Immunization Requirement

The Minnesota State Legislature has passed an immunization law (MS135.A14) that requires students attending educational institutions in Minnesota to show proof of immunity to measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, and tetanus. Students who were born before 1957, are enrolled in only one class or are enrolled in extension classes are exempt from this law.

Anyone enrolled for more than one class summer quarter who fails to submit the required information to the University Health Services by will not be allowed to advance register for the next quarter. Forms are available from Health Services, Hill Hall.

Information about Registration

PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

You must read all directions before you attempt to register. All registrations and/or drops/adds must be done using a touchtone telephone. (See directions for exceptions.) You are responsible for all transactions and adjustments to your class schedule and all financial and academic consequences that result from that schedule. You are responsible for all charges associated with phone calls. Calls may be monitored/recorded for security and evaluations. Unauthorized use of the registration system may result in criminal prosecution. A student who tampers or attempts to tamper with the registration of another student may be subject to disciplinary action and/or criminal prosecution.

WHAT IS TOUCHTONE REGISTRATION?

Touchtone registration is one component of the Office of Records and Registration's voice response system. The voice response system will allow you to add classes, drop classes, verify your class schedule, search for open classes, and confirm your assigned registration time using a touchtone telephone. Take a few minutes to read the instructions in the quarterly Class Schedule, become familiar with the system's features, and refer to the registration worksheet each time you wish to drop or add a class.

The voice response system will work effectively for the user who is well prepared to use the system. The first use of the system will be to add (register for) classes. It is important that the following steps be followed for a successful registration.

Step 1. Carefully read all instructions in the quarterly Class Schedule. Your academic adviser will be able to answer your questions regarding academic requirements and the Office of Records and Registration personnel will be able to answer your questions on the "HELP" line regarding registration procedures.

Step 2. Select your desired classes for the term. The *General Bulletin* and General Education Check List are helpful when selecting required classes for undergraduate programs. You are responsible for knowing specific class restrictions, such as admission to major, minimum grade point average, minimum number of credits, permission form required, etc. These restrictions are listed in the *General Bulletin* or quarterly Class Schedule. The *Graduate Bulletin*, adviser or personnel in the Office of Graduate Studies should be consulted for graduate program requirements.

Step 3. Complete the working schedule form found in the quarterly Class Schedule. Alternate *classes* rather than alternate *sections* of first choice classes should also be recorded.

Step 4. If you are currently enrolled and wish to register for the next term, you must see your academic adviser if you are not yet admitted to a major program. The adviser will make certain the classes recorded on the working schedule are appropriate for your intended major or minor or that the classes will satisfy general education requirements. You are expected to make an appointment to see your adviser at least two days before your earliest time to register. Your adviser will

have your registration permit which will indicate your registration access code.

Step 5. Check the Registration Timetable for your earliest registration time. The registration time is listed on the registration permit for students not officially admitted to a major as well as in the instruction section of the quarterly Class Schedule. Registration is permitted any time after the published time.

Step 6. Complete the registration worksheet found in the quarterly Class Schedule. The worksheet will provide step-by-step instructions on how to use the touchtone registration system. The worksheet should be consulted each time you wish to access the voice response system.

Step 7. All financial and academic "holds" must be cleared to add classes. You will receive a billing for any outstanding financial obligations. Since it may take up to three days for "holds" to be removed, it is important that you pay all financial obligations as soon as the obligation becomes due. A late payment will mean a delay in processing "add" transactions.

Step 8. For the best possible class selection, you should call the touchtone registration telephone number as soon as possible after your earliest registration time. If you experience a busy signal, try again since there will be a minimum of thirty telephone lines available for the voice response system. Do not call before your earliest registration time because these calls will prohibit others from using the voice response system.

HOW DOES TOUCHTONE REGISTRATION WORK?

All entries are made on a touchtone telephone.

If you wish to add a class, you will press "2". The voice response will ask you to enter seven digits; the department number, class number and section number. The voice response will indicate if the class was added. See **Adding Classes**.

If you wish to drop a class, you will press "3". The voice response will ask you to enter seven digits; the department number, class number and section number. The voice response will indicate if the class was dropped. See **Dropping Classes**.

If you wish to speak to someone when you need assistance, you will press "4" (which stands for help). You may also call 255-3936 for help without accessing the voice response system. The Help line will be available 8:00-4:30, Monday-Friday. **WARNING:** When you enter "4" you are leaving the touchtone registration system and must redial if you wish to process additional transactions.

If you wish to obtain a listing of your class schedule, you will press "5." The voice response system will list all scheduled classes as well as times and location.

If you wish a list of all voice response functions, you will press "6."

If you wish to search for an open class or see if a specific section is open, you will press "7" (S). The voice response system will list all open sections and meeting times, and if the section conflicts with your current schedule of classes.

If you wish to terminate your call, you will press "8."

If you wish to drop or withdraw from all classes in your schedule, you will press "9."

If you wish the touchtone registration system to repeat the last message, you will press "*" (the star * symbol twice).

If you wish to cancel the current input because you made an error or changed your mind do not hang up, you will press "*" (the star * symbol and then the pound # symbol). This will work only if you have not completed the entire entry. This will be used anytime between Step 1 and Step 5A on the worksheet.

If you wish to cancel the current input because you made an error or changed your mind and wish to return to an action code, you will press "*"8*" (the star * symbol, 8 key, and the star * symbol). This will work only if you have not completed the entire entry. This will be used anytime after you have entered Step 6 on the worksheet.

It is important to know that you may interrupt some of the voice responses by entering an action code. However, we suggest that you listen to the entire message for all functions, except possibly the search function. If you wish to interrupt the search since you do not require a listing of any additional open sections, simply enter any action code; for instance, press "2" to add a class.

GENERAL INFORMATION

PROPER REGISTRATION IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY. Advisers are assigned to assist in the selection of courses, but the ultimate RESPONSIBILITY RESTS WITH YOU. Read this class schedule and refer to the General Bulletin to insure that you are using correct course numbers and have met prerequisites, general education, major and minor requirements. Please read all directions carefully; it will save you time. The university reserves the right to withdraw or modify any course including the change of instructors or time and place of class meetings.

ACADEMIC PROBATION

Students on academic probation spring quarter may not register for summer quarter until June 5, 1992.

ACCESS CODE

If you are currently enrolled in day classes and not yet officially admitted to a major, you must receive a permit to register from your adviser before you attempt to register. Your registration permit will indicate your earliest registration time (See *Registration Timetable*) as well as your four-digit access code. The access code is used only once each term and is not required after May 15, 1992.

ADDING CLASSES (Registration)

WARNING! You are responsible for all transactions and/or adjustments to your class schedule. Please do not add (register for) more classes than you plan to complete. This will deny other students entry to that class. You must use a touchtone telephone to add (register for) a class for summer quarter.

To add a class you will use action code "2." After entering "2" enter the two-digit department number, three-digit class number and two-digit section number. The voice response will indicate if the class was added or the reason why it was not added.

The system has an automatic drop feature. If you add a different section of an already scheduled class, the duplicate (first) section will be automatically dropped. For example, if you are currently enrolled in BIOL 101, section 4, and wish to add section 6, it will not be necessary to drop section 4 before attempting to add section 6. Simply use the add ("2") feature adding section 6. If that section is open and does not create a time conflict with an already scheduled class, section 6 will be added and section 4 will be automatically dropped from your class schedule. A message will verify the transaction.

ADMISSIONS

New undergraduate students must submit an application for admission. Write the Office of Admissions, 115 Administrative Services Building, St. Cloud State University, 720 Fourth Avenue South, St. Cloud, MN 56301-4498.; Phone 612-

255-2243, or contact your high school counselor for admission information and materials. The Admissions Office welcomes prospective students who wish to tour the campus and/or visit with an admission counselor.

New graduate students must write to the Office of Graduate Studies for admission information and materials. Write the Office of Graduate Studies, St. Cloud State University, 720 Fourth Avenue South, St. Cloud, MN 56301-4498; Phone 612-255-2113.

New students not pursuing a degree at St. Cloud State University are automatically classified as a special student. The data form in back of class schedule will serve as the admission form for special students. These students will begin registration on April 22 using the last two digits of their social security number to determine their earliest registration time.

ADVISING

All undergraduate students enrolled in day classes spring quarter who have not been officially admitted to a major program of study must confer with their faculty adviser if registering before May 18. Students should have the working schedule form completed before seeing their adviser. Faculty advisers will give students a permit to register which indicates the earliest registration time and the registration access code which is required to add classes before May 18, 1992. See your adviser at least two days before your earliest registration time.

Students who are on "academic probation" spring quarter may not register before June 5 for summer quarter. Students on "normal progress" probation may follow the Registration Timetable for summer quarter.

ARRANGED CLASSES

Arranged classes (not regularly scheduled) and independent study classes require a form completed by the instructor of the classes. The touchtone registration system may not be used to add (register for) these classes. Contact registration personnel in the Administrative Services Building, Room 117. All other adds (registrations) must be done using a touchtone telephone.

AUDITING

If you are auditing a class (enrolling for no credit) you must register using the "Help" line.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

If you change your address at any time, you must complete a Change of Address Form in the Office of Records and Registration, Administrative Services Building, Room 120, or write to that office indicating your name, social security number, new address, and where you want your grades sent. You must sign your request.

CLASS LOAD

Two summer terms are equivalent to one quarter. The maximum load for a graduate student (any student registered for a graduate course) is 16 credits, not to exceed 9 credits in any one summer term. All undergraduate students accepted in a major program or intending to major in a program wishing to register for more than 10 credits per term must secure permission in advance of registration from their college dean. All undergraduate students undecided about a major must secure permission for more than 10 credits per term from the Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs.

COLLEGE OF BUSINESS REQUIREMENTS

A student must be admitted to pre-business or be admitted to a major and have a 2.5 GPA to enroll in Accounting 291, 292, 293; BCIS 150, 240 and 241; Marketing 235. The major need not be offered by the College of Business. To enroll in 300 and 400 level courses offered by the College of Business a student must be admitted to a major, (any major) and have completed 80 credits prior to spring quarter, 1992, and have a 2.65 GPA. Students admitted to a major or minor requiring 300-400 level business courses may apply for an exemption from the department chairperson in the College of Business if they do not have a 2.65 GPA. BEOA 419 and MGMT 368 are exempt from these rules.

CO-REQUISITE

If a course lists a co-requisite you must also register for that class. You must contact the "Help" line to register for a class with a co-requisite.

DEPARTMENT NUMBER

Each department and/or program is assigned a number which must be entered when requested to add, drop, or search for open classes. Enter the two-digit department number, three-digit class number, and two-digit section number when requested by the touchtone registration system.

DROPPING (WITHDRAWING) FROM CLASSES

You may drop a class anytime BEFORE June 9 for first summer term or July 14 for second summer term and either not pay for the class or receive a full refund. See **Refund** for additional information. To drop a class enter an action code of "3," the two-digit department, three-digit class number and two-digit section number when requested by the touchtone registration system. Classes dropped before June 9 for first summer term or July 14 for second summer term will not appear on the transcript since no payment will be made for these classes. Classes dropped (withdrawn) on June 9 through July 6 for first summer term and July 14 through August 10 for second summer term will be recorded as a "W" and requires full payment of tuition and fees.

For part term classes the drop must be processed before 80% of the class meeting days have elapsed. To drop (withdraw) all classes enter a "9" when the touchtone registration system requests an action code. **WARNING:** Withdrawing from all classes may result in a financial obligation to the University if you are living in the residence halls or receiving a grant, scholarship, loan or other financial aid. Contact the Business Office, Administrative Services Building, Room 122, for further information.

ELEMENTARY EDUCATION MAJORS

A student must be a new transfer student spring or summer quarter or have a grade point average of 2.50 or higher to be scheduled in the following classes: ED 220, 323, 340, 346, 371 372, 399, 499; ART 296; PE 392; HETS 498; MATH 250; MUSE 201; SSCI 320; IND 321; BIOL 326; CHEM 327; HIST 346 or GEOG 376.

ELIGIBLE STUDENTS

ALL REGISTRATION FOR SUMMER QUARTER MUST BE DONE USING A TOUCHTONE TELEPHONE. The registration file has listed all students who have been accepted for admission for the coming term as well as all students who have attended St. Cloud State University since Fall, 1973. New freshmen and new transfer students will receive registration information by mail prior to the beginning of the quarter. You must complete a Data Information Form if you have not been accepted for admission for summer quarter and wish to be a special (non-degree) student or if you have not registered for classes at St. Cloud State University since Fall, 1973. Complete the Data Information Form found in the back of this booklet.

ERRORS-Don't Hang Up!!!

If you make an entry error DO NOT HANG UP. If you hang up, you will not lose any of your scheduled classes but will have to enter the touchtone registration system again. Therefore, to cancel your current input before completing all numbers requested for that "field" simply enter "*" (See action code menu on the worksheet.) If you have already entered an action code and wish to cancel your current input enter "8." You will return to an action code command. (See

action code menu on the worksheet). You are responsible for all entries to your schedule. Therefore, make certain you ask for a list of your scheduled classes when you "terminate" your call.

FEE PAYMENT

See *Fee Payment Information* section.

FINAL EXAM

Contact instructor for final exam information.

GRADING OPTION

SU/REQ = Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory grading is required.

Either = Student has the option of electing a S/U grade or the conventional letter grade. This option must be made by the end of the second class meeting. All other classes will be graded on the A, B, C, D, F system.

GRADUATION

Students wishing to graduate summer quarter, 1992 must submit an application for graduation by July 17 to the Office of Records and Registration if they wish to have their name appear in the commencement program. (Graduate students will submit applications to the Graduate Office.) Since this form may be completed anytime before July 17, students are urged to do this during spring quarter. No applications will be accepted after July 31.

HOLDS

Students who have a past due financial obligation payable to the University or the Bookstore may not add (register for) classes. Make certain all past due financial obligations are satisfied at least three working days before your earliest registration time.

LIST OF CLASS SCHEDULE

You may request a listing of your scheduled classes by entering action code "5" at any time. This feature should always be used when terminating your call since you are responsible for the accuracy of your class schedule. This feature may be used anytime to confirm your class schedule as well as meeting times and location. You should record your schedule of classes since printed copies will not be available. Write down your schedule as it is being listed when you exit (terminate) the voice response system.

MAJOR STUDENTS ONLY

To enroll in courses listed as MAJOR STUDENTS ONLY, you must be officially admitted to a major, minor or program in that department.

MESSAGE OVERRIDE

The touchtone registration system will give you step-by-step recorded instructions. Once you become familiar with the system, you may not want to wait for each recorded message. You can override the recording by entering the appropriate codes anytime after the message has begun playing. The system will respond to your request immediately. We suggest you always listen to your class schedule.

NON-ATTENDANCE

If you register for a class(es) and stop attending without officially dropping or withdrawing from the class(es), you will be responsible for payment of the class(es) and receive a grade of "F" for the class(es).

PERMISSION FORM REQUIRED

Permission of the department chairperson is needed for all classes listed as "Permission Form Required." Forms are available from the department chairperson and must be submitted in person to registration personnel, Administrative Services Building, Room 117.

PERSONAL ID NUMBER

The month and year of your birth will be your personal ID number for touchtone registration purposes. Other individuals may be aware of your personal ID number. Therefore, if you wish to select a different four-digit ID number, report to Administrative Services Building, Room 117, to change this number. Your student ID card (a picture ID) or a driver's license will be required for identification purposes to make this change.

PRE-PROFESSIONAL SKILLS TEST

You must have completed the PPST to register for upper division (300-400 level) classes designed specifically for teacher education programs. For additional information contact the Dean's Office, College of Education, Education Building A110.

PRE-REQUISITE

An asterisk (*) behind the department name indicates there is a pre-requisite for the course which is listed in the *General Bulletin* or the *Graduate Bulletin*. You must have the instructor's permission to register for a class if you are not currently registered for or have completed the pre-requisite.

PRIORITY REGISTRATION

Priority registration is granted for the following groups of students: students with disabilities, students admitted to graduate level programs, students admitted to the North Hennepin Nursing program, and students admitted to the honors program with 44 credits completed who have been "approved" by the director of honors. Students in the above groups may register at the time indicated on the registration timetable or anytime after that time. If students with disabilities need assistance with registration, please contact the Office of Records and Registration, Administrative Services Building, Room 117.

REBATES FOR INTERNS AND STUDENT TEACHERS

Interns and student teachers may apply for a rebate of a portion of the student union and activities fees they have paid if their duty station is located more than fifty (50) miles from St. Cloud (as defined by the State of Minnesota Mileage Chart). The rebate forms are available in the Administrative Services Building, Room 117. The Rebate Request Form must be returned to AS-117 no later than the final day of the student teaching or internship assignment.

SEARCH FOR OPEN CLASSES

You may search for open sections of a class by entering an action code of "7". The voice response will indicate up to five open sections and if an open section conflicts with any other class in your class schedule.

TERM CODE

You will be asked to enter a term code. For first summer term enter "1," for second summer term enter "2." You may register for both terms on the same telephone call. Enter a "1" for the term code for first summer term. Complete all transactions for first summer term. Enter "2" (for second summer term) when asked if you wish to request another term. If you enter an incorrect "inactive" term code, you will be asked to enter the correct term code. If you enter an incorrect "active" term code, you must enter an "8" to terminate that term and an additional "8" to be allowed to enter the correct term code.

TIME CONFLICTS

You must not schedule a time conflict (two courses meeting at the same time) without written permission from one of the department chairpersons involved. Submit the permission form in person to registration personnel in the Administrative Services Building, Room 117.

TIME LIMITS

There is a ten minute time limit for each call to the touchtone registration system. If no entry is made within 45 seconds, the call will also be terminated. Therefore, it is imperative that you use the time on the system efficiently.

TOUCHTONE TELEPHONE

A touchtone telephone must be used to register for classes summer quarter. Any touchtone telephone may be used if not utilizing a "pulse" phone line. If you do not have access to a touchtone telephone, two telephones are available for registration in the visitor's area in the Administrative Services Building across the hall from Room 118 and in Atwood Center. Any touchtone telephone may be used. However, you will find a touchtone telephone with the key pad in the receiver (Cordless, Princess, Slimline) very difficult to use. You must listen and enter data at the same time.

VARIABLE CREDIT

A course listed with VR credit means the course may be taken for variable credit. The number of credits must be approved by the instructor and department chairperson. Forms are available from the department chairperson and must be submitted to registration personnel in the Administrative Services Building, Room 117.

REGISTRATION TIMETABLE

(April 6-24)

Registration is scheduled by priority and credit hours completed. Do not attempt to enter the touchtone registration system before your scheduled time to register. This will prohibit other students from using the touchtone registration system.

State and Federal laws do not allow the Office of Records and Registration to release your registration time via the telephone. Do not call requesting your registration time. A written request will be answered. No one will be allowed to process an add before their earliest scheduled registration time. You may add (register) anytime AFTER your earliest scheduled registration time.

Registration by priority and credit hours completed ends on April 24. A TOUCHTONE TELEPHONE MUST BE USED DURING THIS TIME. ALL ADDS AFTER JUNE 8 FOR FIRST SUMMER TERM AND JULY 13 FOR SECOND SUMMER TERM MUST BE PROCESSED IN ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES BUILDING, ROOM 117. LATE FEES WILL APPLY.

Services

University Housing

Single and double rooms for men, women and married couples are available in the residence halls. Approximate rates will be \$150.00 per person/per session—double room, \$185.00 per person/per session—single room. Daily rates are \$9.00 for a double room and \$12.00 for a single room. These rates are subject to change by action of the State University Board. The residence halls will open for occupancy beginning at 1:00 p.m. Sunday, June 7, and will remain open for both summer terms. If you are interested in reserving a room in a residence hall you may write directly to the Director of Housing, Carol Hall, St. Cloud State University, 720 South 4th Avenue, St. Cloud, MN 56301-4498, or phone 612-255-2166 for the necessary application materials. During the summer terms, reservations are for residence hall rooms only. Students should furnish personal items including pillows, linens and blankets for a twin size bed. Food service is available at Atwood Center on a cash a la carte basis. The halls also provide small kitchen units which are available for snack preparation. Room refrigerators may be rented.

Financial Aid

Summer financial aid eligibility is based on application materials submitted for the previous academic year. A separate summer application is required; these are available in the Office of Scholarships and Financial Aid the end of March. Students may be eligible to receive the following types of aid:

- 1) Stafford Loan
- 2) Parent Loan (PLUS)
- 3) Supplemental Loan to Students (SLS)
- 4) Student Educational Loan Fund (SELF)
- 5) Minnesota State Grant
- 6) Pell Grant
- 7) Work Study Employment

Pell Grant and Minnesota State Grant funds may be available to students who have not used their full eligibility (three full-time quarters) from the preceding award year. Students who have used their full eligibility from the preceding year will not receive these grants in the summer.

Students must be enrolled at least half time to be eligible to receive any of the above types of aid. Regulations stipulate that a student must be accepted into a degree or certificate program in order to be eligible to receive aid. Students must attend first summer session in order to receive aid.

Students with five or less credits may apply for Minnesota Part-Time Grant assistance.

St. Cloud State University Campus Child Care Center

St. Cloud State University's Campus Child Care Center enrolls children aged infant (2-15 months), toddler (16-30 months) and preschool (31 months-5 years). During the summer sessions, services are available from 6:45 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday.

The Center is licensed by the MN Department of Human Services to serve 57 full-time equivalent children. *There is high demand for these limited spaces* however, and currently enrolled children have an enrollment priority for the next quarter. **Make your arrangements early.**

Fee Payment Information

Advance Registration. (April 6-May 8) Fee statements for 1st and 2nd summer terms will be mailed on May 11, 1992 to the local address on file. Students are responsible for having the correct address on file. Address changes are made in the Records Office AS120. All students have the option of paying the full amount of tuition and fees charged or a minimum of \$100.00 by May 27 for first term classes and by July 1 for second term classes to reserve the class schedule. If payment is not received by May 27 for the first term and July 1 for the second term, the class schedule will be cancelled.

Registration/adding classes.

First term: REGISTRATION FROM MAY 11 THROUGH MAY 15: Fee statements will be mailed on May 18 for all registrations entered from May 11 through May 15 for first summer term. Payment for tuition must be received by May 27 to reserve classes scheduled. If payment is not received by May 27, the class schedule will be cancelled.

REGISTRATION MAY 15 THROUGH JUNE 8: Tuition and fees for all first summer term classes registered after May 15 will be due on June 12. Fee statements WILL NOT BE MAILED. If adding to a schedule received before May 15, these classes will not be canceled for non-payment. If this is the first registration for the first summer term, payment must be received by June 12. If payment is not received by June 12, classes will be canceled for non-payment.

REGISTRATION AFTER JUNE 8: Payment for tuition and fees in full for all first term classes must be received at the time of registration.

Second Term: REGISTRATION MAY 11 THROUGH JUNE 19: A billing will be mailed on June 22 for all registrations entered from May 11 through June 19 for second summer term. Payment for tuition must be received by July 1 to reserve classes scheduled. If payment is not received by July 1, the class schedule will be canceled.

REGISTRATION JUNE 20 THROUGH JULY 13: Tuition and fees for all second summer term classes registered from June 20 through July 13 will be due on July 17. Fee statements WILL NOT BE MAILED. If adding to a schedule received before June 19, these classes will not be canceled for non-payment. If this is the first registration for the second summer term, payment must be received by July 17. If payment is not received by July 17, classes will be canceled for non-payment.

REGISTRATION AFTER JULY 13: Payment for tuition and fees in full for all second term classes must be received at the time of registration.

Refunds

Policy on the Use of Drugs and Alcohol

St. Cloud State University

I. Introduction

St. Cloud State University recognizes that the unlawful possession, use or distribution of alcohol and other drugs is a significant social problem with a potential for causing severe effects to SCSU's work force and student population. SCSU recognizes that drug dependency may be an illness. Consistent with this understanding, however, SCSU has an obligation to ensure that its employees perform their jobs efficiently, safely, and in a professional business-like manner. Additionally, SCSU has an obligation to ensure that its students maximize their educational opportunities in an open, supportive environment.

The purpose of this document is to set forth SCSU's policy regarding alcohol and other drug use by its students and employees. It is a compilation of excerpts from the Policy On Alcohol And Other Drug Use By State Employees, Alcoholic Beverages and Drug Policies as outlined in the *Student Handbook*, the Residence Hall Policies and the NCAA Regulations.

II. Scope of Coverage

This policy is applicable to all students and employees of SCSU. Questions regarding the policy should be addressed to the Associate Dean of Students, the Director of Personnel, or the Special Assistant to the President.

III. Effects of Alcohol

Alcohol consumption causes a number of marked changes in behavior. Even low doses significantly impair the judgment and coordination required to drive a car safely, increasing the likelihood that the driver will be involved in an accident. Low to moderate doses of alcohol also increase the incidence of a variety of aggressive acts, including spouse and child abuse. Moderate to high doses of alcohol cause marked impairments in higher mental functions, severely altering a person's ability to learn and remember information. Very high doses cause respiratory depression and death. If combined with other depressants of the central nervous system, much lower doses of alcohol will produce the effects just described.

Repeated use of alcohol can lead to dependence. Sudden cessation of alcohol intake is likely to produce withdrawal symptoms, including severe anxiety, tremors, hallucination, and convulsions. Alcohol withdrawal can be life threatening. Long-term consumption of large quantities of alcohol, particularly when combined with poor nutrition can also lead to permanent damage to vital organs such as the brain and liver.

Mothers who drink alcohol during pregnancy may give birth to infants with fetal alcohol syndrome. These infants have irreversible physical abnormalities and mental retardation. In addition, research indicates that children of alcoholic parents are at greater risk than other youngsters of becoming alcoholics.

IV. Prohibitions and Reporting Duties

While persons who are at least 21 years old may possess or consume alcoholic beverages in a legal manner away from campus, *no* person may possess or consume alcohol on State property other than on those special occasions when a non-profit group may obtain and use a special license and permit. A person or organization is prohibited from accepting donations or charging for alcoholic beverages served off-campus without the required liquor license. No person on a city street, sidewalk or parking area shall consume, dispense or possess uncapped containers of any alcoholic beverage including 3.2 beer. Off-campus purchase of a keg requires a city permit, property owner's permission for a permit and is limited to one keg per residence. Violation of any of these prohibitions and requirements is a misdemeanor.

No employee shall report to work under the influence of alcohol, marijuana, controlled substances, or other drugs which affect her/his alertness, coordination, reaction, response, judgment, decision-making or safety. No employee shall operate, use or drive any equipment, machinery or vehicle of the State while under the influence of alcohol, marijuana, controlled substances, or other mood-altering drugs. Such employee is under an affirmative duty to immediately notify her/his supervisor that he/she is not in appropriate mental or physical condition to operate, use or drive State equipment. No employee shall unlawfully manufacture, distribute, dispense, possess, transfer or use a controlled substance in the workplace or wherever the State's work is being performed. During work hours or while on the State's premises, no employee shall use, sell, possess or transfer alcoholic beverages, with the following exceptions:

- (1) consumption, possession, sale or purchase of alcohol when authorized by a Commissioner under separate statutory or executive agency authority;
- (2) possession of alcohol while being transported in a State vehicle in compliance with applicable statutory requirements;
- (3) possession of alcohol while in an employee's personal vehicle on the State's premises in compliance with applicable statutory requirements.

Additionally, employees shall not participate in these activities during rest breaks or during overtime work. Engaging in off-duty sale, purchase, transfer, use or possession of illegal drugs or controlled substances may have a negative effect on an employee's ability to perform her/his work for the State. In such circumstances, the employee is subject to discipline. When an employee is taking medically authorized drugs or other substances which *may alter job performance*,* the employee is under an affirmative duty to notify the appropriate supervisor of her/his temporary inability to perform the job duties of the position. Employees are discouraged from consuming alcoholic beverages during lunch or dinner meals when returning immediately thereafter to perform work on behalf of the State. Employees are advised that in any situation subsequent to the intake of alcohol where the employee must continue conducting the State's business,

any employee whose condition or behavior adversely affects her/his work performance shall be subject to possible discipline, up to and including discharge.

V. Consequences of Violation

Violations of this policy may constitute just cause for discipline. The University may confiscate or turn over to the civil authorities any alcohol, other drugs, drug paraphernalia, or any information regarding violation of this policy. Employees who violate this policy are subject to discipline including but not limited to oral reprimands, written reprimands, suspension and termination. Employees involved in the performance of a federal contract who are convicted under a criminal drug statute for a violation occurring in the workplace must notify SCSU within five days of the conviction and, in addition to being disciplined, will be required to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program. Students who violate this policy are subject to discipline including but not limited to community service, residence hall probation, removal from residence halls, warning probation, suspension and expulsion. Student athletes who violate this policy are also subject to being declared ineligible for play for the remainder of the season or for the rest of their SCSU academic career. Where appropriate, SCSU also may notify the appropriate licensing board or federal granting agency. Each situation will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis depending upon the severity and circumstances involved. The following information explains state and federal laws and penalties which civil authorities may impose:

Federal Penalties and Sanctions for Illegal Possession of a Controlled Substance

21 U.S.C. 844(a)

First conviction: Up to one year imprisonment and fined at least \$1,000 but not more than \$100,000 or both.

After one prior drug conviction; at least 15 days in prison, not to exceed 2 years and fined at least \$2,500 but not more than \$250,000 or both.

After 2 or more prior drug convictions: At least 90 days in prison, not to exceed 3 years and fined at least \$5,000 but not more than \$250,000, or both.

Special sentencing provisions for possession of crack cocaine: Mandatory at least five years in prison, not to exceed 20 years and fined up to \$250,000 or both, if:

- First conviction and the amount of crack possessed exceeds five grams.
- Second crack conviction and the amount of crack possessed exceeds three grams.
- Third or subsequent crack conviction and the amount of crack possessed exceeds one gram.

21 U.S.C. 853(a)(2) and 881(a)(7)

Forfeiture of personal and real property used to possess or to facilitate possession of a controlled substance if that offense is punishable by more than one year imprisonment. (See special sentencing provisions re: crack.)

21 U.S.C. 881(a)(4)

Forfeiture of vehicles, boats, aircraft or any other conveyance used to transport or conceal a controlled substance.

21 U.S.C. 844a

Civil fine of up to \$10,000 (pending adoption of final regulations).

21 U.S.C. 853(a)

Denial of Federal benefits, such as student loans, grants, contracts, and professional and commercial licenses up to one year for first offense, up to five years for second and subsequent offenses.

18 U.S.C. 922(g)

Ineligible to receive or purchase a firearm.

Miscellaneous

Revocation of certain Federal licenses and benefits, e.g. pilot licenses, public housing tenancy, etc. are vested within the authorities of individual Federal agencies.
