FROM THE DEAN'S CHAIR


In a sense, austerity has never been a new word for people in education, but the recent budget slashes by government leaders in Minnesota have certainly had more than the usual impact on all levels of education. Personnel in the elementary and secondary schools have their own problems to handle in that respect, but a word about the effects of such a cut and what that implies for people within the St. Cloud State service area may be in order.

The budget cuts have had a serious impact on the funding for SCSU in all areas, but particularily in Learning Resources. It should be understood at the outset that the fact that almost one-third of the total cutback dollars at St. Cloud State came in the area of library services does not imply a lack of confidence in what services are offered by this area. Rather it reflects the fact that a service area such as Learning Resources had the bulk of the uncommitted dollars available for such a cut. Consequently, the materials budget of which few dollars had been committed for the school year was easy prey. Other areas--supplies. equipment, etc.--were also affected, as was the area of personnel when we were unable to hire a replacement for a person on maternity

What does all of this mean to those of you who are consumers of one sort or another-students, library users, professional activity, etc.? It means obviously that the amount of new information through books, films, etc. will not be as readily available; however, the budget for periodicals stayed intact and new information will be available through that medium. An equal number of classes will be offered by our Center for Library and Audiovisual Education, mostly through an additional effort by staff personnel. In terms of professional activities it may well mean a reduction in participation although monetary support has never been high for participation by individual members. Undoubtedly, you'll still see many faculty members at professional meetings, a tribute to the professionalism of the entire staff.

In summary, it can be said that perhaps the consumer will not feel greatly the impact of the cutbacks immediately (outside of reduced access to current materials), but the long range impact may be more severe. Increased demands on faculty members who are already pushed to maximum performance may mean some searching for greener pastures once the workload becomes more than they care to handle. It is also unlikely that the books and other materials not ordered this year will be replaced en masse in subsequent allocations in years ahead—the collection will not be as complete as it should be in some areas and that is an irretrievable loss.

Through all of that gloom, however, you can rest assured that the entire staff will do whatever is required to provide quality education and quality media services through the difficult times we face. The media field is filled with high quality personnel, and we also have our share at St. Cloud State. Professionalism usually wins even when faced with difficulty, and that is a tribute to media people in the teaching profession, as well as those in business and industry.

A GLANCE BACK--A LONG, HARD LOOK AHEAD

A number of significant changes have taken place within Information Media programs during the past year. Nearly 200 persons attended our graduate microcomputer classes which were held in St. Cloud, Osseo, Duluth, Brainerd, and Minneapolis. As the winter and spring schedules indicate, teachers, media specialists, and administrators contine to indicate a desire for information on the utilization and management of microcomputers.

Three new "advanced" courses have spun off of the original course: IM 647 Instructional Development for Microcomputers is being offered now and will again be offered during first summer session. In winter, a course on the Selection and Evaluation of Computer Software will cover selection, processing, and evaluation of microcomputer programs. The Administration of Information Systems will be offered in spring and will be aimed at administrators and media people interested in using the micro for administrative purposes. We are fortunate at St. Cloud that five competent faculty are available to teach these courses at a time when some universities are struggling to identify even one person who has the background to teach about computers.

In an attempt to meet the needs of teachers and media people in our service area, we are expanding our off-campus offerings. A separate schedule of off-campus courses for winter appears elsewhere in this issue.

While Program II--Certification continues to be the mainstay of our graduate program, the interest shown in the Training and Development Program (III) is gratifying indeed. Most of our training and development majors are full-time day students and so our course scheduling will slowly be changing to accommodate the growing number of persons who desire to work on a degree full-time. The minor programs have been revised to allow more flexibility in creating a meaningful set of courses for students with majors in Mass Communications, Business, Industry, and other non-education fields.

Overall, our aim has been to maintain a strong school media preparation program while diversifying those parts of our program which appeal to a wider group of people. The business world is discovering the value of persons with an Information Media background and we are attempting to fill that need with the same quality of individual that

St. Cloud has been renowed for over the years. You, our alumni are really our best advertising, because nothing speaks louder than the competence and the leadership you have demonstrated around the state and the Midwest. You make our program rich in tradition and reputation. We will continue to work hard to maintain the quality of a degree which you can be proud to possess.

PRODUCTION SERVICES ACTIVITIES

Production Services produced, as usual, a considerable amount of instructional and informational materials. Some of the major projects were: "Sparky" the Snake, Computer Keypunch Operation, and Maintenance Procedures (videotapes); Central Minnesota Historical Center, Energy at St. Cloud State University, Instructional Selection Tools (slide/sound sets). There will also be four slide/sound sets finished for Virginia Sorensen (Public Services) by the end of Fall Quarter.

There was also a five-year comparative product activity report published in late October by the division.

Last, but not least, Fred Hill will step down as division leader and spend more time in instruction, development, and writing. Mike Nelson will serve as acting division

leader starting Winter Quarter.

PUBLIC SERVICES ACTIVITIES

The Ad Hoc Collection Development Committee has been replaced by a Collection Development Committee responsible for the ongoing development, maintenance, and evaluation of all LRS materials resources. The Ad Hoc Committee began its work in 1977, and since has written policies for all collections, recommended abandonment of some collection, and through a periodicals sub-committee conducted a comprehensive review of the periodicals holdings. This review resulted in the addition of 180 new titles to the current subscription list. Reviews of all collections will take place regularly in the future.

The revised overdue policy implemented last fall has successfully reduced both the number of materials returned late and the number never returned. Losses reduced from \$30,000 annually to less than \$1,500. Users have accepted that responsibility must go along with

borrowing privileges.

TECHNICAL SERVICES UPDATE

Budget cuts from the State of Minnesota have had an especially great impact on Technical Services. The materials budget from which books and non-print are purchased was cut \$115,000. Periodicals and serials budgets were funded, so titles on order in the past can be continued.

Since few books will be added to the collection, the main thrust for this year will be continuation of the retrospective conversation project and proofing of the online catalog against the shelf list. Retrospective input will involve the sound recordings, audio tapes, and filmstrips, most of which will require original tagging.

As the end of the retrospective input project approaches, the prospect for the online catalog is excellent. The online catalog will be very useful as nearly all holdings will be available for search in the system. Staff introduction and training will probably begining during Winter Quarter.

STAFF HIGHLIGHTS



MINNESOTA LIVING HISTORY

ENGLAND EDUCATIONAL TOUR

One of the highlights of the summer program was the England Educational Tour directed by Tony Schulzetenberg and Dennis Fields. Thirty-one participants of various ages visited places of educational interest

in England and Scotland. The nine credit option in instructional development saw the development of very diverse projects of educational interest. After flying to Prestwick in Scotland, members of the tour group spent a night in the Lake District, six days at Harlaxton Manor near Nottingham, six days in London, and six days touring northern England and Scotland.

Among the many libraries visited were the chained library at St. Wolfram's in Grantham, the Bodliean in Oxford, the British Museum, the Public Library in Edinburgh, the John Rylands Library in Manchester, and the Wren Library at Lincoln Cathedral. While in Harlaxton, the group played host at a banquet to some ten area librarians from diverse backgrounds (archivist, museum director, school librarians, etc.); and as a finale to Harlaxton, eight Elizabethan dances performed traditional Elizabethan dances, readings, and songsall in original costumes. The visit to London provided the group with the usual variety of cultural activities--plays like Mouse Trap, Evita, The King and I; dancers like Nuryev; symphonies; etc. The group was also hosted at a tea party at the Oxford Woman's Club by the tour director who was an Oxford graduate.

Visits to places in England included Stonehenge, Salisbury, Oxford, Cambridge, Stratford (and <u>Hamlet</u> at the Shakespeare Playhouse there), Warick, Coventry, Manchester, Nottingham, Lincoln, York, and Durham. Castles, manors, and cathedrals were never in short supply, but visits to the homes of Wordsworth and Beatrix Potter in the Lake District and the Brontes in Haworth were unforgettable experiences. The group spent two days in Edinburgh prior to departure from Prestwick after twenty days of travel.

NOLEN ADDS PAPERS TO MANUSCRIPT COLLECTION

Dr. William Nolen, author of The Making of a Surgeon and the recently published A Surgeon's Book of Hope, signed a depository a greement with St. Cloud State University on October 28th. The addition of his manuscripts to an ever growing manuscript collection will make a significant amount of original material available to aspiring writers and researchers.

An authograph party preceded the signing ceremony in the Civic Room in the Atwood Center. Dr. Charles Graham, President, signed on behalf of the university. A banquet, with the main address by Dr. Nolen, was held at

the Holiday Inn following the signing ceremony.

Mike Buck, holder of the St. Cloud State University Media Specialist Degree, has reason to be proud of two Osseo students who entered a super 8mm film project, entitled "Procession," into the 5th Annual AECT Film Festival held in conjunction with AECT's annual conference in Denver in April, 1980. Dane Lane and Glen Stone entered the competition against entries from eighteen states, the Dominion of Canada, and Puerto Rico, and won first place in the 10-12 grade division. The film, with 1,566 separate single cell drawings and 5,433 single frames exposures, also won a first place rating in the overall competition. The awarding of gold gavel pins to past presidents of AVCAM, MASL, and MEMO took place on Friday evening, along with recognition of Helen Stub's retirement from her position as Media Supervisor at Minneapolis Southwest. UNIVERSITY ENROLLMENT INCREASES

According to a news release from Information Services, a total of 11,429 students were enrolled at St. Cloud State University after 10 days of classes. This reflected a three percent increase over last year's total of 11,049. The full time equivalent (FTE) enrollment for the university after ten days was 10,032. The totals reflected a gain in undergraduate enrollment, but the number of graduate students decreased from 1,296 to 1,199.

GRADUATE ASSISTANTS



FACULTY NOTES AND ACTIVITIES

Dennis Fields and Marie Elsen have been chosen to take part in the Revolving Institutional Exchange Plan with Eau Claire-Wisconsin and Northern Iowa. Ten members from those institutions visited St. Cloud State University in an effort to exchange ideas with counterparts in various aspects of academic life. The St. Cloud team will visit Eau Claire from October 26-28th and Northern Iowa from April 5-7th.

Highlights of the Center for Library and Audiovisual Education's summer sessions were a storytelling workshop, a storytelling con-

ference, and an England Educational Tour. Karen Nelson Hoyle, curator of the Kerlan Manuscript Collection (Children's Books), taught a week long workshop on storytelling Concurrently, Caroline Dane Bauer, nationally known author and storytelling expert. headlined a day long conference. Some thirty-five participants enrolled in the workshop, while the day conference included over 130 registrants. Thirty-one persons joined England Tour leaders Dennis Fields and Tony Schulzetenberg in a twenty-day educational tour of England and Scotland. Visits to places of historical and educational interest highlighted this highly successful tour.

A presentation on "Managing Your Orchard," a session on microcomputers, was the thrust of James May's presentation at the MEMO Upper Mississippi Media Conference in Duluth in September. Dennis Fields made a presentation to faculty members at Rainey River Community College in early September on "Implications for Split/Brain and Cognitive Style Mapping for Community College Teachers." Fred Hill was on the program at the regional ASTD meeting held in St. Paul on October 8th. Dennis Fields and Fred Hill were consultants to Dennis Kleinsasser's class in Managment Development at St. John's University in September. Their topic was human resource development. Hill also serves as a consultant for Eagle Bend in their television endeavors.

Faculty members continue to be active in professional meetings of all types. Virginia Blaske attended the DIALOG Workshop in St. Paul on September 16th. The workshop, on computer data bases, was sponsored by Control Data. Norman Clarke, also of reference, took part in the area workshop on INFORM, also on computer data bases, in St. Paul in July. Clarke also attended the SLA National meeting in Washington, D.C. in June. At that time he also participated in a conference on the Organization and Dissemination of 1980 Census Information. That was followed by a state conference on the same topic held in St. Paul in September.

Staff members were active in summer meetings. Jim May and John Berling attended the MEMO M.I. Smith Leadership Conference at the College of St. Benedict; John Berling and Doreen Keable attended the annual ALA Conference in New York in June; Jim May attended the Instructional Technology and Training Summer Conference at Indiana Uni-

versity from July 7-9th; and Bonnie Hedin attended the abbreviated Stout Media Conference in July at Menomonie.

While Mike Cassidy continues on leave of absence to pursue his doctorate in instructional technology at Indiana University, others are also pursuing degrees. Phyllis Lacroix is working on a doctorate in education at the University of Minnesota; Bonnie Hedin and Rich Josephson spent the summer at the University of Wisconsin-Stout working toward a degree in educational media.

Jim May has taken over the duties of chairperson of the newly formed Licensure Committee of MEMO, and Dennis Fields continues as chair of the Research Committee of that organization. David Rydberg is the chairperson of the Inter Faculty Organization's Grievance Committee and Norm Clarke of the Government Relations Committee. Fred Hill chairs the College of Education's Strategic Long Range Planning Committee. On the national level, John Berling heads up AECT's Program Consultation and Evaluation Committee; Tony Schulzetenberg chairs the Teacher Education Committee; and Jean Aichele has accepted a three year appointment to the Media Programs Evaluation Committee. Tony Schulzetenberg, along with St. Cloud graduate Mary Kerns, serves on the AECT Nomination Committee.

Roger Sween, on leave of absence this year to work on a long standing interest in writing in the science fiction area, is a candidate for President-Elect of MLA for the 1981-82 year. Also on that ballot for Secretary of MLA will be David Rydberg. The national meeting of the ACRL Division of ALA will be held in Minneapolis in the fall of 1981 and serving as the co-chairperson of that conference is John Berling. Virgil Massman, a person well-known to staff members and students, is the chairperson. Norm Clarke's interest in writing and local history has led to publication of his book entitled Logsleds to Snowmobiles; A Centennial History of Pine River, Minnesota.

Norman Clarke has received one of several Faculty Research Grants from St. Cloud State University to study the extent to which Minnesota Statistical Data published by federal, state, and local governments is indexed in nationally published indexing services.
