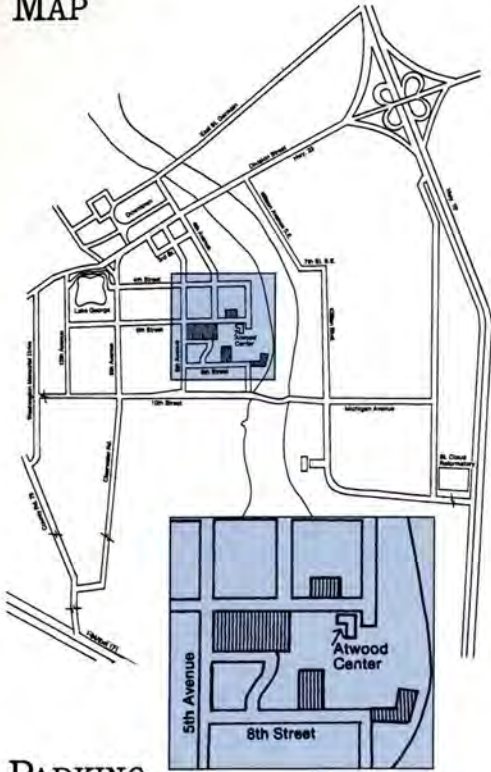

SPEAKERS



Edward Gramlich, Ph.D., is Dean of the School of Public Policy at the University of Michigan. He is professor of economics and public policy there, and he also has served as chair of the economics department. In 1994 he was appointed chair of the Quadrennial Advisory Council on Social Security. The council is charged with

examining the long-range financial status of the social security program.

In 1986 and 1987 Dr. Gramlich served as deputy and then as acting director of the Congressional Budget Office, a nonpartisan congressional agency charged with analyzing budgets and other policy questions. He also has served with the Federal Reserve Board, the Office of Economic Opportunity, the Brookings Institution, and in 1992 was the staff director for the Economic Study Commission of major league baseball. He currently is in his second edition of a popular text on cost-benefit analysis, and has written several other books and many articles on topics such as macroeconomics, budget policy, income redistribution, fiscal federalism, social security and the economics of professional sports.



Laurence J. Kotlikoff, Ph.D., is professor of economics at Boston University, research associate of the National Bureau of Economic Research, and Fellow of the Econometric Society. He received his B.A. in economics from the University of Pennsylvania in 1973 and his Ph.D. in economics from Harvard University in 1977. From

1977 through 1983 he served on the faculties of economics departments of the University of California - Los Angeles and Yale University. In 1981-82 Professor Kotlikoff was a senior economist with the President's Council of Economic Advisers. Professor Kotlikoff has served as a consultant to the International Monetary Fund, the World Bank, the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, the Swedish Ministry of Finance, the Norwegian Ministry of Finance, the Bank of Italy, the Bank of Japan, the Government of Bolivia, the Treasury of New Zealand, the Office of Management and Budget, the U.S. Department of Education, the U.S. Department of Labor, the Joint Committee on Taxation, The American Council of Life Insurance, Merrill Lynch, Fidelity Investments, and other major U.S. corporations. He has provided expert testimony on numerous occasions to committees of Congress including the Senate Finance Committee, the House Ways and Means Committee and the Joint Economic Committee. Professor Kotlikoff is co-author (with Alan Auerbach) of *Macroeconomics: An Integrated Approach*, author of *Generational Accounting, What Determines Savings?*, co-author (with Alan Auerbach) of *Dynamic Fiscal Policy*, co-author (with Daniel Smith) of *Pensions in the American Economy*, and co-author (with David Wise) of *The Wage Carrot and the Pension Stick* and has published extensively in professional journals, newspapers and magazines on issues of deficits, generational accounting, the tax structure, social security, pensions, savings and insurance.
