Dean's Corner


In April, library media specialists were introduced to a publication which bears mention here. *Information Power: Guidelines for School Media Programs*, prepared jointly by AECT and AASL, and published by ALA, provides a vision for developing and implementing quality programs (for puchase information, call ALA at 800-545-2433).

Every student attending an elementary or secondary school in the United States has a right to expect quality library media service. In this regard, the current period in history, dubbed the information age, places a weighty responsibility on the members of our profession. More and more people are asking for information, and the time allowed for delivery of that information is decreasing. So library media professionals are faced with ever increasing demands to identify and provide information to patrons with less elapsed time from request to delivery.

Efforts to fill the demands of patrons have forced library media specialists to turn to communication technology for solutions to perplexing service problems. While the introduction of new technologies into the library media service component has helped to improve service, it has also forced practitioners to possess additional knowledge and skills in order to be successful.

Library media practitioners through their professional organizations have searched for ways to help them adjust to the ever changing service spectrum. Experience has verified the notion which says that when a profession provides its constituents with guidelines to use in planning and providing service, the quality of service rises. Information Power has arrived; and in my opinion, the quality of library media service will improve in concert with its use. This edition of the guidelines provides a vision which will allow the creative minds of professionals to develop superior programs. Service requirements will continue to change but visionary professionals can continue to provide a focus for quality service in any setting.

The overriding message of the newly published guidelines is that library media professionals must provide leadership, and on that subject it supports a concept addressed by John Naisbett in Megatrends, "the new leader is a facilitator not an order giver." Information Power provides school library media professionals with the kind of knowledge and inspiration necessary to be successful in this continuously changing profession. This important book should become a working companion for every school library media professional.


The advanced administration course, required for media supervisor license, will focus on the larger unit such as the school district, college or university, and main public library. Projects and readings will reflect this approach.

What do people do on sabbaticals?



The purpose of my sabbatical leave winter quarter was to become familiar with SMPTE/EBU (Society of Motion Pictures and Television Engineers/European Broadcasting Union) time code videotape editing procedures.

The SMPTE/EBU code provides each video frame with its own unique identification, consisting of a binary pulse coded electronic signal. The code is recorded on videotape along with corresponding video and audio signals. It identifies each video frame by hour, minute, second, and frame.

This frame identification creates a faster search for the producer who wants to efficiently identify various program segments. If the master is dubbed onto another tape, both will have the same exact editing cuts —the precision will be there. Time code editing is a major improvement when compared to manual "crash" editing procedures that exist in many television facilities.

SMPTE/EBU time code plays a key role in making video and audio production values as high as they are today, and certainly provides improved accuracy in post-production processes.

Vaughn Communications (Minneapolis, MN) provided the editing facilities and equipment which allowed for my personal investigation of these concepts.


