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Will the Aviation Department Closure Hurt Diversity? by Dr. Jeff Johnson

Getting a baccalaureate degree in aviation is simply not an option in many foreign countries. Over the years, the Department of Aviation has attracted students from around the world. Women and minorities in the airline world are still predominantly outranked by their white male peers. According to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA*), less than 4% of all the certificated Airline Transport Pilot (ATP) holders are female. Effective this August, all newly hired first officers for US airlines will be required to hold an ATP certificate. Although the FAA



website does not break pilot certificate holders by race or ethnicity, Airline Pilot Central estimates that US airlines employ 647 African-American pilots of which only 14 are female.

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

Laura Sipek will be interning at the Minneapolis air traffic control tower this summer. Way to go, Laura!


Aviation Faculty News

Several Major Aviation Setbacks hit St. Cloud

The St. Cloud Regional Airport has encountered several major setbacks over a relatively short period of time. As of January 2010, Mesaba Airlines/Delta Connection stopped service to St. Cloud leaving the airport without any scheduled air service. In January 2011, the official closure decision of the aviation department was made by SCSU. As of June 15 (unless something changes), the air traffic control tower will close as a result of sequestration. A March 2011 study showed that 49% of the operations at the airport were from student training flights. With the new Airline Transport Pilot (ATP) requirement effective this upcoming August effectively raising the federal minimum hourly requirement for co-pilots by over 400% combined with the high demand for regional airline pilots, we have a "perfect storm" which could possibly result in the reduction or termination of airline service in rural areas. Rural markets such as International Falls, Brainerd, Hibbing, and even Duluth may see a reduction or even an elimination of air service will see a negative economic impact.

In 1976, approximately 80 African-American pilots were employed by the nation's major and commuter airlines. By 1986, the number increased to nearly 400. In 1986, United Airlines had fewer than 35 African-American pilots. Out of the 12,505 United pilots employed today, there are over 260 African-American pilots (approximately 2%) including 8 African-American females. Presently, United Parcel Service (UPS) African-American pilots comprise of approximately 3.5% of the 2,617 pilots. That's only 92 African-American pilots.

As Minnesota is about to lose its only 4-year Aviation Accreditation Board International (AABI) accredited program, prospective students from Minnesota and beyond will be forced to go out of state to get an AABI accredited 4-year aviation degree. For many students, paying nonresident tuition and fees for an AABI accredited 4-year aviation degree is not a realistic option. Females and students of color will no longer have the option of coming to Minnesota and will suffer for it.

this program has made a positive impact on the lives of many children as they transition into adulthood," Johnson stated. "Although the aviation department has a strong AABI accredited academic program, the aviation faculty could never reach their true potential without a sustainable, strong outreach program to the community we serve." Some at-risk children come from extremely difficult backgrounds ranging from drug, emotional, and physical abuse. They need positive role models who are willing to believe in their God-given talents and abilities

"All too often, at-risk youth need to be redirected towards something positive that stirs their passions, challenges their beliefs, and motivates them to excel in life," according to Johnson. "It became clearly evident that I can use our flight and air traffic control simulators as a tool to get these kids to dream about life's possibilities that lie ahead. I am sure the children went home after class and told their family and friends they got to fly a real airplane simulator or watch a control tower simulation. Hopefully, some of these kids will get the 'flying bug' and start dreaming of becoming an airline or fighter pilot. Other students may want to become air traffic controllers or at the very least, start asking questions about the possibilities that are yet uncharted in their lives." One notable success story is a 20-year-old student named Marlon who went through the program and became a mentor. He currently works for Delta Airlines and has traveled extensively throughout the world. He is exploring his options of becoming a pilot or going into management.


