Could the Looming Airline Pilot Crisis Jeopardize Safety? by Dr. Jeff Johnson

Over my lifetime, I have seen airline pilot shortages ebb and flow like the tide. However, this pilot shortage is nothing like I've seen in my lifetime. Although the major airlines can draw pilots from the regional airlines, it is the regional airlines that are going to face this crisis head on.



There are at least seven reasons for this impending airline pilot shortage which amounts to a perfect storm:

- 1. <u>High training costs</u>: Flight training is expensive and most of it is placed on the student.
- 2. <u>Low starting Salaries</u>: New first officer starting salary for a regional airline is relatively low from \$14,000 to \$25,000 a year.
- 3. New generational trends: More young people do not want to "give up their life" to live "out of a suitcase."
- 4. <u>Huge international demand for pilots</u>: Overseas demand for pilots is very strong. China, for instance, has seen explosive growth. Some countries even offer a tax free allowance for qualified US pilots to fly for them including paid confirmed travel back home.
- 5. <u>Retirements</u>: Experienced pilots from the Vietnam War are fading from the flight decks. Military pilots have longer service obligations due to high training costs and when they get out, they are highly qualified and often bypass the regional carriers in favor of applying directly to the major airlines like Delta, American, United, etc.
- 6. Restrictive changes in a federal law increasing the crew rest requirements for airline pilots:

 More stringent crew rest laws decreasing the amount of fight and duty time a crewmember can service with an airline will affect airline pilot staffing levels.
- 7. Restrictive changes in a federal law making entry level airline co-pilot positions much harder to obtain: Congress passed a law that takes effect on August 1, 2013 that requires all new airline first officers to hold an Airline Transport Pilot (ATP) license. The ATP is the highest license issued by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). To obtain an ATP, you need to be at least 23 years old and have 1500 flight hours. The current federal minimum for a co-pilot position is a commercial pilot license. Pilots must be at least 18 years old and have a minimum of 250 hours of flight time to qualify for a commercial pilot license. Going from the present minimum 250 hour requirement to the new 1500 hour requirement next year presents a 400%+ increase!





Last July, the Regional Airline Association (RAA) President, Roger Cohen, made this statement: "Absent a game-changing shift in the supply of trained aviation professionals, particularly pilots, communities even larger than Wichita [Kansas], and certainly those smaller, are in jeopardy of losing some, if not all their scheduled flights," Cohen cautioned. "This could cut off communities from today's global economy where airline service is as important as an Internet connection." If that does not convince you we have a pilot shortage, listen to the RAA Chairman Dan Garton's comments from last May and again, I quote: "If the airlines are unable to fill the ranks with qualified pilots, service may be reduced to some small communities and aircraft could be parked." Garton noted that 75% of US cities are served only by regional airlines.
