

SPECIALIST DEGREE & NEW CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS APPROVED FOR ST. CLOUD STATE COLLEGE

SPECIALIST DEGREE PROGRAM (6th Year)

The North Central Association of Colleges and Universities has given their approval for the accrediation of a Specialist Degree to be offered by the Department of Library and Audiovisual Education of the School of Education at St. Cloud State College. Applications are now being accepted by the Graduate Office for students who are interested in pursuing their study in the area of Information Media beyond the Master's Degree.

The basic purpose of the Special-

ist Degree is to improve and upgrade the educational preparation of media personnel at all levels. Generally, there will be three types of persons interested in admission to the program. (1) Those who have completed a Master's Degree with a major in some area of media. (2) Those who have completed a minimum of 45 graduate credits in some area of media but who have not completed

under present entrance requirements. (3) Those who have a Master's Degree in some area other than media but who are now interested in entering a career in media. Entrance requirements include the Graduate Record Examination scores in verbal, quantitative and advanced

education, experience relevant to the program, acceptable grade point average and references. Minimum graduation requirements include 45 credits above a Master's Degree with a minimum of 60 credits of graduate media courses, an acceptable grade point average, a departmental examination, and a research project. For some it may include a period of internship.

"EXPERIMENTAL CERTIFICATE PROGRAM"

The change in certification requirements brought about by the approval of Media Generalist and Media Supervisor certification has made necessary that a program be established to aid those persons who are now in the field with either library or audiovisual director certification to qualify for media certification. The Minnesota Department of Education has approved an Experimental Certificate Program submitted by St. Cloud State College Department of Library and Audiovisual Education. To be elibible to participate in this program one must hold a full school library endorsement or audiovisual director

endorsement issued prior to September 1, 1972. This experimental certificate program is intended to meet the needs for the Media Supervisor certification which requires a minimum of a Master's Degree. Media Supervisor Certification will be available to those eligible media persons who successfully complete the program and meet the competency requirements as outlined by the Task Force on Certification.

For more information concerning either the regular certification program or the experimental certificate program, contact the Department of Library and Audiovisual Education at St. Cloud State College and discuss it with a graduate adviser.

MEDIA GENERALIST & MEDIA SUPERVISOR CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS

The State Department of Education has notified the Dean of the School of Education that the proposal for meeting the new Media Generalist and Media Supervisor requirements had been accepted. Therefore, St. Cloud State College will now be able to certify to the State Department of Education, persons who have met the requirements for certification as Media Generalist and for Media Supervisor in addition to certification as a School Librarian, an Audiovisual Coordinator or an Audiovisual Director.

Also accepted was a proposed experimental certificate program to assist those who hold a <u>full</u> school library endorsement or audiovisual director endorsement.
