FROM THE DEAN'S CHAIR

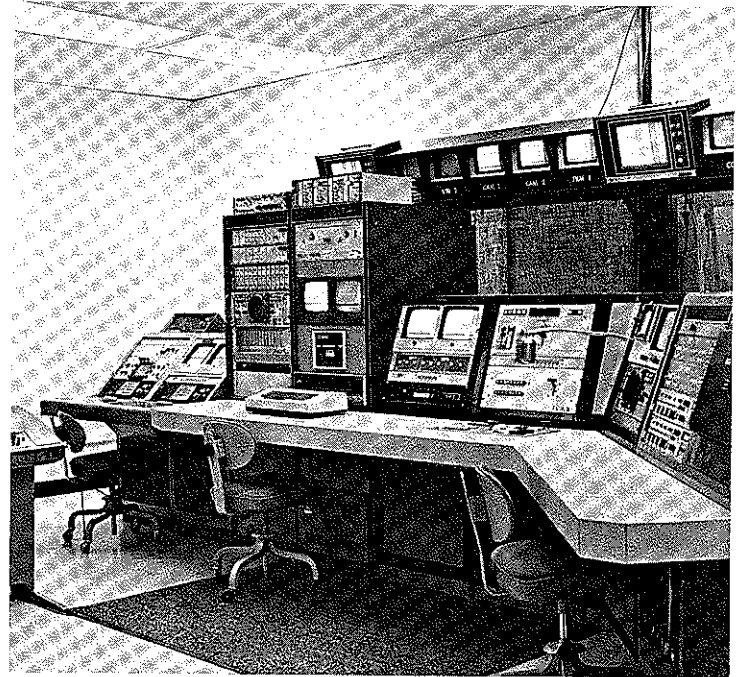
It appears that the Stumpf Bill has raised considerable discussion among public and school media personnel with respect to cooperation between these two media units. Public library-school media center cooperation per se is not a new issue, and cooperation has long been supported by both groups. Cooperation, however, should not be confused with integration of these two units into one. While some communities have combined these two centers with some apparent degree of success, such a move is destined for failure when examined in light of past endeavors. Attempts to combine these units have been made at different times in many different places throughout the U.S.; and in those places where such a combination was effected, it most often met with limited or poor success and a subsequent return to separate units. Most members of the library/media profession see merger as being detrimental to the aim and purposes of the two units, simply because their purposes are unique to each setting rather than to a clientele composed of different people.

This is not to say that media people need not to be concerned about cooperation. Most members of the profession would tend to plead guilty to the fact that too often they have endeavored to accomplish their own goals with too little regard for what was happening in another unit. Common barriers to communication which precede such cooperative efforts are readily apparent: insufficient time, different working hours, lack of a clearly defined common purpose, etc. Networking, the media explosion, declining budgets with less opportunity to purchase materials having spiralled in cost, ease of transportation for clients, and many other factors have again challenged media people to become more conscious of cooperative efforts and to look for ways in which it can be accomplished.

While media people need to support legislative measures designed to support program and cooperation, it should be noted that to support the combining of public/school media units may have detrimental effects on educational programs, both for the school media center and for the public library. What legislators and the general public need to know and keep in mind

is that their units may work with the same people, but that the two media units meet different needs for these people, needs that can be met more effectively through separate units. However, the effectiveness of the units would be enhanced through cooperative endeavors. Media personnel, through individual efforts and organizational public relations must present this message to people involved in making decisions, if a high educational level is to be retained.

TELEVISION SERVICES EXPANDS



This past year has been a busy one for television at SCSU. Rich JOSEPHSON and Randy EVANS have been very successful in re-engineering the Centennial Hall operation. Rich, Randy, and Fred POLESACK have worked long hours in pulling together all the facilities' components into an outstanding television operation. Updated facilities now include the capability to produce high quality programs, both on location and in studio settings. With the addition of a newly acquired broadcast editing system, the possibility of sharing color productions with other television sources is now a reality.

Fred and Rich have been involved in many color remote and in-studio television productions. Some of these have been produced for Academic Computer Services, Continuing Education, Instructional Technology, as well as for the LRS Media Program itself.

Considerable growth in being considered in the amount of, kind of, and quality of programming furnished through the College of Education TV support under the direction of Carl SAVAGE.

At the present time the demand for television production is showing a dramatic increase. Examples of the many programs being produced at this time are: (1) "Aerospace Education" for the Department of Technology, (2) "Rhonda, and Her Normal Hearing Friends" for the Department of Speech Science, Pathology and Audiology, and (3) "Media Simulations" for the Department of Library and Audiovisual Education.

Fred HILL - Director of Production Services CH-30, 255-2068, is the person to contact if you are interested in visiting the SCSU Learning Resources Television Services Unit. Its many new facets will be a pleasant surprise to you.

FACULTY CHANGES

Dr. Lawrence SMELSER has opted for a change in assignment. Lawrence has been Division Leader of Advising and Instructional Services since 1970, and he has taught many of the department's classes. He has carried a heavy advising load, a fact to which many of the department's graduates can attest, and has been a haven and refuge in times of turmoil for all graduate students. Dr. Smelser has been an active force behind the success of St. Cloud's media program, and that same force has carried him into much activity at the state and national level. He is on the Core Committee of the Governor's Pre-White House Conference, he has served as Co-president of MEMO, has been on numerous state and national committees, and serves on the Audiovisual Instructional Editorial Advisory Board. The position of Division Leader for Advising and Instructional Services has been opened to a national search. Dr. Smelser will remain on the staff of Learning Resources, but his re-assignment plans have not yet been completed.

Harlan JENSEN will leave his position as Division Leader of Public Services but will remain in the distribution function by way of special assignment. Marie ELSEN, while keeping her archives position, will also assume the duties of Division Leader of Public Services.

Government Documents and Reference Services will be combined into one administrative unit, and Dick BUSSE will become the head of Reference Services.

Mike CASSIDY will be taking a leave of absence to attend graduate school, either at Michigan State or at Indiana. Luther ROTTO is serving out the last of his two year temporary appointment. MEET THE STAFF

All too often the personnel in the classified positions go unnoticed as they work at their jobs in the various departments of our Learning Resources. Many of you know them by name, or perhaps recognize their faces, but it appears that it is difficult to put name and faces together. This issue will highlight three members of our classified staff-- Jan PIETRON, Lucy SUPAN, and Pat SAUERER.

Jan PIETRON has held a number of positions in her tenure at St. Cloud State. Presently she holds the rating of intermediate clerk-typist and works in the Public Services Division of Learning Resources. Jan is the person who works with student assignments, interlibrary loan, and the MINITEX operations. She has worked in just about every clerical capacity and tops the seniority list among the classified staff. Jan hails from Rice and has worked in Learning Resources for 17 years.

Lucy SUPAN is the familiar voice of the Advising and Instructional Services, the person who most often communicates with the graduate and undergraduate students. She is perhaps not a stranger to most of our students; in fact, she has most likely at one time or another helped almost all students with some of the technical difficulties experienced in finishing a program. Lucy, originally from St. Stephen, has been on the staff at SCSU for the past 10 years, most of which was spent in the instructional area.

Pat SAUERER is the friendly face in Distribution which has become such a familiar one to most of our students. With her sunny disposition she has handled an area fraught with public relations problems, all of which she dispatches with much tact and quiet diplomacy. Pat, who hails from Holdingford, has been working in Learning Resources for the past 7 years, and when she leaves toward the end of this quarter on a leave of absence, she will be greatly missed.

All three of these persons have become an integral part of the Learning Resources program here at SCSU, and they perhaps are typical of the very high quality support personnel that the professional staff has available to them as they go about their work. AUTOMATION AT LRS

The machine readable data that is now being accumulated via the OCLC system opens new doors in terms of manipulation of the data and forms of presentation.

The card catalog has been accepted as the "standard" way of presenting bibliographic information to users of print and non-print media. Some people may find it hard to believe that the card catalog at SCSU may someday be replaced, but there are other alternatives.

One is a printed book catalog. Cost seems to be the biggest disadvantage to the book catalog as an alternative. The computer has solved some of the disadvantages of book catalogs, but frequent updates and paper volume, with subsequent handling problems, have reduced the viability of the book catalog.

Another option is combining the technology of the computer data base and microforms. Disadvantages of the printed book catalog are overcome, and costs reduced substantially. According to reports of microform catalog use found by Phyllis LaCroix, students preferred microfiche catalogs over the card catalog.

On-line interactive catalogs provide a third option. At the present time, total on-line systems appear to be too costly for use as the only access point for the user. The on-line system provides the best access for the user, and as costs for data storage drop, this alternative will come into wider use.

Learning Resources Services staff is in the process of choosing an alternative to the card catalog. Although the microform appears to be the first alternative, there will be other options tested that will involve sub-units of the master catalog.

ARCHIVES ACTIVITIES

Marie ELSÉN reports that excellent progress is being made on archives development. The first agreements on transfer of organizational records to SCSU Archives were signed on April 5 by the Inter-Faculty Organization (statewide), the St. Cloud State University Faculty Association, and by the Association of Administrative and Service Faculty of St. Cloud State. Signing for St. Cloud State was President Charles GRAHAM. The records of these organizations will be essential to documentation of history of St. Cloud State. Archivist Marie Elsen is presently working on a similar agreement with the Student Senate.

Aspart of the archives endeavor, Ms. Elsen indicated that she was extremely interested in acquiring any documents--letters, diaries, journals, manuscripts, etc.--dealing with student life since St. Cloud's beginning in 1869. She indicated that there is a lack of documentation on student life prior to the advent of the College Chronicle in 1923, and that donations of any documents from former students, staff members, friends, etc., are extremely welcome.

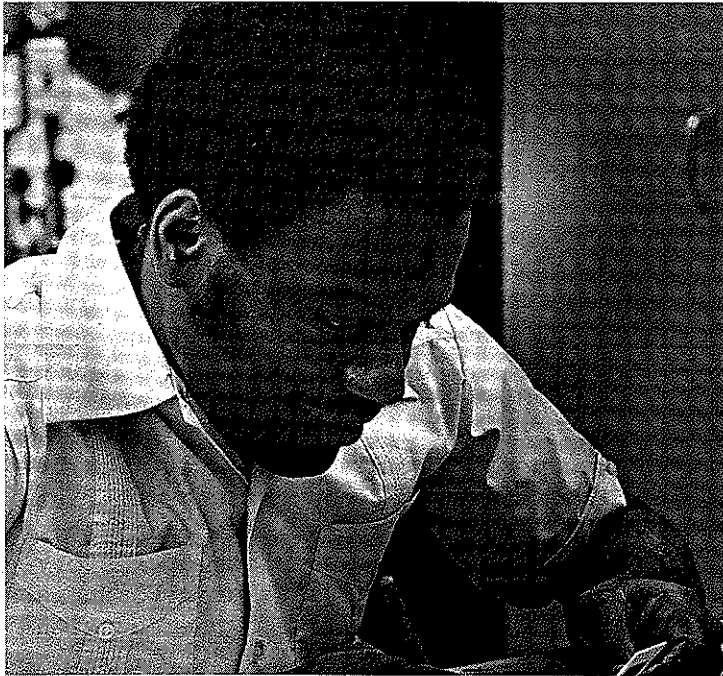
NEW BIBLIOGRAPHIC RETRIEVAL SERVICES

Searching the published literature is an integral part of the learning and research process. Whether the need is for a few current papers or for a comprehensive search of the literature, computer-based reference services can be of assistance by identifying relevant material.

Bibliographic Retrieval Services (BRS) provides a list of journal references by processing an information request through the appropriate subject data base(s). Among those in-

dexes in the data base are ERIC, BIOSIS, CHEM ABSTRACTS, and PSYCHOLOGICAL ABSTRACTS. Full bibliographic citations are received, including the title of the articles, authors, name of the journal, volume, pages, and date. Abstracts and/or key words also may be included.

Beginning March 27, 1978, the Reference Staff of Learning Resources Services began demonstrating for the faculty of the University a variety of the bibliographic data bases searchable by computer link-up with BRS in New York. On your next visit to SCSU, stop in reference and see how this can help you as a student.

ENGLAND LIBRARY TOUR

Touring Information Media, the tour originated by Dr. Ray RAMQUIST some years ago, is alive and well. After a very successful Minnesota Media Tour last summer, an English Library Tour has been scheduled for mid-June under the direction of Tony SCHULZETENBERG. Some 31 media persons will join with nine others for a tour that will visit such places as London, Oxford, Cambridge, Edinburgh, York, and other United Kingdom cities. Scheduled for visits are a school library, a technical school library, various public and private libraries, and visits to the National Library of Scotland and the British National Library. The tour is a joint venture with the University of Evansville. Dr. Dwight BURLINGAME, Dean of Learning Resources there and formerly of the St. Cloud State staff, is the co-director, and many of the arrangements were completed with the help of an English representative at the Harlaxton campus of the University of Evansville.

UPPER MISSISSIPPI MEDIA CONFERENCE

The Upper Mississippi Media Conference, sponsored by the Minnesota Educational Media Organization (MEMO) will be held in St. Cloud May 4-6, 1978. The conference, which will be held at the Holiday Inn, will feature Dr. Barry Bratton of the University of Iowa as its opening session beginning at 7:00 on Thursday evening. Group sessions and a reception will follow the opening address. Meeting on Thursday will be the Executive Board and the Board of Directors of MEMO in preparation for Friday's membership meeting. Friday's program will be devoted to mini-sessions on a variety of topics, exhibits, committee and functional interest group meetings, a membership meeting, and a chance to exchange ideas with the conference resource people. Friday's program will conclude with a banquet at which the main speaker will be Dr. Jane Hannigan, Columbia University. Lt. Governor Alec Olson will address the participants at Saturday morning's session of the Governor's Pre-Conference on Libraries. Members of the core committee working on the fall conference have been invited to attend. An 11:00 brunch will conclude the conference activities.

M.I. SMITH LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

The M.I. Smith Leadership Conference will be held at the College of St. Benedict from August 3-5, beginning on Thursday noon and running through Saturday noon. This conference

is devoted to leadership development and to a review of the goals for the coming year. All officers, state and regional are strongly urged to attend. Committee chairpersons for 1978-79 will have been appointed by that time and also should attend. If you want to attend this meeting, make your wishes known to officers, regional chairpersons, and functional group officers so that arrangements can be made to attend.

MEDIA EDUCATORS CONFERENCE

In attendance at the Luther Brown Media Educators Conference at St. Scholastics in Duluth in mid-January were John BERLING, Ginny BLASKE, Jean AICHELE, Tony SCHULZETENBERG, Bonnie HEDIN, Dennis FIELDS, and Carl SAVAGE. Also present was Luther BROWN, former Dean of Learning Resources, for whom the conference is named. This was the fifth annual conference, and next year it will return to St. Cloud, the site of the first conference. This year's conference was headed by two major sessions--one on public library education headed by Bill ASP and one on media for teachers headed by Tony SCHULZETENBERG. It was gratifying to see a significant number of persons related to the St. Cloud program in attendance. Kay SACK of Minneapolis and Les NORMAN of Monticello made excellent contributions to the panel on media for teachers. Dr. Jean LOWRIE of Western Michigan gave the main address.

MEMO ACTIVITIES

The post-secondary functional interest group of MEMO held its annual conference at the area Vocational-Technical School in St. Cloud on February 15. Karen LIESER was in charge of the program dealing with retrenchment.

Shari PRETZER and Marie ELSER are serving as co-chairpersons for the Upper Mississippi Media Conference Planning Committee. Also on the planning committee are Gary GERMUNDSON, Karen LIESER, Doreen KEABLE, Duane RADEKE, and Harlan JENSEN.

Regions 3, 4, 5, and 6 of MEMO held a joint conference in Alexandria on February 15. St. Cloud graduates Tom MILLER (Region 3) and Carol WHITE and Marien HALEY (Region 6) were involved in the planning sessions. Pam MATTICK of the St. Cloud faculty spoke on Children and Television.

Three new functional interest groups have been formed within MEMO--Commercial, Television, and Media Educators. Any MEMO members may belong to these groups.

Two hundred delegates will be invited to attend the Governor's Pre-White Conference on Library and Information Services at the Leamington Hotel in Minneapolis on September 10, 11, and 12 to discuss ways to improve these services in Minnesota. One third of these persons will be media professionals or trustees, while the other two-thirds should represent the general public. In addition to the above voting delegates, there will be persons attending as observers, who can be anyone who is willing to pay a registration fee. Ten delegates (or members of the planning committee) will be elected as delegates to the National White House Conference to be held in Washington, D.C. next year. Only three of the ten will be media persons.

The conference has two major goals: 1) To make everyone aware of the extent and the value of library and information services in Minnesota. 2) To translate that awareness into concern and willingness to work for programs that will improve the quality and levels of such services, both in Minnesota and nationwide.

Spread the word about the Conference and its purposes. Contact the Governor, your legislators, your community leaders. Visit the libraries in your area. Ask your local newspaper, radio or TV stations to report on and to discuss the conference. Let us know about your library and information service needs.

Several persons from St. Cloud State University as well as former students are part of the planning committees or sub-committees. We hope you will make an attempt to get involved in the speak-outs or the conference itself in order that the needs of media centers may be heard.

 summer sessions. Scheduled for the first sum-
 mer session and running from 6-26 to 7-7 are
 seminars entitled "Media for Teachers" (M-F,
 4 credits, 1100-1340) and one on "Student
 Filming" (M-F, 2 credits, 1430-1700). These
 two seminars are being taught by Lawrence
 SMELSER and Mike CASSIDY respectively. Norman
 CLARKE is especially interested in seeing
 people enroll for a seminar on "Oral and Media
 Documentation of Local History" (7-3 to 7-14,
 2 credits, M-F, 1430-1650), and Jerry WESTBY
 will lead a group on "Adolescent and Young
 People's Materials" (7-3 to 7-14, M-F, 2 cre-
 dits, 1100-1245). One seminar has been devel-
 oped for the second session entitled "Media
 and the Law"-it will be offered from 7-18 to
 7-28, from 1100-1305 daily for two credits.

 IM 644 (Retrieval) from 7-18 to 8-11; and IM
 658 (Systems) 7-18 to 8-11.
