AVIATION PROGRAM RE-ACCREDITED BY CAA

The Council on Aviation Accreditation has awarded five year re-accreditation to the SCSU Aviation Department's three programs--Professional Flight, Management and Operations. The decision to re-accredit the programs was made by the Council at its annual meeting at Purdue University last July. This followed the submission of the Department's Self Study in November, 1998, and the CAA Site Visit to the campus in March, 1999. In 1994 SCSU became the sixth baccalaureate degree aviation program in the country to be accredited by the CAA. The SCSU Aviation degree remains the only CAA-accredited aviation program in Minnesota.

ADVISORY BOARD MEETS IN SEPTEMBER

The Industry Advisory Board to the SCSU Aviation Department met on Thursday, September 16, at the St. Cloud Regional Airport with Board member Brian Addis presiding.

Greg Laumann, Manager, SOC, Sun Country Airlines, reported that Sun Country's scheduled service is doing well with plans to expand to South Florida and Texas this winter. Acquisition of additional aircraft is part of the airline's expansion plans. There is continuous year-round hiring of pilots with about 240 total. The new Hubert H. Humphrey terminal at MSP should be opened in 2001, affording Sun Country 8-9 gates with possibility of 19-20.

John Palanica, NWA DC-10 Captain, announced that NWA flight attendants turned down the last offered contract in their current negotiations. The issues focus on language, not money. The mechanics have selected a new union and will begin negotiations soon. NWA has added an additional 747-400 to its cargo fleet, bringing the total to nine. The MD-80 fleet was retired in September, 1999, and the Airbus fleet is growing. The airlines have had to develop plans which will facilitate non-delay procedures for passengers. Among those proposed by NWA are the purchase of air stairs which will allow passengers to deplane without using a jetway. Buses will carry passengers to the terminal. Palanica pointed out that delays are most often caused by mechanical problems, ATC, crew scheduling and weather. Dave Weeres commented that delays are largely passenger perceptions. Palanica reported that NWA will hire about 400 pilots this year and in 2000. Flight attendant hiring is primarily replacement with 600 being hired in both 1999- 2000.

Dave Weeres, US Airways Pilot, reported that US Airways has been hiring 100-120 pilots each month. Older B-727's and DC-9's are being retired with purchase of new Airbus

aircraft. A merger with American Airlines is possible with US Airways already using AAL's Sabre system for reservations, crew scheduling, weather and payroll.

Rich Lawrence, Mesaba Airlines Director of Flight Operations, announced Mesaba's "bridge agreement" with SCSU as well as with other Midwest aviation programs. Pilots hired under this agreement must be program graduates and have 800 hours total time and 100 hours of multiengine time. Mesaba hopes that this agreement will not only provide pilots but will also capture their "hearts and minds," thus creating a more loyal workforce and reduced pilot attrition. The airline hires 5-10 pilots each month with a force of 950. Its fleet includes 72 Saab aircraft and 28 RJ's.

Brian Ryks, AAE, St. Cloud Regional Airport Manager reported that last year there were 22,000 enplanements at St. Cloud Airport (STC). The airport would like Mesaba to provide regional jet service. Ryks presented an overview of the updated STC Master Plan. STC hopes to be designated the third second tier airport in Minnesota, following Rochester and Duluth, and to attract a low cost air carrier. Future plans include construction of a cargo terminal and an air traffic control tower.

Brian Addis, President, Wings, Inc., St. Paul Downtown Airport, reported that the Beech Baron is being adopted as the multiengine trainer. He urged SCSU graduates with the Certified Flight Instructor rating to apply to Wings.

The Aviation student organization representatives reported on their respective activities which are described elsewhere in this newsletter. Faculty reported on the status of the Aviation Department with newly elected Department Chair, Pat Mattson, noting that Fall, 1999, enrollments have shown a 10 percent increase this year.

In October the Ambassadors are sponsoring a bus trip to Duluth to tour the NWA Airbus Maintenance facility, Cirrus Design, the Air National Guard and the Duluth Air Traffic Other upcoming events include the Control Tower. Owatonna High School Aviation Career Day, a holiday dinner, a ski trip and a tour in the spring to aviation facilities in the twin cities. The goal of the Aviation Ambassadors is to promote the SCSU Aviation Department by giving airport tours of the STC airport, attending conventions, career fairs and airport days and organizing the Airport Day each spring at STC. Airport Day is scheduled for April 30, 2000. Students earn volunteer hours for participation.
