEET YOUR FRIENDS!**

The Union is open on designated nights and it's really an enjoyable place at which to spend one's leisure time.

WHERE'S ROOM Q? . . .

If the room numbers on your program card are lettered from C through Q the room is on the main floor of "Old Main".

When you walk up the steps from the front entrance toward the Victory Statue the room letters to your left start with A. Keep following the hall to your left until you see the outside exit. Just before you reach this exit turn to your right and walk down the corridor that leads to rooms C, D, and E.

Starting from the above mentioned exit reverse your steps and the first door on your left is room F. Keep walking down the hall until you pass the Post Office and the Statue. Then the next lettered room is H followed in succession by L and M at the end of the hall. Follow the hall back on the other side for rooms N and O. Then just before you reach the Victory Statue you will find the Textbook Library. Turn to your left and you will find **room Q** near the entrance from which you started.

If the numbers are 6, 7, 8, or 9, take the stairway near the Post Office to the second floor. For rooms 11, 12, and 13, take the other stairway, located near room L, upstairs. The Auditorium is located between those rooms on the second floor.

If there is an EH on your program card it means that the room is in Eastman Hall. Here the rooms are EH 1, 2, 3, and 4, on the first floor. Rooms EH 5 and 6, plus three gymnasiums are located on the second floor.
