Median of the Moment




New Advising Program at SCS

Rear Screen For Centennial Hall

When our new Learning Resources Center opens, we will have a rear screen projection room which will service at least three classrooms. Each room will have at least a 6' by]2' rear projection screen - audio and visual materials will be presented. Each individual classroom will have controls for the rear screen. According to plans to date, all three classrooms will be able to use their rear screens simultaneously. At least

one screen will be large enough to project a 16mm and two 35mm slide or film strips at the same time. According to AV director Mr. Erickson, there is a possibility of the random access system being coordinated with the rear screen project; which would make the amount of material available for use almost unlimited.







Following is a reprint of an article, by Dr. Carl Savage of SCS, appearing in the September issue of Audiovisual Instruction.

A Total Media Program IMPLEMENTED

Much dialog has taken place during the past New days concerning the development of a total media program (library and audiovisual education). This dialog has become especially significant as plans are now being formulated across the country to implement the combined standards for library and audiovisual materials. St. Cloud State College in Minnesota has combined library and audiovisual education and service on the administrative and faculty level to form a total media program. Both an instructional and a service program encompassing the media concept have been developed.

The educational system at St. Cloud State College provides a curriculum in the School of Education which affords the graduate student an opportunity to secure a msters degree with an Information Media major. Information Media may be defined as any materials used in the educational process. If these materials require technological devices, equipment becomes an innate part of the education-

al structure.

There are several unique aspects in the St. Cloud State College approach. A major one is the utilization of the Learning Resources Center (comprising the library, the audiovisual center, and the curriculum area) staff who serve as service professionals and the instructional faculty for the Department of Library and Audiovisual Education. Through this organizational structure, the teaching faculty is not only actively involved in the professional and administrative functions of a media center but also in the preparation of media personnel. Since there have been no graduate programs which provide a total media background, over the years a staff has been developed made up of dedicated teachers with specialties in library science, curriculum or audiovisual education Staff members have been selected on the basis that they will pursue advanced (continued on page 1)

graduate studies in these areas. Thus, at this stage the Information Media (the total course of study) staff members have qualifications making them competent in the total media concept.

The goal of the graduate program is to educate and train generalists who can function in any situation, at any place, and at any time in the media field. This does not preclude the individual's having a specialty, but insists on a broad yet specific understanding of total media. The program provides courses which meet state certification requirements in library and audiquisual education. There is a strong emphasis on curriculum support and development which will be increased as the program expands.

The Information Media program has been in existence since June 1966 with an enrollment of more than 100 graduate students. All the students who have graduated with masters degree are involved in some facet of media work, most of them administering and developing programs for

their school systems.

It has been felt for many years that the Resource Center should be staffed with personnel with a total media concept. A person coming into the LRC should never need to chase from one person to another to get the help he needs. Media people should be able to assist each person to find any type of information in any form, whether filmstrip, periodical, vidio-tape, slide, audiotape, or reference book.

The faculty functions in specialty areas; yet each member is conversant with other specialized areas. When these faculty members enter the classroom, they take with them the wealth of experience derived from working day-to-day in their varied roles in the Learning Resources

Center.
