Well-known American Singers to Present Night Concert

The four of outstanding musical programs at TC will continue next week with the performance of the American Singers Wednesday night in the Stewart hall auditorium. The program will begin at 8:15 p.m.

This outstanding quartet consists of Mary Colvin, soprano; Ruth Sitter, contralto; Thomas Johnson, tenor; and James Cosmo, bass. Their program includes rare madrigals, folk songs from many countries, American spirituals and several of the outstanding number from various operas and operettas.

The members of the quartet appear in costumes, and they change several times as they move through their varied groups of songs.

In addition to their group work each of the four artists has done a good deal of recital work.

Mrs. Colvin is a prize and protégé of Paul Robeson, well-known Metropolitan Opera House tenor. She has appeared in concert with him, toured the United States and Canada in both concert and light opera.

Miss Sitter made her debut with the Canadian Grand Opera Company, and she has made an extensive operatic and radio appearances in the United States and Canada.

Cosmo, a graduate of the Juilliard School of Music, created the role of Mendoza in Prokofiev's "Domena". He has also been singing with the famous Lemonade Opera Company in New York City.

Johnson first gained recognition through winning the North Carolina State Music contest in 1939 and 1940. In 1940 he also won first place in the District National contest in Palm Beach, Florida, and in 1941 he was proclaimed Southern District winner of the Cincinnati Opera contest.

Letters of application will be accepted through Friday, April 28, for the positions of editor and business manager of next year's Chronicle and next year's Talahi.

Speeches during the day include the two by the governor, an address at 1:30 p.m. by Dr. Burtrum Schiele, psychiatrist from the University of Minnesota, and an address at 8 p.m. by Mr. Justin Reese. Dr. Schiele will talk on "Emotions and Life Situations in Relation to Medical Disorders."

Thirty-four Area Teachers Attend Special Saturday Classes Here

Thirty-four rural and city teachers from Central Minnesota are actively practicing that belief that a good teacher is always a student by attending special Saturday classes here at the college.

Dr. Richard Smith, Miss Bea Williams and Miss Nina Francis are directors of the class that meets every other Saturday.

The specific title of the course is Problems in Elementary Education and Modern Curriculum Practices. Various facilities of the college have been utilized and many faculty members have contributed information from their selected fields.

Dr. Richard Mitchell of the audio-visual aids department spent one

Saturday morning pointing out visual aid problems and techniques. He has also, at various times, shown films on teaching techniques.

At one session held at Riverview, Miss Grace Nugent explained the Social Studies work being done by her fourth grade. Miss Ruth Moscrip told how she integrates language with Social Studies in her sixth grade. The new elementary school art curriculum was discussed by Miss Corinne Schoffel.

An exhibit prepared by Miss Lilian Budge and her students in Children's Literature was viewed and studied by the class on another occasion.

Several sections of the college library have been studied by the class of in-service teachers. Members of the group examined most of the first-choice books recommended in the state library lists for school libraries. TC maintains a special collection of

these books.

Textbooks in the various elementary fields were examined in the sample textbook section of the library. The class also made a detailed study of the organization and arrangement of the children's library.
