MAYOR DINKINS AND COUNCIL SPEAKER VALLONE ANNOUNCE THE MEMBERS OF
THE NEW ATM ADVISORY TASK FORCE
TO INCREASE SECURITY AT CASH MACHINES

Mayor David N. Dinkins and City Council Speaker Peter F. Vallone today announced the appointments of the members of the Automated Teller Machine Advisory Task Force, a committee that will review the need for banks to install a new type of magnetic door lock in ATM facilities in New York City. Mayor Dinkins and Speaker Vallone appointed Stanley Grayson, Vice President of Goldman Sachs and former New York City Deputy Mayor for Finance and Economic Development, to chair the committee.

The Task Force has been established as part of the requirements of the ATM bill signed into law last August by Mayor Dinkins. The new law created a package of security provisions for ATMs which banks will be required to implement by early next year. The Task Force is charged with exploring the capabilities of the "high tech" door lock -- a device that would permit access only to individuals with a valid ATM card or access code -- about which some members of the banking industry have expressed concern. The Task Force is required to report to the Mayor and the City Council within one year with recommendations on the technological feasibility of the door locks.

Mayor Dinkins said, "The formation of the ATM Task Force is evidence of the City's ongoing commitment to public safety by

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going the extra yard in examining security technology for the best possible results. We believe that the formation of the Task Force will help us bolster security while addressing industry concerns."

City Council Speaker Peter Vallone said, "The creation of this Task Force shows that the Council wants to work with the private sector to ensure that the laws we are enacting are fair and feasible. While the ATM law was generated by concerns about public safety, we need to know that its requirements are practical."

The ATM law requires the installation of brighter lights, rear-view mirrors and surveillance cameras by March, 1993.

Mayor Dinkins and Speaker Vallone are encouraging public input in the formulation of the report to be submitted to the Mayor and the City Council.

Mayor Dinkins and the City Council have appointed 15 members to the Task Force, which will include executives from leading banks, security and public safety experts, as well as City Council and community board representatives.

The mayoral appointees are: Eugene Connolly, National Director of ~~Security~~, Discover Card Services Inc.; Anne Compoocia, Chair, Manhattan Community Board 1; Michael Hegarty, Sr., Senior Executive Vice President, Chemical Bank; Ann Slattery, Managing Director, Consumer Banking, Citibank; George Engelke, President and Chief Executive Officer, Astoria Federal Savings and Loan Association; Henry F. Henderson, President and Chief Executive Officer, H.F. Henderson Industries; and Stanley

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Wand, Engineering Consultant.

The City Council appointees are: Charles Hamm, President and Chief Executive Officer, Independence Savings Bank; Donald L. Boudreau, Executive Vice President, Chase Manhattan Bank, N.A.; Thomas E. Gunther, Director of Electronic Banking, Dime Savings Bank; ~~Gerry Plant~~, ^{TONY MONTESION} Vice President, ~~Automation and Fraud Division~~, ^{RISK MANAGEMENT} AT & T Universal Card Co.; Nusha Bryan, Accessible Architecture, P.C.; and Walter McCaffrey, Councilmember (D-Queens), the prime sponsor of the ATM Bill.

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The City Council has also asked Michael Levine, father of Sergeant Keith Levine, an off-duty policeman who was killed while trying to stop a robbery at a Manhattan ATM, to join the Task Force.

The following is a timetable of the effective dates regarding the ATM law:

February	1993	With the exception of the locking device requirement, ATM statute becomes effective.
March	1993	Banks must submit annual report to the Department of Buildings certifying that every ATM facility is in compliance with the ATM statute.
Winter	1993	ATM Advisory Task Force report due.
Spring	1994	Subject to amendments proposed by the Task Force Committee, banks must install locking devices or post a security guard at every ATM facility during non-banking hours.

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
