FROM THE DEAN'S CHAIR

In the last issue of IM News reference was made in this column to the need for each member of AVCAM and MASL to express his/her feelings by way of the ballot box on merger of the two organizations. To those of us that have long felt that librarians and audiovisualists have many common goals, the positive outcome of the election provides the unified profession with a thrust toward the accomplishment of realistic goals for the young people of Minnesota.

Smith Conference, and the Ruth Ersted Conference will need more than just the vocal support of the membership; and it is certainly within the prerogrative of each and every member to volunteer his/ her time and talents towards the development. of good programs.

Both AVCAM and MASL must be recognized as organizations which were among the best in the country in their respective fields, and both can look back with pride to a history of leadership and success. Let's use this

rich heritage as the impetus towards the achievement of the best goals we can set for Minnesota education, and in so doing, continue to show why Minnesota has long been recognized as one of the national leaders in both the library and audiovisual fields.

RAMQUIST TO HEAD ISD

Dr. Ray Ramquist, former member of the St. Cloud staff and now Chairperson of the Department of Library and Educational Media at Madison College, Harrisonburg, Virginia, will assume office of the President of the Information Systems Division of the Association for Educational Communications and Technology. Currently Dr. Ramquist is planning the annual AECT-ISD Convention program being held in Miami April 24-29, and at that time he will assume the office of President. In the most recent edition of the ISD Newsletter, Dr. Ramquist expressed interest in suggestions for speakers or presentations on information systems; and also for help to introduce speakers, write articles on conference activities, and in general to help run ISD sessions at Miami.

DEAN BROWN HONORED

Luther Brown, Dean of Learning Resources and Department Chairman, was honored for his many years of service to Minnesota libraries and media centers by being named "Minnesota Librarian of the Year" by the Minnesota Library Association at the annual Fall Convention at the Radisson South in Minneapolis. tendance at the presentation award were many of the members of LRS, as well as Mrs. Brown and daughter Kathy. Dr. Brown has served in the capacity of Director or Dean of Learning Resources since 1958. During that time he served in many local, state, and national capacities, and he is well known as a leader in the media field. Highlights of his media career include the presidency of the Minnesota Library Association, the presidency of the Information Systems Division of AECT during its formative years, and Presidency of the Audiovisual Coordinators Association of Minnesota.

UPPER MISSISSIPPI MEDIA CONFERENCE

The site of the Upper Mississippi Media Conference, scheduled for May 4-6 has been changed from the Registry Hotel to the Radisson Hotel in Edina. Lawrence Smelser and Glady Sheehan, co-presidents of MEMO will preside. In charge of program planning will be Phyllis Thornley, and members are urged to volunteer their services to help make the spring meeting a success. Marilyn Savage and Geri Bonstrom will be in charge of the film festival. Registration materials will be sent to media persons shortly.

AVCAM-MASL MERGE

The fall meeting of AVCAM and MASL during the NEA/MFT Convention, October 21-22 was highlighted by the merger of the two organizations. Goal of the conference was to make a final accounting of the ballots and subsequently to take care of administrative and legal technicalities to effect the merger. Officers of both organizations became members of the Board of Directors for the coming school year, as well as assuming joint offices to guide the organization through its first year. Lawrence Smelser and Gladys Sheehan are co-presidents, Norman Busse and Mary Meyer are co-presidents elect, Doug Palmer and Meriel Adland are co-vice-presidents in charge of membership, Barb Nemer and Roger Lonning are co-secretaries, and Marti Zins and Shirley Christenson are co-treasurers. Also on the Board of Directors are Jack Loss and Doris Pagel, past-presidents of AVCAM and MASL respectively. Elections of officers under the new by-laws will be conducted this spring for the next term.

OCLC AT LRS

On December 2, 1976, two one-line computer terminals were installed in Centennial Hall and connected via phone lines to computers in Ohio. Technical Services is now using the on-line cataloging system of the Ohio College Library Center (OCLC).

The system allows us to search the machine data base to find if any other library or the Library of Congress has cataloged a particular book or non-print item we have purchased. If the item has been cataloged, we simply push a "Produce" key on the terminal and in a few days we receive

cards alphabetized and ready to file in the shelf list and public catalog.

According to some of the users, the system has performed "beyond our dreams" and material that used to be very difficult to verify and catalog is now processed in a routine manner.

Possible future use of the terminals includes serials check-in, acquisitions record keeping, inter-library loan, and circulation record keeping. If you would like to see the terminals in operation, come to the cataloging area (Room 103) in Centennial Hall and one of the terminal operators would be happy to demonstrate the system.

SUMMER MINNESOTA TOUR SCHEDULED

The Department of Library and Audiovisual Education has scheduled a MINNETOUR for June 12-18, 1977. The three-credit tour will consist of several pre-tour readings and on-tour discussion sessions. The primary objective of the tour is to expose media people to Minnesota authors, publishers, artists, and producers of media. Informal sessions have been scheduled with Les Blacklock and Sig Olson (naturalists) in their home settings, and negotiations are under way with others like Fred Manfred, Robert Bly, Judith Guest, and perhaps others. Their participation will depend upon their fees and their availability, but all meetings will be scheduled in their home areas. Other places of interest, such as the Iron Range Interpretive Center, the Underground State Park, the Sinclair Lewis Museum, are also on the schedule. We will also visit Channel 11 to watch a show being taped and to tour their studios. A film producer and a jobber will also be scheduled and the tour will take us to all parts of the state. Cost for the tour will be approximately \$175.00, which will include fees for three graduate credits (in-state), transportation, and room. Participants will have to provide other expenses (meals, admission tickets, etc.). The tour will depart from St. Cloud on June 12 and return to St. Cloud on June 18, and will be limited to the first persons making reservations. A minimum of 30 and a maximum of 39 students will be able to take part in the tour. More information will be sent out shortly to individuals by tour director, Tony Schulzetenberg.

SEMINAR IN MEDIA LEADERSHIP AND EDUCATION

Dean Luther Brown, through the Department of Library and Audiovisual Education, will conduct a two-credit media leadership seminar during the 1977 first summer session. Dr. Brown will lend his many years of experience in media education and administration to what should be a meaningful experience to those desiring information on the intracacies of media leadership. The seminar will meet from 8:00-12:00 daily from July 11-15 with sessions conducted in an informal, dialogue manner.

Students who can attend only several weeks of the summer sessions, or those who would like to take courses in addition to the tour, have a variety of short courses from which to choose. Some regular classes have been increased in class length, but reduced to a smaller number of days: IM 471-571 Preparation of Materials (July 5-15); IM 476-576 Selection (June 14-27); IM 606 Organization and Supervision (June 27-July 15); IM 683 Contemporary Materials (July 5-15); IM 477-577 Reference (August 1-12), Among new courses offered on a short term basis are IM 410-510 Minnesota Media Tour (June 12-18); IM 683 Seminar: Developing Instructional Packages (July 5-15); IM 683 Seminar: Leadership in Media and Education (July 11-15); IM 683 Seminar: Acquisition and Maintenance of Equipment (July 19-29); IM 683 Seminar: Public Relations in IM (July 19-29); and IM 683 Seminar: Media for Teachers (July 14-August 1). A complete schedule of summer classes may be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

MALC SCHEDULED FOR ST. CLOUD STATE

The annual Midwestern Academic Librarians Conference has been scheduled to be held at St. Cloud State University on May 12-14, 1977. The conference is held annually at a college or university with fairly new facilities, and the members of Learning Resources will plan the program and host the conference. The conference theme will be "Third Century Potpourri" and the program will provide participants with an opportunity to hear area (midwestern) librarians and specialists in such areas as local history, folklore, microforms, microbooks, and the concept of "zero growth" in academic libraries. Participants from Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, Kansas, South Dakota, North Dakota, and Minnesota are expected to attend. John Berling and Tony Schulzetenberg are serving as co-chairmen, but all members of the LRS and Library and Audiovisual Education Department are involved. Activities will be scheduled at St. Cloud State and at the new Sunwood Inn.
