Halls Council Adopts Relationships Motion

The Inter-residence Hall Council IRHC has decided to form a committee composed of two IRHC members, one representative of each women's hall, seven Associated Women Students (AWS) representatives and three administrators to discuss the reconstruction of the relationship between AWS, IRHC and individual residence hall governments.

THE MOTION came primarily a result of the trend toward more responsible and more individual student government, according to Tom Pooton, IRHC president.

The Council has also established a Supreme Judicial Board that will rule on matters of appeals from the individual Hall Judicial Boards, continued Pooton.

It will also rule on matters which the individual residence hall judicial boards do not feel capable of deciding. The Supreme Judicial Board will consist of one chairman from each residence hall judicial board, he said.

Firkus, Sloane Receive Grants

Two seniors majoring in chemistry have accepted fellowships for graduate work at other institutions.

James Firkus, Eagle Bend, has been granted a research fellowship in biochemistry at Purdue University which is renewable for four years.

Dave Sloane of St. Cloud has received a teaching assistantship in organic chemistry at Arizona State University.

The fellowships were announced by Dr. John Laakso, chemistry department chairman.

IRHC WILL join the National Association of College and University Residence Halls and the Midwestern Association of College and University Residence Halls.

The Council recently sent three members to the national convention and plans to send other members and interested on-campus students to future national and regional meetings to obtain information and ideas on how to make the residence halls a better place in which to live, Pooton concluded.

"Man's Control of Man" will be the topic of an address by Dr. Roger Ulrich at 8 p.m. Tuesday at St. Cloud State. The public is invited.

Scheduled for Stewart Hall auditorium, the program will be the second of three convocations on "Man's Improvement of His Environment."

Two tapes will be played: "Utopia Today" and Dr. B. F. Skinner's contribution to the Johnson Foundation—State Cloud conference on the experimental community last December.

Dr. Ulrich will be featured at a luncheon at 1 p.m. Tuesday in the Penny Room of Atwood Center. He will speak briefly on his current program at Western Michigan University.

Political Week To Feature 'Young Generation' Issues

A Republican congressman and a Democratic senator will be featured during Political Emphasis Week next week at St. Cloud State.

Rep. Mark Andrews, (R-No. Dak.), will speak on "Issues 1967: The Minority Reports" Monday at 8 p.m. in Brown Hall auditorium. Wednesday Sen. Joseph D. Tydings, (D-Md.), will address a Brown Hall auditorium audience on "Issues 1967: A View From the Senate" at 8:15 p.m.

FEATURED also during the week will be a Student Senate forum Thursday at 8 p.m. in Stewart Hall auditorium. A panel of students will quiz Student Senate presidential and vice presidential candidates on campaign issues and platforms.

Coffee and cookies will be served after each session.

REP. ANDREWS is the senior United States representative from North Dakota.

Elected to Congress in 1963, he received his agricultural engineering degree from North Dakota State University. He is a former North Dakota Republican national committeeman.

Rep. Andrews is serving on the House Interior and Insular Affairs committees.

SEN. TYDINGS, from Maryland, entered the United States Senate in 1965. He is serving on the Senate Judiciary committee where he was chairman of the subcommittee on improvements in judicial machinery; the Public Works committee and the District of Columbia committee, serving as chairman of the subcommittee on business and commerce.

Born in 1928, Sen. Tydings received his B.A. degree from the University of Maryland and his LL.B. degree from the University of Maryland Law School. He served as United

States attorney for Maryland from 1961 to 1963.

HE IS THE son of former United States Sen. Millard E. Tydings and grandson of Ambassador Joseph E. Davies.

The theme of this year's Political Emphasis Week is "The Young Generation: Issues 1967."

He is co-author of "Lectures: Introduction to the Science of Behavior" and "The Control of Human Behavior."

Considered a leading authority in the rapidly expanding area of experimental analysis of behavior, Dr. Ulrich has established several programs at Western Michigan University utilizing these techniques. He received a Ph.D. degree from Southern Illinois University in 1961.

THE SERIES will conclude April 25 with an address by Dr. Athelstan Spilhaus, professor of physics at the University of Minnesota, on "The Experimental City."

Sponsored by the college's concerts and lectures committee, these convocations are designed to provide a market for the ideas of prominent individuals active in attempting to improve man's environment.

Nine St. Cloud State faculty members will participate in a Minnesota Intercollegiate Faculty Conference today through Sunday at Sugar Hills Lodge near Grand Rapids.

"Forms of Interfaculty Cooperation" is the theme for the meeting, which is sponsored by the Minnesota Conference of the American Association of University Professors and the University of Minnesota Senate. The program is supported by a grant from the Louis W. and Maud Hill Family Foundation.

Gaining only two first places, State still managed to take first place in the Moorhead State Indoor Invitational track meet held before a packed Alex Nemzek field house on the Moorhead State campus Tuesday evening.

SCS had 45½ points followed by Moorhead State with 45, NDSU 42, Northern State College 33, Dickinson 20½ and UND 9.

Van Nelson managed the two first places, with winning times of 4:16.1 in the mile and 9:16.6 in the two mile. Both of these times were new Nemzek fieldhouse records.

THE HUSKIES' two outstanding freshmen distance runners also placed in these two events. Bruce Johnson took second in the mile and third in the two mile, and Jeff Renneberg took a fifth in both events.

SCS also picked up points in the 60-yard dash where Walt Rhodes took second, Gary Johnson third, and Gary Haugen fifth.

Other Huskies placing were - Chet Bogar-fifth-high jump; Gary Welton-second-440; Mike Christian-fourth-high hurdles; Dave Renslow second-shot put; Greg Froelich-fifth-triple jump; John Ploog-fourth-pole vault; John Brunner-fifth-pole vault; and the mile relay team took second.

THE HUSKIES missed a big chance in the sixth inning to beat the Johnnies. With one out, SC loaded the bases, but failed to score.

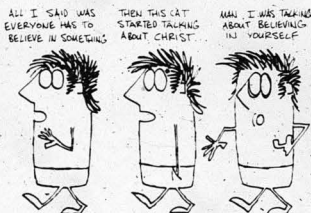
STATE RETURNS to action today against Mayville at 3 p.m. at the Cold Spring field. Dave Burns, the ace southpaw, will start that game.
