FROM THE DEAN'S CHAIR

Quite frequently those of us in higher education hear the cry that more courses should be taken off-campus to make it easier for graduate students to continue on with programs during the school year, to provide opportunities for development and improvement of skills, or to provide a means for teachers to gain renewal units for licensure. Attempts to do so have met with limited success, depending of course on various factors which influence the number of registrants--time of year, content of the course, night of the week, amount of work in the course, teacher of the class, frustration level of the potential student after a day's work, etc.

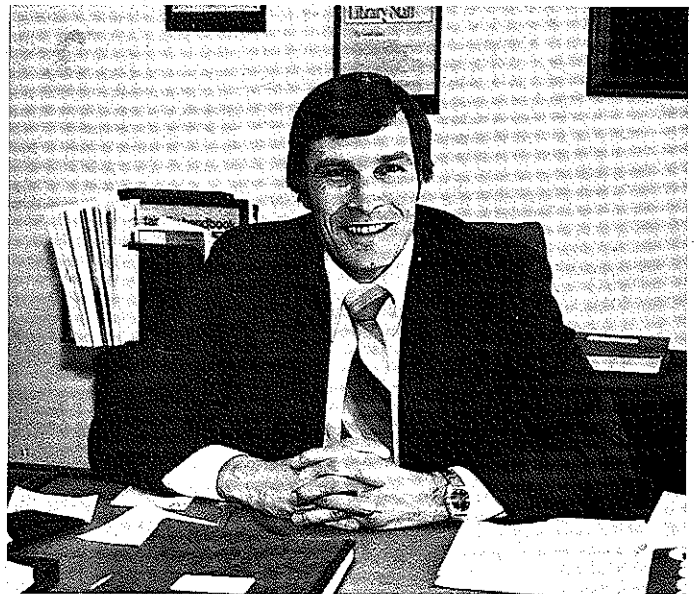
None of the above, whether they be reasons for offering the class or the factors that influence its having the required number of registrants, are very predictable and that has brought about problems that make it difficult to even consider offering classes. Quite frankly the help of people in the field is necessary if a successful program of off-campus courses is to be a reality. Your help in recruiting is paramount so that some guarantee can be made that a minimum number of registrants will be there for the first class. It's frustrating to prepare for a class, make a trip to a place like North Hennepin, and then have only eight persons express interest by attending the first session. Minimums have been established by the Continuing Education Office on campus which prohibits departments from offering off-campus classes for fewer than ten students--even that is marginal.

So where do we go from here? Our Center is open for suggestions. Our Center is in the process of initiating some off-campus programs and some success has been achieved in many of the attempts. For example, a microcomputer seminar in Osseo and St. Cloud attracted a total of some 80 students, and a computer seminar in Duluth conducted in part through telecommunications has 17 participants. So that's good for the microcomputer seminars, but what about some of the other courses that

can help teachers become better users of media centers and at the same time improve skills of the media center personnel? Classes like Contemporary Materials, Media for Teachers, etc. should be in constant demand--and in light of energy conservation, shouldn't off-campus courses be advisable? An experimental program of courses, offered at the University of North Dakota at their request over the last year, has had a fairly consist enrollment which has an established minimum of 15. It's difficult to build successful programs that far from home!

So there have been a number of successes, both on-campus and off-campus. Our total spring enrollment, bolstered by the large number of registrants in the microcomputer seminars, has been extremely rewarding. And yet a large number of our offerings in speciality areas--contemporary materials, recent trends, seminar in public libraries, administration of media have had to be cancelled.

Beginning next fall, the Center for Library and Audiovisual Education will initiate

a series of off-campus courses that deserve your support. A series of certification courses will be offered in Alexandria and at North Hennepin, with one class being offered each quarter throughout the year. Some of these courses will be good for administrators and teachers as well, and certainly many of them should be good for media generalist licensure. Also in Fall Quarter a Media for Teachers seminar is being scheduled for New London and Microcomputer Seminar at Brainerd. Other off-campus courses will be scheduled during the year which need your support, but please don't forget to support the on-campus courses that you might need to complete your graduate programs. We do need the on-campus enrollment as well! Whenever and wherever classes are offered, the Center needs your support through recruitment. The rewards should far exceed the effort!

DOCUMENTS LIBRARIANS MEET

The Depository Library Council of the Public Printer of the General Sales Government Printing Office met at a semi-annual meeting in St. Paul on April 28-30, 1980. The council is a fifteen-member group of librarians appointed by the Public Printer to advise the office in its handling of the depository library program of the Government Printing Office. The program provides access to all official government documents in a holding library either through deposit of the actual documents in a holding library or through an interlibrary loan network. Dick Busse, Government Documents Librarian at St. Cloud State, will be attending as a representative of Learning Resources. St. Cloud State's Learning Resources was designated as an official depository library in 1962 by the late Hubert Humphrey.

UNIVERSITY FACULTY NOTES

Students and graduates may be interested in knowing that President Charles Graham received a Distinguished Service Award in November from the St. Cloud Jaycees. Graham was named Outstanding Employer for 1979. Dr. Graham, who is currently finishing his leave of absence in Washington, was replaced in his absence by Dr. David C. Johnson, Academic Vice-President. Dr. Al Schelske, long time member of the College of Education and more recently the Associate Dean in that college, retired in November after a long tenure at St. Cloud State. Dr. Schelske now lives in Florida.

OVERDUE BOOKS POLICY CHANGED

Graduate students returning this summer should be aware of a change in the overdue books policy. Last fall a change was made and patrons are now assessed a \$5.00 late fee if the book is returned within three weeks of the due date, or \$20.00 if the book is not returned by that time. Students' records and registration are withheld to enforce this new policy.

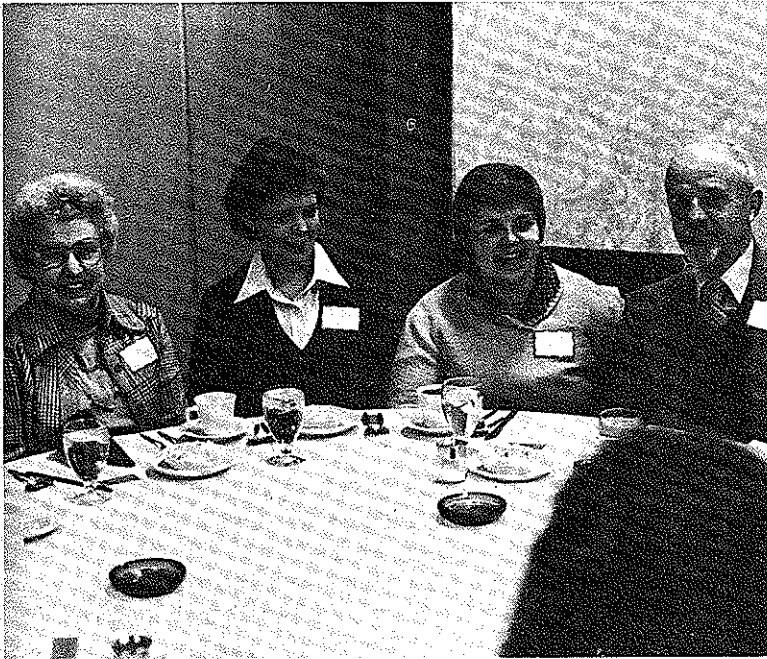
Since the policy was instituted to encourage the availability of materials to all students, the results have been encouraging. A larger percentage of materials are now being returned on time and the loss rate has dropped from nearly 500 books per quarter to 90 per quarter. Meanwhile, Winter Quarter set a new high record for the number of books circulated, a factor which would seem to indicate that the new policy is paying dividends and that patrons are becoming more responsible borrowers.

NEWS FROM INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

The past year has seen implementation of a new audio and video retrieval system in the ITS area. The high quality cassette recorders and videotape players are located behind the checkout desk where materials, requested by the patron, are placed on the equipment by student workers. The student then has remote control of the materials from the carrel. This manual retrieval system has replaced the electronic Random Access Information Retrieval System (RAIRS) originally scheduled with the new building in the early 70's. The audio system has received extensive use during Winter Quarter--over 1000 requests--and a similar growth is expected as more video programming becomes available.

The non-print reserve materials used by SCSU faculty members are placed in the ITS area. There has been an increasing use of this service since it was made available to the faculty, and older equipment has been replaced with quality equipment to increase the effectiveness of this vital service. During the Winter Quarter, over 9000 requests for non-print materials were processed (more than twice the number of requests for print reserve materials) and a steady increase has been noted. Entire courses have been taught by the use of media in this area on an individual study basis. The

future of this area looks bright, especially with the advent of more video programming and the expansion of microcomputer usage.

GREAT BRITAIN TOUR SCHEDULED

The Great Britain Teacher/Librarian Tour, under the direction of Tony Schulzetenberg and Dennis Fields, will begin with departure from Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport on June 22nd. After an overnight flight

the group will begin its 19 day Great Britain stay at Prestwick, Scotland. The tour will be highlighted by visits to places of historical, educational, social, religious, cultural, and political interest. It will provide participants the opportunity to gain experience in instructional development, in international living, in comparative education, in professional enrichment, and in personal understanding.

Each of the twenty-eight participants will be able to individualize his or her experience through individual exploration and study of particular fields of interest. A six-day stay at the University of Evansville's British Campus at Harlaxton (near Nottingham) allows time and opportunity for study of central, rural England, with side trips to Lincoln, Cambridge, Coventry, Warwick, Nottingham, and Stratford highlighting each day's activities. A six day trip to London, with an unstructured agenda allowing for independent study of the various educational experiences available in the British capital, follows the Harlaxton visit. A six-day tour of northern England, beginning at Oxford and Blenheim, and ending at Edinburgh, Scotland, will bring the students back to Prestwick for the return flight on July 11th. Stops at Manchester, York, and Durham will be scheduled for this part of the tour.

MULTI-COUNTY, MULTI-TYPE LIBRARY COOPERATION

Minnesota has been divided into seven multi-county, multi-type library cooperative regions. Roger Sween is secretary of the Advisory Committee in the central region. The twelve counties around St. Cloud have taken the name Central Minnesota Libraries Exchange.

The Minnesota multi-type experience has two unique features. Its program is one initiated by the legislature, which enacted it in May, 1979, without any departmental request; and it calls for a preliminary planning year. The Exchange will be spending these months determining how it should plan and in gathering information prior to establishing any cooperative programs. The cooperative areas which must be addressed under the law are resource sharing, a bibliographic data base, a delivery system, a communications systems, and program planning.

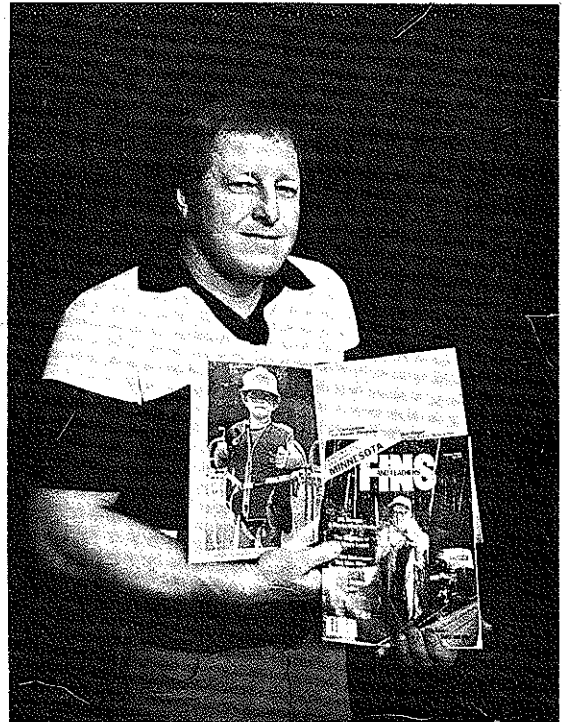
Libraries of all types are invited to participate in the planning. Over thirty libraries--5 academic, 2 public library systems, 20 school, and six special--are currently participating in the Exchange. About May 1st, the Exchange will hire a consultant for a six month period to facilitate the gathering of information about area resources and needs. From this information and the priorities given by the planning participants, a grant request will be written for the funds appropriated for the following year.

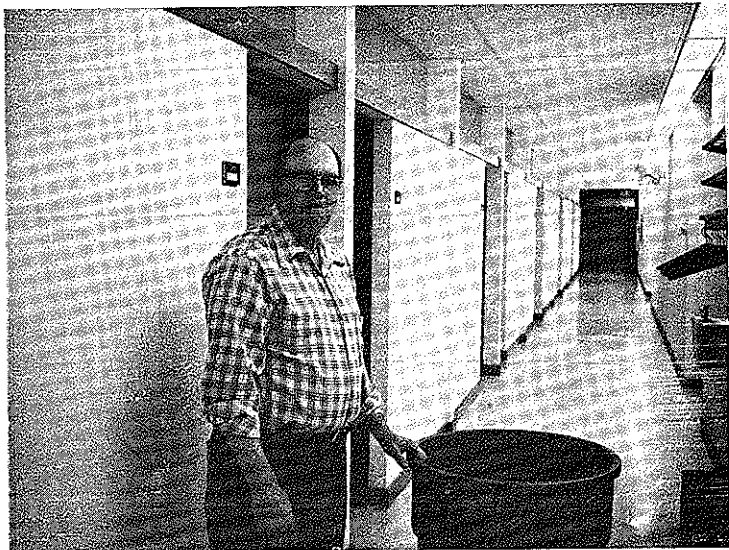

IN MEMORIAN

Adolph Meyer, custodian in Learning Resources and a St. Cloud State employee for the past 22 years, passed away at the St. Cloud Hospital on January 2, 1980. Adolph, who was the father of Gary who holds his Masters Degree in Media from St. Cloud State, will be remembered for his friendliness and for his willingness to help staff and students alike.

Ursula Emery, librarian at the Campus Laboratory School from 1966 to 1969 and holder of the Masters Degree in Media, died on December 30, 1979, in Eau Claire, Wisconsin. Ursula taught in the media department at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire until the time of her death.

Many readers will remember Jack Knutson, Professor of Psychology, who died in January. Jack taught the Theories of Learning class which was a required course for media personnel seeking licensure endorsement.

PERIODICALS SUBSCRIPTIONS EVALUATED

Over the last few years, increasing subscription prices and lack of additional funds have caused a serious problem at SCSU. It had become impossible to add new titles to the collection since any extra funds went to increased costs of maintaining the present collection.

During spring quarter, 1979, Learning Resources Services formed a committee to address the problem. The first step consisted of

developing preliminary criteria for evaluating periodicals. It was also necessary to create a computerized list of all current holdings held by each department. Reviews were given where possible, usage statistics were compiled, and high-usage MINITEX titles were noted.

In October, the committee was prepared to meet the colleges and department chairpersons. It was the responsibility of each department to review the titles assigned to them and to eliminate unused items of low priority. This was a critical step in the procedure, for without drastic cuts, few requests for new titles would be filled. The reaction by the departments was very positive. All but two departments responded. Most of those responding dropped numerous titles, which allowed us to add several high priority items for each department plus some high-usage MINITEX titles. Some of the new titles have been ordered, and as old titles expire, some more new titles will be ordered.

Positive comments have been made by faculty and also from some of the deans which more than makes the project worthwhile. It is anticipated that another review of the periodical collection will be initiated during the fall of 1981. Committee members were: Dick Busse, Marie Elsen, Phyllis Lacroix, Dave Rydberg, Virginia Sorensen, Roger Sween, and Jerry Westby.

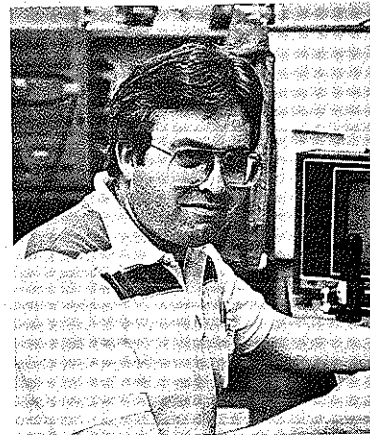
second degree. Phyllis Lacroix continues to work on her advanced degree at the University of Minnesota.

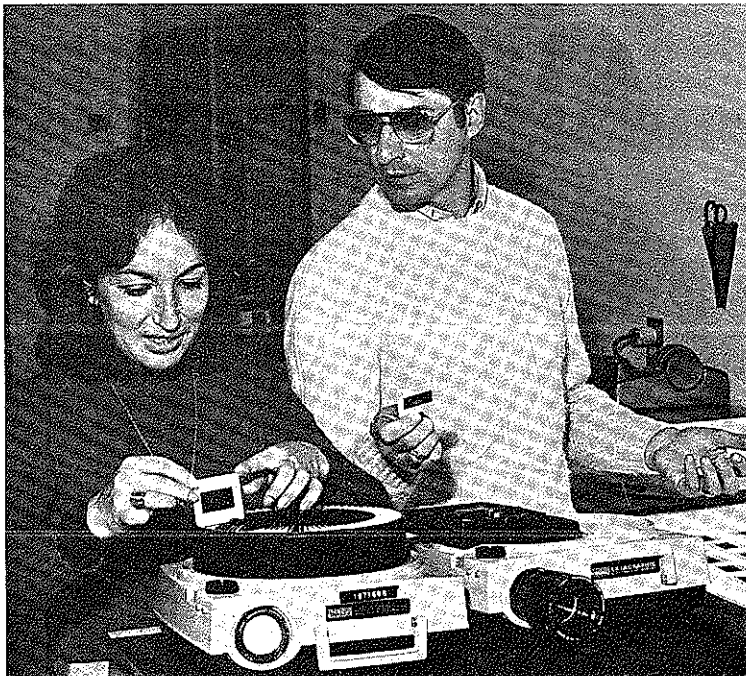

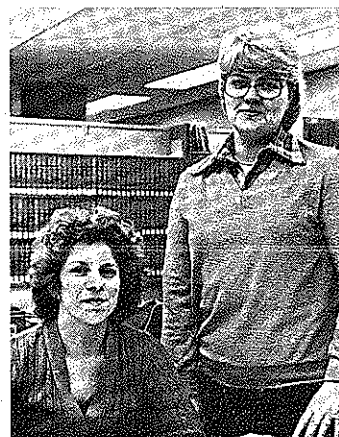

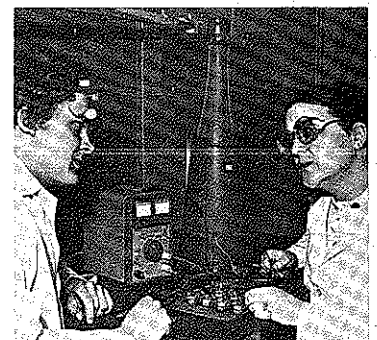
