


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CIM News



Najmi Junaid attended INET 96, the sixth annual conference of the Internet Society, held June 24-28 in Montreal, Canada. The conference theme was <u>The Internet: Transforming our Society Now.</u> Nearly 3,000 Internet technologists, developers, and industrial representatives from more than 140 countries of the world attended the conference.

The INET 96 addressed technical issues dealing with security, cryptography, and the technical transposition of contractional relationship. On the application side, INET 96 discussed electronic payment, virtual reality, and latest developments in web uses. INET reflected two fundamental tendencies that are changing the social, cultural, educational, and economic identity of the Internet:

1) More sites now exist outside the United States than inside, and this points to the growing internationalization of the Internet.

2) The research and academic communities are no longer the dominant users of the Internet. All participants were given an INET 96 CD of the conference proceedings and papers.

On Oct. 24-25, **Najmi Junaid** will present a paper on <u>Virtual Classrooms and Higher Order Thinking</u>: <u>Some Questions and Answers</u> at the Q-7 conference at the Radisson Hotel in Minneapolis.

The Changing Times... by Dr. Karen Thoms

The times are certainly changing. They have been since the 1950s, and they will continue even beyond the year 2000. I recently had the opportunity to attend the Minnesota Business Educators, Inc., fall conference in Rochester. The conference theme was "Taking Charge of Change." The final address illustrated succinctly how the all of our live are changing because of technology.

The Final Address—Change is Inevitable

Bill Murphy, department chair of the business and office systems department at Winona State University, shared the following information in his closing address of the conference:

Right now there are 16 million cellular phones and 19 million pagers being used. There are 12 billion messages left in voice mail boxes each year. To emphasize the impact of technology of technology on our lives, please note that one issue of the New York Times holds more information than the average person was introduced to in 17th century England. In addition, the video camera, which is part of many of our households, has more processing power than an IBM 360. And, those cute little musical greeting cards have more computer power than there was in the world in 1960.

It's no wonder we are stunned and in awe of all the technology that is supposedly making our lives easier and less complicated. The on-line service; the CD-ROM data bases; the CD-ROM encyclopedias; the criticism about a presentation when black and white rather than full-color transparencies are used; computer-delivered classroom presentations; K-12 students who are more knowledgeable in and comfortable with the use of technology; and international access to information and resources via Internet and WWW.




