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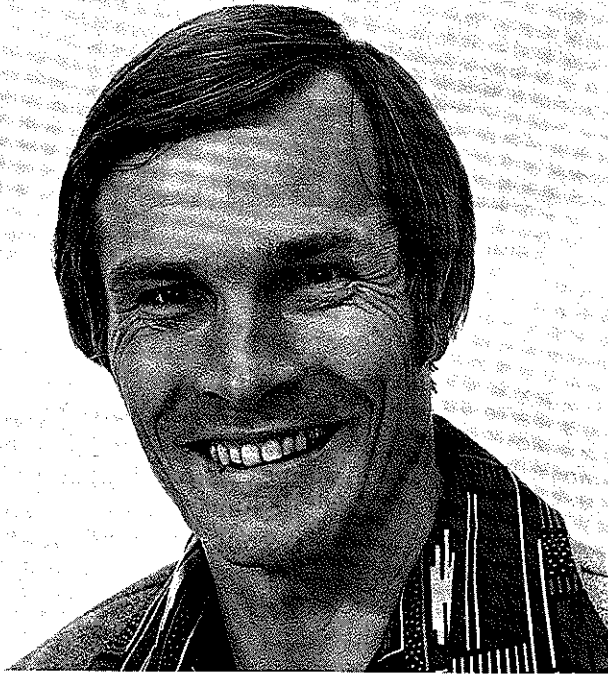

MEET THE NEW DEAN

Dr. John BERLING has been appointed the Dean of Learning Resources and Chairperson of the Department of Library and Audiovisual Education. Dr. Berling was selected after an extensive nation-wide search, and administration and staff members alike have expressed pleasure at his selection.

Dr. Berling's educational experiences over the past twenty years have been at almost all levels--as an instructor, as a media person, and as an administrator. He has a B.S. degree from St. Cloud State University (1957), and an MSLS from Wayne State University in Detroit (1967), and a Ph.D. from the University of Nebraska (1975). He has done additional work in the media field at Northern Illinois in DeKalb and at the University of Minnesota.

In his opening remarks to the Learning Resources staff in September, he indicated a sincere desire to maintain the high level of Resource Management at SCSU and to retain and foster the excellence of the media education program. All members of the Learning Resources Staff look forward to Dr. Berling's tenure as Dean, and certainly both their best wishes and support will be with him.

FROM THE DEAN'S CHAIR

One of the most difficult aspects of any new position is to develop a familiarity with the many facets of the responsibilities encompassed within that job. Conversely, however, it is also that breadth which makes it the most challenging. Those of you who knew Luther BROWN well know that he did indeed wear big shoes and that he always accepted the challenges of his job most effectively. It is my desire to carry on in the best tradition those things which have gone before, to strive constantly for an improved media program to serve both our institution and the media field, and to foster the rich tradition and pride developed over the years through our program. With respect to the future, I can say only that we will continue to build on the past, always trying to be alert to new issues, new trends, and new ideas. Hopefully, many of these will come from the field, for only in that way can we truly be responsive to the needs of the media world.

There is really no need for me to point out those problems which are having the greatest impact on education today. There is, however, an avenue open to members of the media profession to lessen the detrimental impact that some of those problems can have. That avenue is your media organization, and it is my feeling that we should strive to build an organization that can count among its membership all of the media persons in the state. It is just as important, however, that membership means an active participation, for it only through active involvement that we can present a united front to combat problems facing our profession. In the final analysis, involvement at the regional level will probably bear the most fruit, and certainly the kinds of public relations we develop with administrators and teachers at that level and even more importantly the local level, will be most crucial.

This might also be a good time to reassure all media people in Minnesota that all of us here at St. Cloud State University stand ready to serve you in whatever way we can. We will endeavor to continue our support at your regional meetings, and certainly we will be happy to work with you on the local level if we can in any way help there. Don't hesitate to contact us since we see professional growth as a responsibility of everyone at all levels. We hope you have a good year.

FACULTY CHANGES

The retirement of Dean Luther BROWN prompted some internal changes for Learning Resources. John BERLING assumed the position of Dean after an extensive, nation-wide search. Dennis FIELDS was appointed Assistant Dean with a major responsibility for programs and personnel. One other administrative change saw the addition to the faculty of Fred HILL who became the Division Leader of Production Services, which now also includes Television Services.

Other faculty changes included the resignation of Ford JENSEN, who returned to Arizona to continue his work there. Judy KINDERSKI returned from the University of Wisconsin where she worked on a Specialist Degree during the past school year. Bonnie HEDIN, who joined our staff last year was employed on a full-time basis and has responsibility for the cataloging department. Carl SAVAGE moved to the Campus School/Education Building to work in television services, and Louis COSTANZO joined production services in Centennial. Phyllis LACROIX resigned to spend the fall quarter with husband and family in Aalborg, Denmark with the SCSU program there.

There were three new additions to the faculty in Learning Resources. Dr. Fred HILL, along with his wife Susan and three daughters, moved to St. Cloud from Bloomington, Indiana, where he completed his doctorate at the University of Indiana. He holds B.S. and M.Ed. degrees from Utah State University. Jean R. AICHELE, who was last employed with the Northwest Regional Library, Sioux City, Iowa joined the cataloging department. She holds B.S. and M.S. degrees from the University of Minnesota, and is currently working on an M.S. degree in Instructional Technology at the University of California-San Jose. Rich JOSEPHSON recently employed by WLUC, Marquette, Michigan, has been assigned to television services. He holds a B.A. degree from Southwest State and an M.S. from Murray State University.

OCLC UPDATE

St. Cloud State has been on the Ohio College Library Center's (OCLC) computer since January. During the summer, a concerted effort was made to enter holdings information for items that were already cataloged by Learning Resources and reflected in our shelflist. We call the entering of shelflist data, retrospective input.

By entering the shelflist on the terminal, along with the current acquisitions, we will eventually have all our holdings in machine readable form, enabling us to manipulate records for circulation systems, alternatives to the card catalog, and acquisitions procedures. To accomplish the workload, the two terminals have been scheduled from 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m., resulting in some interesting work assignments. We have found that we can classify our people as "early risers" and "night owls."
