MADDEN'S CONFERENCE

RAIRS

The video portion of the Random Access Information Retrieval System has been in the process of being re-engineered by Ampex Corporation and has been returned and re-installed as of August 15, 1973.

The re-engineering of the video portion of RAIRS has brought the system into operation. Expectations are that the system will be fully operational for the fall session.

The Minnesota Association of School Librarians' biennial conference at Madden's is scheduled for September 21-23. Tentative plans for conference activity include sessions on materials, values, and budgeting. Tony SCHULZETENBERG of the St. Cloud State staff will be working with Ingrid MILLER and Naomi HOKANSON on the budgeting sessions. The presentation will include an orientation to PPBS and other budgeting procedures. Participants are urged to read Jane HANNIGAN'S article on PPBS which appeared in American Libraries (3:1182-4, December, 1972) and to bring a copy of the district or building selection policy statement to the conference. PRODUCTION SERVICES EXPANSION

Production Services will have more space in the basement of Centennial Hall beginning fall quarter. In addition new offices have been built in the area for Dr. Dennis FIELDS, Instructional Development Adviser and for Dr. John DESANTO, Supervisor of Radio and Television Services.

GOVERNMENT DOCUMENTS AND MAP COLLECTION MAKES MOVE

Students returning to St. Cloud State this fall will soon discover that the government documents collection and the map collection have moved from their location in the Special Collections area on second floor to the basement floor in the area where the open study area was.

The new area will be open all the hours that Centennial Hall is open with someone available to help anyone who is in need of assistance in locating a special document or map. There will be tables to provide study area for those students wishing to use these materials while other tables will be set up outside the area for students wishing to study.

This move has provided expansion space for the remaining collections found in the Special Collections area. The collections still found on second floor are: Rare books, Archives, Historical Collection, and the Central Minnesota Historical Collection.

ORAL HISTORY PROJECTS UNDERWAY

TOURING INFORMATION MEDIA (TIM)

One of the newest methods for obtaining information to be added to library collections throughout the country is now being used by the staff of St. Cloud State College Learning Resources Services. Oral History, as it is called, is a means by which the actual experiences of an individual is recorded on tape and/or videotaped as they are being interviewed by a staff member. Presently, Dick BUSSE is involved in interviewing and taping conversations with Dr. Robert WICK, past president of St. Cloud State College, and Mrs. John P. SNYDER, the last Minnesota survivor of the sinking of the Titanic.

Last spring interviews were conducted with Mr. M.I. SMITH of Hibbing, Minnesota, considered by many as the father of audio-visual education in Minnesota, and also with Mr. Bill HAFEMAN of Bigfork, Minnesota. Many of you have probably seen the film, The Birch Canoe Builder in which Bill was the star, and have seen him at the Minnesota State Fair making one of his famous canoes.

Other projects that we would like to do some taping on in the future are the granite industry, brewing industry, mining industry and farming. Great emphasis will be placed on contacting retired members of the St. Cloud State College faculty and getting their experiences and thoughts recorded for the use of future generations.
