Sophomore women awarded 'no hours'

A college administrative board approved the request for a "no hours" policy for sophomore women students at a meeting Tuesday.

According to Dr. Dale Patton, vice president for student affairs, the policy was approved on a trial basis for one year. After that period it will be reviewed. The trial period will begin next fall.

The action followed a proposal from the AWS board in the form of a resolution sent to college administrators. The proposal was the result of ground work done by the AWS board.

The AWS board conducted a survey winter quarter concerning the hours policy. The board also held open meetings and executive discussions, at which time

the board reviewed information from othwschools affiliated with the Intercollegiate AWS.

The information from the other schools showed that many have a no hours policy for sophomores, juniors and seniors, and others are moving toward that goal," reported Kathy Zeltwanger, AWS secretary and president-elect for next year.

She pointed out that women are becoming more self-governing in our society, and this resolution concerning hours reflects that change.

Before the resolution was reviewed by the administration, Miss Zeltwanger expressed optimism for approval.

The AWS resolution, as it was sent to the college administrators, is printed here:

AWS hours resolution

WHEREAS: The Associated Women Students of St. Cloud State College belong to the Intercollegiate Association of Women Students and this organization is dedicated to:

1. Cultivating an attitude of preparing women to govern themselves responsibly throughout their college careers,
2. Encouraging women to discover and develop their individual potential, and,

3. Increasing the ability and desire of college women to fulfill their unique role as educated and competent women in an ever-changing, democratic society and throughout the span of their lives.

WHEREAS: The AWS Executive Board is concerned with these objectives and their relationship to the women at St. Cloud State College.

WHEREAS: The AWS took a survey Winter 1968 to gain information on how the women on the St. Cloud campus think and feel about the present women's hours policy.

WHEREAS: The Survey taken showed that a majority of women do desire no hours for Sophomore women.

WHEREAS: The AWS Executive Board considering this survey and the success of the past years no hours policy for juniors and seniors.

WHEREAS: The AWS Executive Board believes that sophomore women are mature enough to have developed enough self-discipline to regulate their own hours.

BE IT RESOLVED: That the AWS Executive Board justifies the necessity of a women's hours policy meeting the changing needs of the students in a changing society in which we live which requires greater responsibilities of women which we feel the women of St. Cloud State College have met.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the AWS Executive Board recommends to the Dean of Women and to the Administrative Council that Sophomore women should be given the no hours policy presently employed by juniors and seniors.

In amendment, referendum votes

2.0 hpr for Senate officers endorsed

One-hundred forty-seven SCS students voted in favor of a Student Senate referendum stating that "All candidates for the office of president, vice-president, campus coordinator, NSA coordinator, and treasurer shall have a cumulative 2.0 honor point ratio." This is a change from the 1967 constitutional requirement of a 2.5 honor point ratio.

The Student Senate passed the above resolution April 1 which further required an affirmative majority of votes cast by the student body for passage.

Two-hundred five students voted at Atwood, Garvey, and Stewart with 147 voting in favor and 58 voting against.

In other recent Senate action, an election calendar was prepared for the upcoming Student Senate elections May 1. Included in the calendar were several meetings with resident hall students and a "Meet the Candidates" meeting in Atwood Center.

On April 30, another opportunity to meet the candidates will be at Hill-Case Halls, at 7 p.m.

Registration for fall quarter begins Monday

Students currently enrolled can take advantage of early registration for fall quarter, 1968.

Necessary materials can be obtained in Stewart Hall 103 from April 29 through May 10. Fall quarter class schedule books may be obtained in Stewart Hall 114.

Completed registration materials must be deposited in Stewart Hall 103 on the following dates: seniors, juniors, and professionals, April 29 -

May 3; sophomores, freshmen, and students on academic probation, May 6-10. No mail registration will be accepted after May 10.

Appointments for those students not eligible to register by mail will be scheduled from May 20-June 7. The first appointment sheets will be posted Friday, May 17.

To help the line situation involved in obtaining materials, Mrs. Arthur Gracheck registrar, suggests that the seniors, juniors, and professional students report for materials on Monday and Tuesday, April 29 to 30, and other students should wait until Wednesday and Thursday, May 1 and 2.

State College Senates OK constitution

Representatives of nearly all the Minnesota State Colleges student governments have approved the constitution of the Minnesota State College Student Association.

The Association was formed with goals of providing a lobbying force for the state colleges at the Minnesota State Legislature, providing a student point of view at all State College Board meetings, promoting the exchange of ideas among the student governments and students of the member colleges.

According to Mike Sieben, SCS Student Senate president and temporary chairman of the new association, the next meeting will be held at St. Cloud State on May 11.

The agenda will include election of permanent officers, consideration of resolutions involving married student housing, replacement of residence hall house mothers, and campus discipline procedures. Dr. Theodore Mitau, newly appointed State College Board Chancellor, has been invited to deliver an informal address and confer with the new officers.

Dr. Housman resigns

Dr. Arthur Housman, chairman of the department of speech and dramatic art at SCS, has resigned that post to become chairman of the department of theatre at the Ohio State University in Columbus, Ohio.

Housman, who joined the St. Cloud State faculty in 1956, has been department chairman since September 1962. He will begin his duties as chairman of the depart-

ment of theatre and professor of theatre at the 37,000 student campus next fall and will head a new department in a newly formed college of the arts.

"My job will be to help build a strong undergraduate program in theatre and to develop new programs, particularly production-oriented programs involving guest artist series," said Housman.

Minnesota YDFL endorses McCarthy

Senator Eugene McCarthy has been endorsed for the DFL presidential candidacy by the Minnesota Federation of YDFL Clubs at its recent state convention in Minneapolis.

The more than 350 delegates to the convention backed a resolution which praised the senator because "he has succeeded in presenting the issues to the American people and has shown great leadership ability in all areas of American political life."

Also at the convention, Gerry Sikorski from Brecken-

ridge was elected chairman of the state YDFL for 1968-69. Sikorski, winning a first-ballot victory, campaigned on a platform of "YDFL Activism in 1968" and called for a "greater voice for the YDFL both from within and without the DFL and a new direction and strength for our YDFL federation."

Sikorski defeated Larry Bye from Grand Rapids and James Miller from Minneapolis for the chairmanship.

SCS YDFL members John Fredell, Terry Serie, Eugene Storms, and Steve Wenzel worked on Sikorski's campaign.

Coach Jim Stanek's baseball nine find themselves in an unfamiliar and uncomfortable position of holding down the Northern Intercollegiate Conference cellar.

The Huskies are hoping to change their position in one big hurry when they travel to Bemidji for a single game tomorrow at 3 p.m. and a double-header Saturday beginning at noon.

State's success appears to hinge on the ability to get a few more base hits than they were able to produce against Mankato.

The Husky pitching staff has compiled an ERA of 0.63 for eleven games.

SC runners set for Drake Relays

Four members of the SCS track team are expected to compete in the Drake Relays at Des Moines, Iowa tomorrow and Saturday.

Van Nelson, senior from Minneapolis Washburn will be one of the top runners scheduled to compete in the meet according to coach Bob Tracy.

Others slated for competition are Jerry Dirkes, a sophomore from Albany; Jeff Renneberg, also a sophomore from Menasha; and Lon Martinson, a junior from Babbitt.

Coach Tracy, who again will serve as chairman of the jury for running events in the Relays, has indicated that he will use Nelson in the three and six mile runs. Nelson is the defending champion and record holder for both of those events. Dirkes will enter the six mile, Martinson the two mile and Renneberg the two and three mile runs.

The remainder of St. Cloud's squad will travel to Alexander Ramsey High School in Roseville Saturday to compete against 17 colleges from Minnesota and Wisconsin in the Bethel Relays.

Tracy plans to use Dave Renslow of Minneapolis Southwest and Gary Sabourin of Coon Rapids in the weights and Dwight Lundeen of Co-kato in the javelin.

John Ploog of Minneapolis Southwest, who set a new record at Carleton last week end, will combine efforts with Jim Ridgeway of Grand Marias in the pole vault. Triple jumpers will include Rich Johnson of Anoka and Glenn Donnay of Paynesville while Ploog and Dan

Desaultes of Benilde will handle long jumping chores. Leon Westbrook of Browns Valley will be St. Cloud's high jumper.

Following those two road assignments, the Huskies return to Selke Field to host St. John's University in a dual track meet on Wednesday, May 1.
