
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

Dean's Corner

Historically, the Human Resources Development and Training graduate program in the Center for Information Media has had an excellent placement record both regionally and nationally, Our placement record has remained excellent throughout recent economic downturns, and can only increase as our national economy continues to shift from defense based industries to civilian goods manufacture. With increasing demand for human resource development, job training, and retraining services we expect to continue to have more inquiries for HR/D graduates.

In keeping with this national trends, Learning Resources Services has pursued external projects that serve the manufacturing community as well as provide opportunities for both practical and academic experiences for its students. We continue to work with regional industries, and were recently awarded a grant to work with a defense contractor to assist in its shift to the manufacture of civilian goods. Rich Josephson and Dennis Fields, who regularly teach in our HR/D program, provided leadership in the development of this and other grant proposals that have brought both funding and valuable experiences to our graduate students. These grants seem to confirm the continued need for quality training programs at all levels of government, business and industry.

In order for the LRS to continue its grant activity, it will be important for CIM to continue to recruit quality students to the HR/D program. Furthermore, HR/D graduate assistants play a critical role in the completion of the projects associated with these grant programs. The students, in turn, acquire a background that make them prime candidates for high-level training and development positions. (Continued on following page)





KNOWLEDGE BASE: WHAT YOU SHOULD REALLY KNOW

On April 24, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) Board of Examiners and the Minnesota Board of Teaching will visit the SCSU campus to evaluate the College of Education's proposed Knowledge Base program. Many questions regarding the Knowledge Base are being asked: What really is it all about? What are its objectives? And how will these objectives effect the academic life at SCSU? A clear picture of the Knowledge Base was obtained in an interview with two key and influential people from the College of Education, people who have worked extensively with this program namely: Dr. Richard Johnson--Special Education Department and Dr. Jeanne Hites--Center for Information Media.

Knowledge Base Defined

The first area of concern is defining "Knowledge Base." According to Richard Johnson you can look at the Knowledge Base this way: "It is a way of depicting the common knowledge that undergirds the preparation of all our professional educators who matriculate from SCSU who may become teachers, trainers, or consultants. It is also a common language about knowledge that students and faculty can develop together. Additionally, faculty can use Knowledge Base to dialogue within departments about what students should be learning and evaluate and develop courses with other departments based on these assessments."

The Theme: "Educator as Transformative Professional"

The second area of concern is the theme of the Knowledge Base program: "Educator as Transformative Professional." Jeanne Hites put it this way: "Our graduates, who become educators, will be required to take knowledge, transform it, and make it personally relevant so that their students will be enthused enough to become lifelong learners."

How it is Composed

The third area of concern is how to describe the composition of this program. To many, the crucible is a comfortable analogy which describes the component parts of the Knowledge Base program. The bottom of the crucible represents one's personal knowledge. From this base, one side of the crucible is constructed by intergrating multiple perspectives. For example, there is more than one way to look at any topic. The other side is constructed by collaborating multiple disciplines. For example, more than one field of study may be needed to understand a concept or idea. Inside the crucible, each person's unique combination of experiences and studies allows that person to arrive at diverse ways of constructing knowlege and passing it on to others in understandable ways.


Diversity in Curriculum


Another area of concern is a student's ability to recognize diversity. Jeanne Hites stated, "We want students to capitalize on one another's differences, because people who solve prolems together--aware of multiple perspectives-are better prepared for life." The purpose of the program is not meant to limit or conform the curriculum to a standard "core", but is left up to faculty in cooperation with their departments

and the college as a whole to develope and refine the base knowledge required of each SCSU student.

An Involved Faculty

Diversity among faculty has also played an major role in the creation of the Knowledge Base. Richard Johnson commented, "I'm impressed with the creativity and energy generated by our faculty. There is tremendous excitement about our program and great interest is shown by other faculties and institutions from around the state." Jeanne Hites concludded, "This collaboration helped us realize the tremendous rich faculty we have-- interested in providing quality education."






Michaels Track I

Lynne Michaels is Librarian I-Reference Librarian at the Information Center at the Park Grove Branch for the Washington County Library. Lynne's area of emphasis is on cable television.

Lynne received her B.A. in Theater from SCSU, and worked as a library clerk and ultimately she wanted to advance her position, but his required advanced degree work. Lynne found the SCSU/MELSA partnership appealing because it brought library courses to the Twin Cities metro area. The only other alternative for degree work at the time was St. Catherine's which was very expensive.

Lynne has observed that technology and Internet are having quite an impact. "While we can see the possibilities as being endless for their use, the powers in charge are having a difficult time nailing down the practiced applications for today. Its almost as if you cannot see the forest through the trees," says Lynne.

Lynne offers this advice to current graduate students, "While there have been significant curriculum changes in Track I. I still recommend pushing the envelope of possibilities for assignments and experience." Lynne also believes that students should not hesitate to discuss alternative assignments with the instructor. As Lynne puts it, "As undergraduates we learned how to follow the rules. As graduate students we need to learn how to interpret the rules not only to attain the grades we want but to get the most benefit from the experiences along the way."



Schnabel Track II

Jerry Schnabel is Media Director of Fillmore Central High School in Harmony, Minnesota where he is responsible for teaching video production classes and writing grants. His appointments consists of: Staff Development Chair, District Internet Contact, District P.E.R. Coordinator and Academic Achievement Advisor.

After completing his B.A. in music at St. John's University, Jerry was inspired by this exciting occupation as exemplified by Dennis Fields and so matriculated to SCSU. However, during a two-year stay in Berkley, California, Jerry worked as the manager of an audio video center in a graduate school, but soon resumed his studies at SCSU.

Jerry notes that the most obvious change has been the introduction of computers to the media center. "When I began in Harmony five years ago, students were still using the old card catalogue and print en-cyclopedias and reference materials. Now, in additional to the print re-sources, we use on-line and CD-ROM encyclopedias and reference materials. The electronic card catalogue has completely replaced the old card catalogue."

Jerry advises current and future media students to join the Minnesota Educational Media Organization now and to get involved in professional organizations. Moreover, Jerry urges students and professionals to stay literate in all forms of information media--print, computer, video, and multimedia.



Osendorf -Track III

Vicki Osendorf is Training Specialist for Banker's Systems Inc. in St. Cloud where she is in partnership with client groups to design and deliver training programs to meet training needs.

Vicki obtained her B.A. from the College of St. Benedict in Social Work and Pastoral Ministry. Impressed with the SCSU faculty and the diversity of program content, she knew her degree from SCSU would take her far. And Vicki believes that her opportunities working with group projects and learning how to work with diverse personalities has prepared her well for the "real world."

Because of her strong desire to work with people through education, she has fulfilled a life-long goal by encouraging ongoing learning with people in their work experiences. Vicki has recently experienced a major shift in training focus since Banker's Systems hired a new corporate training manager this past fall. "We moved from responding to topical needs such as time or stress management to rolling out core programs to the entire company on interaction/performance manage-ment. It helps all employees see how they can make a difference individually."

Vicki believes that all professional trainers should espouse themselves to as many different training opportunities as possible, especially through group work with local companies. As Vicki put it, "Learn as much as you can!"

IM 584 Seminar: IBM for Macintosh Users


