



Center for Information Media Moving Ahead to Greet Technological Advances and to Enrich Educational Experiences

Technology is still advancing at a speed that outpaces our ability to fully adapt it and utilize it for our educational needs. However, the Learning Resources Services is moving ahead to greet these advances at the door and incorporate them into the day-to-day educational experiences.

Ontopofall this, promoting the Center's technological and educational advancement requires attention. "What's happening at the Center for Information Media?" you may ask. Well, let's dig in and show you.

Interactive Television (ITV)

Professor Karen Thoms, is delivering instruction this spring quarter on Interactive Television (ITV) as a faculty development course. This course was originally proposed as a student course, and will soon be reconfigured to be delivered to graduate students in the future. The current ITV course is broken down into 10 modules featuring: course design, course materials development, equipment operation, remote site originations, and video conferencing.

The premise of the course is intimidation annihilation—to divert fears that instructors may develop when starting out with the medium. As Karen put it, "People are intimidated by wires, and gizmos, and doo-dads; commonly known as microphones, monitors, and video cameras."

The course's intimidation annihilation tactics include: designing syllabus reconstruction for ITV by color coordinating handouts to divide sections of instruction, working collaboratively with other students, choosing alternate media for student presentations, and incorporating video taped instruction.


Karen reported, "The students had questions about 'What can I do?' but we reconstructed the question to ask, 'What may I do?'" Karen went on to

state, "Often when we think of ITV, we think of what facilities and equipment we have here. However, SCSU should orient to the mind-set of what we have around the state." The technology allows SCSU to down-link courses, presentations, meeting with other institutions utilizing off-premises sites.

Overall, one of the greatest advantages may come in the areas of resource conservation. ITV offers courses to students in their local community without having to drive hours and brave Minnesota's cruel winters. This may not only save on fuel and time, but lives as well.

Continuing the promotion of ITV instruction while providing state-wide attention on SCSU's programs, Doreen

Keable spoke as a featured panelist on April 22 in a live video conference educational series presented by Minnesota Satellite and Technology (MnSAT). Doreen discussed with moderator and KARE 11 News personality Joan Steffan the current implementations of ITV and the incorporation of new technologies into the SCSU Curriculum, in the university's attempt to provide diversified education.

Multimedia Computers

The increasing role of multimedia computers as delivery systems for instruction cannot be overlooked. One of the strongest needs at SCSU is to provide future teachers, media specialists, and trainers with the necessary computer skills. Accessing information via electronic mail, designing computer based training, and presenting instruction are requiring increasing skill levels. According to Nation At Risk the job market requires new information skills and computer controlled equipment; all of which are becoming part of our daily lives. Jeanne Hites, who delivers computer instruction, adds, " It is important for teachers to model the information skills that their students will need."



An IBM compatible multimedia computer is being driven to its limits by designers John Theis, Sue Florman and Evelyne Anker. Under the direction of Dennis Fields and Rich Josephson, preparations to create a CD-ROM tutorial for the Alliant Techsystems grant, featured in last Fall's newsletter, is placing heavy reliance video clip incorporation into the instruction. Team leader John Theis states, "It has been challenging being on the cutting edge of the technology."

Video

With increasing reliance on visual instruction, photographic supervisor Dan Marek recently received a SCSU Foundation Grant to attend a three day video workshop sponsored by Sony Corporation entitled "Camera Technique and Visualization". This work-

shop will be very valuable in meeting the increasing demands for video productions in Instructional Development.

Equipment & Facilities

It is no surprise to hear that our faculty, staff, and students are all highly interested in the latest technologies and their practical implementations to learning. However, resources and facilities seem to always be in short supply. Information Media Instructor Chris Inkster is very interested to incorporate computer presentations into current classroom instruction by projecting the presentations on screens via a color LCD device or video projector. Chris states "All classrooms should be equipped with computer LCD, overhead, video disc players, CD-ROMs,"

Standards & Certification

All the conscientious work to keep the center up-to-date will be in vain if SCSU fails to promote the program. Besides the current standards and licensure requirements for persons in Track II, additional promotion for the Center for Information Media has now been strengthened by the recent appointment of Dennis Fields to the International Board of Standards for Training, Performance and Instruction (ibstpi). Besides the increased attention, Dennis believes his appointment to the board will help market the department - faculty, staff, and students -- and promote sustained manageable growth which will propel SCSU to become one of the best programs in the five state area. Moreover, Dennis' position will allow him to stay abreast of certification developments for Track III, so that the department can meet the technological and educational requirements. Dennis concludes, " As certification becomes a reality, our students will be able go forth from all programs ready to meet the required professional standards."

As you can tell, the Center for Information Media can certainly use your help so that it may continue the business of education. No matter what amount you are able to contribute, it will be accepted with heartfelt thanks.

Hoffbeck Track I

Sandy Hoffbeck is Acquisitions Librarian for Southwest State University in Marshall, Minnesota. Her main responsibilities include overseeing the acquisitions department, collections development, serials management, and some reference work.

Sandy received her B.S. in Accounting from Southwest State University. Then Sandy's appetite for further education was satisfied by attending SCSU. SCSU offered Sandy what she needed: class flexibility-courses offered in the evenings, computer classes, and other courses which allowed her to concentrate on topics relating to academic libraries.

Sandy took courses that encouraged students to accept and expect changes that are constantly occurring in the library field. Sandy puts it best, "If we wanted to make a difference in this field, we needed to be open to change." For example, in her current position at SSU, computerization of acquisitions and serials has been one of the biggest changes. Other changes have included the addition of reference access to information using CD-ROMs and Internet access of publishers catalogs. Sandy suggests, "The all consuming and growing desire for more access to information has been the main reason for adopting electronic support systems."

Due to her concentrative work in adapting computerization to the reference delivering systems, Sandy believes that the ability to understand computerization of libraries will require persons in her position to develop computer skills and knowledge. Sandy recommends, "Keep a positive attitude and learn to market what your library can do to meet your patron's needs."



Husom Track II

Elsie Husom is Director of Media Technology for Brainerd Public Schools in Brainerd, Minnesota. Elsie serves as a change agent for the improvement of instruction and the professional development of media specialists, classroom teachers and other educators through wise, meaningful integration of media technology resources and tools into the teaching/learning process.

Elsie received her B.A. in English from Mankato State University. In Elsie's first year of teaching she relates, "The first time I told a class that we would go to the library for information, the students groaned. I think that was when the idea first came that perhaps I could try to establish an environment that would be alive and inviting, so others would experience the delights in reading and in discovery." After visiting SCSU, Elsie was impressed enough with the people and the program that she matriculated to SCSU. She believes that her program of studies gave her a solid background in the role of school media specialist, in the philosophy of a dynamic media program and the skills to not only cope with, but also bring about change.

Elsie notes that changes taking place in our technological, information society have brought about the changes in education and inher position. "Because the needs of students have changed, much staff development is needed for teachers to feel comfortable with the new teaching strategies and tools."

She concludes, "If you are an explorer, if you can handle feeling overwhelmed at times, if you like never to be bored, and if you like to work with people as well as equipment, this is the field for you."



Frohrip Track III

Laurie Frohrip is Manager of Information Resources for the Meridith Company in Minneapolis, Minnesota where her responsibilities include: organizing and maintaining the business resource center, designing and developing career transition materials; facilitating workshops and assisting clients with career and business research.

Laurie received her B.A. from South Dakota State University in Speech/ Mass Communications. Needing a life change, she chose SCSU for graduate work because of its excellent faculty and the fact that she could complete the program in two years.

She interned with the Meridith Company/Lincolnshire in the Spring of 1989. She was hired full-time and then designed and developed the facilitator guides for their consultants. Laurie explains, "I started facilitating workshops and counseling when a manager of mine gave me the opportunity and challenged me to expand my skills. I also became more active in the training, counseling and instructional design areas as I became more knowledgeable of the career management and outplacement industry."

The Track III program at SCSU allowed Laurie to take on a variety of roles at work. The broad program allowed Laurie more skills flexibility, however, it was hard to build expertise in any one discipline.

Based on her experience, Laurie recommends that all Track III Graduates join their local chapter of the National Society of Training and Development. Laurie joined in 1987 and now is Minnesota NSPI Chapter President and believes membership is vital to one's career.


