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

Our much loved and esteemed faculty member, Dr Roger Worner, has decided to retire the end of summer from St. Cloud State University. In this Spring edition of the newsletter, we celebrate and honor his achievements and contributions to the SCSU the Educational Administration and Leadership program.

Dr. Roger Worner received a BA from North Dakota State University in 1965; MS from North Dakota State University in 1966; and PhD. from New York University in 1969. He joined St.Cloud State as an associate professor in 2009.

His work experience included service as an Assistant Superintendent (14 years) and Superintendent of schools(13 years); a consultant to school districts (19 years) and an associate professor at St. Cloud State University (9 years). He held school administrative positions in Fargo, ND, Kanawha County, WV, White Bear Lake, Mason City, IA, Iowa, Roseville, Glencoe-Silver Lake, MN, and Centennial, MN school districts, the latter four as Superintendent.

After a successful career as a school superintendent, he delivered fundamental contributions to the profession through teaching, mentoring, and advising students in the St.Cloud State K-12 licensure programs and the doctoral program.

Over his nearly 50 years in education as a teacher or administrator, he authored two books, wrote numerous articles, was selected twice as Executive Educator 100, and consulted with over 350 school districts which were dealing with facilities, planning, budgeting and/or organizational issues.

While his retirement will be effective the end of summer, his extremely positive and treasured contributions will continue to impact our University and our program well into the future. We are sad to see such a dear instructor and extraordinary colleague leave St.Cloud State, but we are pleased and excited that he will now have the opportunity to pursue many personal interests in his retirement. We will miss his joyful spirit, smile and willingness to always help out. He is truly a great professor.



Elia Burgman is currently a Doctoral student in the EDAD program and holds a position as a Special Assistant to the Commissioner at the Minnesota Department of Education(MDE) Below she shares the inspirational story of her life and her involvment in the EDAD program

1. Tell us something about yourself and your previous and current career.

I was born in Las Mesas, Mexico, and my father was a migrant worker under the Bracero Program. Currently, I live in Sleepy Eye, Minnesota and work in the Twin Cities. My husband and I have 4 children and 6 grandchildren.



I started my career in education as a paraprofessional and then enrolled at Minnesota State University, Mankato (MNSU-Mankato) and graduated with a BS Degree in Spanish and Business Education. I taught Spanish and business education courses in St. James, MN. I returned to college to obtain my Master's degree and Secondary Principal liscense. I became the High School Principal at Sleepy Eye Public Schools. I have taught courses in Education Leadership at MNSU-Mankato and worked at Shattuck St. Mary's Preparatory School as an Academic Dean.

In 2011, I was appointed Assistant Commissioner at the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) by Education Commissioner Brenda Cassellius. In 2015 I worked for Minneapolis Public Schools as the District Deputy Education Officer. I returned to MDE in March 2017 and currently hold position as a Special Assistant to the Commissioner. I work in collaboration with the MDE team on special projects, such as programs under ESSA (Every Student Succeeds Act) on Educator Quality and Equity in Access, as well as growing teacher diversity in Minnesota so that school districts and charter schools will create equitable access plans to ensure low-income students of color and American Indian students are not disproportionately taught by inexperienced, ineffective or out-of-field teachers. In addition, we are working to improve student access to teachers of color and American Indian teachers in Minnesota schools, as well as other projects and collaboration requested by the Commissioner.

2. What made you enroll in the EDAD Doctoral Program?

I always wanted to pursue a Doctoral Degree, and St. Cloud State University offers the flexibility and innovation, as well as access to robust courses, guided research, and peer collaboration in a program that fits my schedule. I am hoping to do international work in the near future and a Doctoral Degree will certainly be an asset to have!

3. Reflecting on your study life, what are three things that you would consider outstanding in this experience?

The program provides access to very experienced professors who have worked in the area of education. I certainly enjoy the discussions and team collaboration to research current topics presently in the education field. The support the program offers is great!

4. What challenges do you experience in this program?

I am satisfied with the way the program is developed. The topic I am researching is on migration patterns of Mexican people to the United States with destination to Minnesota and the barriers their children encounter as migrants in the school system. Furthermore, I am also researching what these families are experiencing in the area of deportation to Mexico and the barriers they are encountering in the Mexican education system.

5.In your opinion, what more could be done in this program to improve your quality of life?

It would be great if more recruitment could be done with people of color to enroll them into educational leadership and administration. Our K-12 system and higher education need more diversity in Minnesota. Cultural and global competence needs to be expanded in the course work, and diverse people enrolled in the program bring rich perspectives to the conversation

6. You are actually in your second year. By the end of this year, you may want to concentrate on the dissertation project. How do you feel about it?

The support I have received from the faculty is amazing—especially Kay Worner. The cohort I am enrolled for the doctoral program is great, and I can always reach out to my colleagues in the cohort when needed. So I am feeling pretty well about continuing with work on my dissertation.

7.Do you have any major concerns so far?

No concerns—just need to keep working on the research for my dissertation topic. I am thankful to have access to the faculty at SCSU.

8. Where do you see yourself in three years?

In three years I see myself working internationally, perhaps consulting in order to improve the education of migrant workers and improve Migrant Education

9. Any additional comment?

Diversity and inclusion are top priorities in Minnesota. Demographics in the State of Minnesota are changing; therefore, equity, diversity and inclusion should be topics of conversation that need to be expanded in the program. As educators, I believe we are always learning, and we continue to build on our work and life experiences. Personally, globalization is very important to me, and I feel that I still have much to learn about our diverse students, diverse communities, and our multiethnic, multilingual, and multicultural world in order to be prepared for global and cultural competence, even though I am bilingual, Latina--I am a person of color.

LEARNING FROM OTHERS: THE CANADIAN EXPERIENCE

Learning from others: The Canadian Experience:

In the EDAD doctoral program, the students were engaged in an examination of important local and regional studies that directly impact education here in the USA. This spring, cohort 8 members had to research possible causes of PISA disparities in different countries as part of their course, EDAD 821. The PISA is a worldwide assessment intended to evaluate educational systems by measuring 15-year-old school pupils' scholastic performances on mathematics, science, and reading. The assessment is conducted by the organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) and has been repeated every three years since 2000.

Educational Achievment, Student Learning, and Program Development(EDAD 821) is one of the courses taught by Dr. Roger Worner . The course syllabus challenges students to examine practices that cause American schools to leak achievement.

Divided into three groups, the EDAD 821 members examined the educational performances of three top countries in the global education rankings, Finland. Korea and Canada. The groups attempted to answer the questions: what are the differences between US and others educational systems, and how do the students measure up? In order to answer these questions, the group assessed how the students fared in relation to their American counterparts, as well as internationally, by looking at the results of the Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA).



LEARNING FROM OTHERS: THE CANADIAN EXPERIENCE

In this edition, we would like to share with you highlights of the lessons that we learned from the Canadian educational experience as presented by one of the EDAD 821 groups:

- Results from PISA 2015 Canadian Report revealed that Canadian students are top performers internationally in reading, math and science.
- The US and Canadian public education systems are fundamentally very different in their structure, policy and funding. The US model operates with a primarily centralized model, run by the US Department of Education.
- The Canadian public education system is decentralized. The territorial Ministries of Education set standards, define curriculum, and allot funding and teacher certification.
- The provincial governments are responsible for establishing the curriculum for their schools
- Learning focus on child centered learning. Methods include: open plan schools, team teaching and use of visual aids
- There is no tracking of students into different levels of academic course work
- The class size is limited by law no larger than 21.
- No standardized testing- one exam only at the end of high school
- Parental involvement is pivotal for the success of children throughout their school year and beyond
- Special needs students are taught and supported by qualified special needs teacher and assistants.
- Focus on critical thinking
- No federal mandates on testing, no national curriculum
- Longer school year
- Low attrition rate
- Teachers position valued
