

One of the very best bits of news that continues to come from the field is that there appears to be an abundance of library media openings. expecially in the metropolitan area. If you are interested in moving, please let us know when you might want to move and what your location preferences are. Also, if you have not kept an up-to-date placement file here at the University, it might be to your advantage to do so. Others in the field are also realizing the potential that media positions offer and we have seen an influx of good people into our beginning classes. example, the introductory class in the Cities this Spring Quarter has over twenty students interested in the Master's Degree or working for Media Generalist Licensure. All of the requests we get for candidates generally ask for persons who have the Media Generalist Licensure as minimum licensure. There is a definite need for the well-rounded media person, one who knows books, media, and technology.

Those of us teaching classes in the school library media field are always on the lookout for new developments. Two recently completed library media centers deserve your attention, one at Fairbault Junior High School and one at Robbinsdale Cooper High School. These reflect what needs to be done to give direction to today's library media world, a world which sees no hierarchy in the media when it comes to meeting the learning needs of students. If you are in the facilities business--planning new ones or remodeling old ones--these are places well worth a visit. Fairbault is especially strong in its incorporation of the newer technology into the entire school building.

Summer still offers an ideal time for continuing education, for beginning a master's program or for completing Media Generalist Licensure. We are offering quite an array of courses that meet the requirements for the Media Generalist Licensure endorsement, as well as classes that will get you started toward the masters. The

workshops offer some interesting topics for the practicing library media specialist--from books to micros. JimTrelease will headline the workshop entitled "Making Friends With Books" and will be supported by Jack Prelutsky. Many of the workshops are offered by practioners from the field who have consented to share their expertise with you. Pre-registration is not essential, but is advised--if you cannot pre-register, at least let us know of your interest in attending the workshops. MEMORIES OF ENGLAND

Living and teaching in England for one quarter is sometimes referred to as the "Castle Experience." As one who experienced it winter quarter I have an endless list of memories but will share only a few.

The students were terrific, bright and interesting and it was fun getting to know them and interact with them. Fun-loving and careful not to overdo the acedemic side of college life, 52 of them accompanied me on several museum visits and together we compiled a directory of museums. A course I taught on Information Technology in Britian provided the perfect excuse to investigate the British use of computers, online searching and information transfer.

Our four children attended the local public schools, so we had direct experience with the educational system. Wearing uniforms is part of the process and religion is not the taboo it is here. Emphasis is placed on verbal and written skills, with sentence and paragraph writing being taught from kindergarten on up. There are personal computers available for use in class, but support supplies and equipment are not as available as they are in Minnesota.

We toured England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland, enjoying the winter beauty and uniqueness of each country. Our memories of England, of life in the castle, the food, the students, staff, the Duke and Duchess and the countryside are all fond ones. I'd do it again. Just ask me about it.

Dennis Fields and Steve Koyama attended a conference on Improving Human Experience in San Francisco March 31 - April 5. Dr. Fields and Dr. James May of the Donn Corporation gave a presentation on "Training Sales Professionals to Walk in the Customer's Shoes to Commitment." Dr. Fields also gave a joint presentation with David Spates of Sperry Corporation on "Organization Location of Skills the end of February. Dr. Berling gave Training Function in the Large Manufacturing Corporation." Also attending the conference were three graduates of SCSU's Masters Program in Human Resource Training and Development: Paul Carlson and Roberta Leitzke from Comserv and Barb Schaer from the Sperry Corporation.

Tom Stachowski gave a presentation entitled "Computers in the Classroom: A Positive Approach" at the 10th Annual Conference of the Association Humanistic Education in Philadelphia on April 17. The presentation was designed to share strategies for developing cooperation. sharing and interaction with computers that encourage learning and to examine problem solving, simulation and tutorial software. The theme of the conference was "Shaping the Future Now," with futurist and author Jeremy Rifkin as keynote speaker.

Steve Koyama has gone to Chicago eight times since last fall in order to develop and deliver a two-day workshop for the Bell Communications Research Technical Education Center, a large training facility for Bell Companies such as Northwestern Bell, Southern Bell, Mountain Bell and New England Telephone. Approximately 10,000 students a year are instructed at the training center in short courses ranging from fiber optics to telephone systems of the future. Dr. Koyama's workshop was targeted at the course developers/instructors to help implement a job aid that he designed to facilitate media selection during the course development procedure.

The instructor guide and various other materials of this heavily mediated workshop can be adapted for several IM courses to provide real examples of business perspectives.

Dennis Fields and John Berling attended a joint meeting of the Wisconsin/Minnesota Educational Media Association in LaCross, WI at a presentation on Media Specialist Competencies in the Year 2000, and Dr. Fields gave a presentation on Program Evaluation.

Keith Ewing and Virginia Sorensen attended the Fourth Conference of College and Research Libraries in Baltimore, MD April 9-12. The theme of the conference was "Energies for Transition." Ms. Sorensen also attended a preconference workshop on "Teaching Methods for the Bibliographic Instruction Librarian."

Fred Hill has published an article entitled "Suzuki and Music: A Father's Perspective," in the Jan.-Feb., 1986 issue of Suzuki World. Dr. Hill has also co-authored an article with Dr. Robert Hauptman entitled "A New Perspective on Faculty Status." The article appears in the March, 1986 issue of College and Research Libraries Journal.





RETIREMENT PARTIES PLANNED


GENE CAMPBELL




